Biathlon Canada Youth & Junior World Championships Trials

January 14-18, 2026

Whistler Olympic Park British Columbia, Canada







1. Competition Information

1.1. Competition Venue

Whistler Olympic Park hosted the Nordic events for the 2010 Winter Olympic Games. The biathlon stadium features 30 electronic HoRa targets, with covered canopy and lights. The trails are open with natural snow from mid-November until mid-April. There are fourteen on-trail wax cabins within 100 meters of the range. The range is at 870 meters elevation. The highest point on the course is at 890 m elevation, and the lowest point is at 849 m elevation.

Whistler Olympic Park is located 16 km south of Whistler and 40 km north of Squamish on Highway 99, then 9 km West on Callaghan Valley Road. Once inside the park, follow the signs to the biathlon stadium at the end of Callaghan Road.

The day lodge is located 1 km from the biathlon range, just up the stairs from parking lots 1 and 2. It includes the following amenities:

1.2. Rules

International Biathlon Union (IBU) rules and regulations and the Biathlon Canada Hosting Policy shall apply as fully as possible to all classes.

1.3. Eligibility to Enter

All athletes participating must be registered participants with Biathlon Canada or US Biathlon or another IBU national federation for the 2025-2026 season.

1.6. Wax Protocol

A mandatory universal wax protocol will be implemented for all athletes. The fluoro ban described in the Canadian Hosting Policy will be in effect for this event. The trials organizing committee will take responsibility for the preparation of all skis. All athletes must submit one pair of skis to the identified Wax Cabin at Whistler Olympic Park during the times indicated in the event schedule. The organizing committee will make note of the athlete's name and skis, ensure the athlete's skis are waxed and ensure the athlete's skis are available in the start pen as they proceed to the start.

2.10.Courses

2.11. Zeroing Lanes

The Organizing Committee will assign zeroing lanes for training and competitions. Athletes will indicate the name of the club or team that they will be zeroing with when they register. Each team will have zero lanes grouped beside each other in accordance to how many athletes they have on their team.

2.12. Minimum Coach Certification

Pursuant to the Biathlon Canada Hosting Policy, each Canadian club that has athletes competing must have a head coach present at the event who is NCCP certified at the Competition-Introduction level or higher. One coach may act as a head coach for multiple clubs.

In addition, all Canadian coaches and team staff (including all club/team volunteers who are on the range, course, or in the stadium) must be registered with Biathlon Canada and have completed the NCCP Safe Sport module, the NCCP Creating a Positive Sport Environment module, and the NCCP Understanding the Rule of Two module.

3.2. Entry Fees and Registration

Registration will open on Sunday, November 30, 2025 at 12:00 PST and will close on Sunday, January 4, 2026 at 23:59 PST. All individuals who wish to attend, including athletes and coaches, must register in advance. Payment must be made using a credit card.

- Registration cost is \$55 per day of competition
- Trail passes for competition days and training days are included in the registration fee
- Trail passes for Monday and Tuesday, January 12 and 13, will be available for purchase in Zone4 at a cost of:
 - \$15/day for athletes under the age of 19 as of December 31, 2025
 - o \$20/day for athletes 19 and older as of December 31, 2025

3.3. Trail Passes

Trail pass requirements must be confirmed on the registration form. Trail passes for registered athletes, coaches, and volunteers will be available for pick-up at the Whistler Olympic Park gate kiosk starting on Monday, January 12, 2026.

Parents/guardians dropping participants off for competitions must also purchase a day ticket (<u>online</u> or in person) or present a season pass if they plan to ski or snowshoe. If parent/guardians are not skiing or snowshoeing, or only dropping off they do not need a day ticket or season pass.

Pets are not allowed in the competition area or trails near the biathlon stadium.

3.4. Cancellation Policy

If circumstances force cancellation of the event, registration fees, less the costs already incurred by the host club, will be refunded to registered athletes. Note, that a \$20 processing fee will apply before a refund is sent. If an athlete wishes to withdraw before the registration deadline due to medical reasons, he/she should apply, with a doctor's note, to the competition secretary for a refund. No refunds will be provided after the registration deadline of January 4, 2026.

3.5.Rifle Regulations

Teams and individual competitors from outside of Canada must declare their rifles at the Canadian border, complete the necessary documentation, and pay the required fees when bringing rifles and ammunition into Canada. All athletes must register their own rifles and pay the applicable fee. Refer to the RCMP Firearms Program to obtain a Non-Resident Firearms Declaration: https://www.cbsa-asfc.gc.ca/import/iefw-iefa-eng.html for guidelines.

Notice regarding firearms:

Maintenance and cleaning of rifles may be performed in team wax cabins. It is not permitted in the Biathlon Flex Space. Competitors are required to transport their rifles from the parking lot to the biathlon range in either a soft or hard case. All Canadian athletes who are carrying their rifles on course must have in their possession, and be able to show upon request, their Possession and Acquisition Licence or Minor's Permit. Rifles should not be left unattended.

3.6. Wax Cabins

Whistler Olympic Park has 13 wax cabins at the biathlon range stadium. The cabins are heated and have electricity. They have a table and chairs.

- Wax cabins are available at a cost of \$40/day plus \$100 key deposit
- To secure a wax cabin, e-transfer the total amount to <u>competition@seatoskynordics.ca</u>. The key
 deposit will be refunded after the keys have been returned. Please include a note in the transfer
 to indicate "Wax Cabin" and Club or Team Name.
- Keys will be available at the Competition Office starting on Wednesday, January 14. For rentals earlier than Wednesday, contact competition@seatoskynordics.ca to arrange pick-up.
