STATEMENT ON SAFE SPORT

Biathlon Canada and its Members¹ have a fundamental obligation and responsibility to protect the health, safety and physical and mental well-being of every individual that is involved with the Biathlon Canada community.

Biathlon Canada and its Members take any situation involving misconduct or Prohibited Behaviour very seriously. For this reason, Biathlon Canada and its Members are committed to enacting and enforcing strong, clear, and effective policies and processes for preventing and addressing all forms of misconduct or Prohibited Behaviour.

The policies are intended to promote a safe sport environment in a manner that allows for consistent, immediate, appropriate and meaningful action should any issues arise, and they are also intended to prevent issues from arising in the first place by communicating expected standards of behaviour.

Should any individuals involved with Biathlon Canada or its Members, including but not limited to Athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers, and parents/guardians of Athletes, wish to report any instance of misconduct or Prohibited Behaviour, they may do so in accordance with Biathlon Canada's *Discipline and Complaints Policy*, as amended from time to time.

¹ A Division Member, as defined in the Biathlon Canada By-laws. For the purposes of this Policy, Member shall mean a Member who has voluntarily adopted the Policy or who is otherwise required to apply the Policy by the By-laws and governing documents of Biathlon Canada or the Member.

Biathlon Canada adopted the Universal Code of Conduct to Prevent and Address Maltreatment in Sport (UCCMS) on February 23, 2023. The UCCMS shall be considered as incorporated by reference in the *Code of Conduct and Ethics* and all Biathlon Canada policies and will apply, as amended from time to time, to all Participants. Any amendments to the UCCMS shall come into effect immediately upon their adoption, without the need for any further action by Biathlon Canada.

Definitions

1. Terms in this Policy are defined as follows:

- a) **Athlete** – An individual who is an Athlete Participant in Biathlon Canada who is subject to the UCCMS and the policies of Biathlon Canada and/or a Member, as applicable
- b) **Sport Integrity Canada** – the body mandated to independently administer and enforce the UCCMS, the CSSP and Canadian Anti-Doping Program (CADP)
- c) **Canadian Safe Sport Program (CSSP)** – the program created by Sport Integrity Canada in accordance with its mandate to independently administer and enforce the UCCMS.
- d) **CSSP Participant** – an individual affiliated with a Signatory, has been defined by the CSSP Rules or otherwise designated by Biathlon Canada and is therefore subject to the CSSP Rules. CSSP Participants may include an Athlete, a coach, a board member, an official, an Athlete Support Personnel, an employee, a worker, an administrator, or a volunteer acting on behalf of, or representing a Signatory. CSSP Participants may be required to complete certain requisites as set out in the CSSP Rules, and must sign the required consent form.

- e) **CSSP Rules** – the rules adopted by Sport Integrity Canada that address the process by which Reports of Prohibited Behaviour are administered and enforced by Sport Integrity Canada and, where applicable, the SDRCC
- f) **Minor** – As defined in the UCCMS and as amended from time to time
- g) **Participants** – Refers to Registered Participants as defined in the By-laws of Biathlon Canada or a Member who are subject to the UCCMS and the policies of Biathlon Canada or a Member, as well as all people employed by, contracted by, or engaged in activities with Biathlon Canada or a Member including, but not limited to, employees, contractors, Athletes, coaches, instructors, officials, volunteers, managers, administrators, committee members, parents or guardians, spectators, directors or officers
- h) **SDRCC** – The Sport Dispute Resolution Centre of Canada
- i) **Signatory** – any sport organization that has adopted the CSSP pursuant to an Adoption Contract with Sport Integrity Canada
- j) **UCCMS** – The Universal Code of Conduct to Prevent and Address Maltreatment in Sport, as amended from time to time
- k) **Vulnerable Participants** – As defined in the UCCMS and as amended from time to time

Purpose

2. This Policy describes how Biathlon Canada and its Members aim to provide a safe sport environment.

Commitment to True Sport Principles

3. Biathlon Canada and its Members commit to the True Sport Principles which are:

- a) **Go for It** – Rise to the challenge – always strive for excellence. Discover how good you can be.
- b) **Play Fair** – Play honestly – obey both the letter and spirit of the rules.
Winning is only meaningful when competition is fair.
- c) **Respect Others** – Show respect for everyone involved in creating your sporting experience, both on and off the field. Win with dignity and lose with grace.
- d) **Keep it Fun** – Find the joy of sport. Keep a positive attitude both on and off the field.
- e) **Stay Healthy** – Place physical and mental health above all other considerations – avoid unsafe activities. Respect your body and keep in shape.
- f) **Include Everyone** – Share sport with others. Ensure everyone has a place to play.
- g) **Give Back** – Find ways to show your appreciation for the community that supports your sport and helps make it possible.

