

Remote Education Provision: Information for Parents

The remote curriculum: what is taught to pupils at home?

Remote learning will follow a planned and sequenced curriculum. It will be high-quality, safe and give pupils the support they need to master the curriculum in each subject and make good progress. Work will be set in Microsoft Teams, and provision will be made for live lessons, although these may not cover the whole of the academy day.

What should my child expect from immediate remote education during the first day or two of pupils being sent home?

In the first day or two of a closure, students will receive work to complete via email. The school will quickly move to full remote learning with the provision of live lessons. Students will receive independent remote learning tasks and live learning opportunities. These will be accessed via Teams in the lesson folders for the classes they are in.

Will my child be taught broadly the same curriculum as they would if they were in school?

We will teach the same curriculum as we would in school. However