Commitment to a Sport Environment Free from Prohibited Behaviour

4. Biathlon Canada and its Members make the following commitments to a sport environment free from Prohibited Behaviour:

- a) All Participants in sport can expect to play, practice and compete, work, and interact in an environment free from Prohibited Behaviour.
- b) Addressing the causes and consequences of Prohibited Behaviour is a collective responsibility and requires the deliberate efforts of all Participants, sport stakeholders, sport club administrators and organization leaders.

- c) Participants in positions of trust and authority have the general responsibility to protect the health and well-being of all other Participants.
- d) Adult Participants have a specific ethical and statutory duty and the additional responsibility to respond to incidents of Prohibited Behaviour involving Minors and other Vulnerable Participants.
- e) All Participants recognize that Prohibited Behaviour can occur regardless of age, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, race, ethnicity, Indigenous status, or level of physical and intellectual disability and their intersections. Moreover, it is recognized that those from traditionally marginalized groups have increased vulnerability to experiences of Prohibited Behaviour.
- f) All Participants recognize that individuals who have experienced Prohibited Behaviour may experience a range of effects that may emerge at different time points and that can profoundly affect their lives.
- g) All adults working with children and youth have a duty to prevent or mitigate opportunities for misconduct.
- h) In recognition of the historic vulnerability to discrimination and violence amongst some groups, and that continues to persist today, Participants in positions of trust and authority have a duty to incorporate strategies to recognize systemic bias, unconscious bias, and to respond quickly and effectively to discriminatory practices.

Pledge

5. The stakeholders, members, and leaders of Biathlon Canada and its Members are expected to live by the True Sport Principles and Biathlon Canada and its Members

pledge to embed the True Sport Principles in their governance and operations in the following ways:

- a) Conduct Standards – Biathlon Canada and its Members will adopt comprehensive conduct standards that are expected to be followed by Participants
- b) Athlete Protection – Biathlon Canada and its Members will provide coaches and other stakeholders with general and sport-specific athlete protection guidelines
- c) Dispute Resolution and Investigations – Biathlon Canada and its Members will have dispute resolution processes that are confidential and procedurally fair and that require independent investigation for certain alleged violations of the conduct standards
- d) Strategy – Biathlon Canada and its Members will have strategic plans that reflect the organization’s mission, vision, and values
- e) Governance – Biathlon Canada and its Members will have diverse sport leaders and will adhere to principles of good governance
- f) Risk Management – Biathlon Canada and its Members will intentionally manage risks to their operations and events

Conduct Standards

6. Biathlon Canada and its Members have adopted a *Code of Conduct and Ethics* that describes standards of conduct and behaviour for all Participants. General standards of conduct apply to all Participants and specific standards are described for

positions within the organization. The *Code of Conduct and Ethics* will have specific stakeholder sections, including but not limited, to:

- a) Athletes
 - b) Coaches
 - c) Officials
 - d) Volunteers
 - e) Directors and Committee Members
 - f) Parents and Spectators
7. The safe sport policies will incorporate the terms set out in the UCCMS or otherwise contain detailed definitions of key terms, including:
- a) Maltreatment
 - b) Prohibited Behaviour
 - c) Harassment
 - d) Abuse
 - e) Discrimination
 - f) Workplace Harassment
 - g) Workplace Violence

Additional key terms may be adopted or incorporated by reference in the *Code of Conduct and Ethics* by Biathlon Canada.

Anti-Doping

8. The *Code of Conduct and Ethics* will indicate that Biathlon Canada and its Members adopt and adhere to the Canadian Anti-Doping Program.

Social Media

9. Biathlon Canada and its Members have adopted a *Social Media Policy* that describes standards of conduct that are expected on social media by Participants. The *Social Media Policy* indicates specific conduct standards and risks that are common and/or exclusive to social media.
10. The *Social Media Policy* highlights the importance of responsible coach–Athlete interaction on social media and provides examples of violations of conduct standards.

Athlete Protection

Screening

11. Biathlon Canada and its Members will adopt a comprehensive *Screening Policy* that requires some Participants to pass a screening process before being permitted to interact with Athletes. The *Screening Policy* will:
- a) Categorize positions in the organization as ‘Low Risk’, ‘Medium Risk’, and ‘High Risk’ and require progressive screening measures for individuals serving in each category of risk
 - b) Describe how frequently some Participants must obtain a criminal record check and which type of check(s) they must obtain

- c) Describe how frequently some Participants must submit Screening Disclosure Forms and Screening Renewal Forms
 - d) Empower a Screening Committee to prohibit Participants who do not pass screening from participating in certain positions
 - e) Empower a Screening Committee to attach conditions to a Participant's participation in certain positions
12. Biathlon Canada and its Members have developed an *Athlete Protection Policy* that can be used by coaches, managers, medical personnel, and other Persons in Authority. Biathlon Canada or a Member may provide training on the policy and take steps to ensure the policy is being implemented. Biathlon Canada and its Members will conduct a regular review of the policy to add and/or modify new content as appropriate.

13. Biathlon Canada and its Members will regularly provide information to Participants about resources and training related to athlete protection. Resources and training opportunities can include:

Athlete Engagement

14. Biathlon Canada and its Members will engage with Athletes to determine the level of success of their athlete protection measures as well as to identify any gaps or Athlete concerns. This engagement may take the form of:

- a) Anonymous athlete surveys
- b) Athlete involvement in organizational decision-making

Dispute Resolution

15. Biathlon Canada and its Members have and will maintain a comprehensive suite of dispute resolution policies that will include:

- a) Discipline and Complaints Policy*
- b) Dispute Resolution and Appeal Policy*
- c) Event Discipline Procedure*

16. Taken together, the suite of dispute resolution policies will include the following features:

- a) An independent individual to whom complaints can be submitted
- b) Information regarding the mechanism to report alleged breaches of the UCCMS by
CSSP Participants to Sport Integrity Canada
- c) Sanctions for violations of conduct standards
- d) Mechanism for provisional suspension of individuals pending the conclusion of the process
- e) Non-biased and experienced case managers, decision-makers and/or investigators
- f) Protection from reprisal for submitting complaints
- g) Independence of appeal procedures, when appeals are permitted

- h) Opportunity for alternative dispute resolution
- i) Investigations of complaints as circumstances merit
- j) In-event discipline procedures (when an event does not have its own disciplinary procedures)

Obligations – Reporting and Third Party Case Management

- 17. The policies of Biathlon Canada and its Members include requirements that certain complaints must be reported to government entities, local police services, and/or child protection agencies when required by the circumstances.
- 18. The policies of Biathlon Canada and its Members include requirements that complaints must be received by an independent third party who has no conflict of interest or bias.
- 19. The policies of Biathlon Canada and its Members include direction on the referral of alleged breaches of the UCCMS by a CSSP Participant to Sport Integrity Canada.

Records

- 20. Biathlon Canada and its Members will retain records of decisions that have been made pursuant to the organization's policies. These records may be shared with other individuals or organizations, including but not limited to, national sport organizations, provincial/territorial sport organizations, multi-sport organizations, and government entities.

Governance and Operations

- 21. Biathlon Canada and its Members will have a comprehensive plan in which athlete protection and safe sport are top priorities for the organization.

22. Biathlon Canada has adopted a *Risk Management Policy* that describes how the organization will address risks ranging from 'Unlikely' to 'Almost Certain' and from 'Minor' to 'Catastrophic'. Biathlon Canada will contemplate risk management strategies that retain, reduce, transfer, and/or avoid the risk. Risks can occur in the following areas:

- a) Operational/Program
- b) Compliance
- c) Communication
- d) External
- e) Governance
- f) Financial
- g) Health and Safety

23. Biathlon Canada and its Members will pursue a governance structure and organizational culture that reflects the diversity of the athletes and stakeholders within the sport, that adheres to all applicable federal and/or provincial/territorial legislation, and that moves toward a national alignment strategy for the sport in Canada.

24. Biathlon Canada and its Members will continually monitor and evaluate their policies, practices, and procedures.

Privacy

25. The collection, use and disclosure of any personal information pursuant to this Policy is subject to Biathlon Canada's *Privacy Policy* or the privacy policy of a Member, as applicable.
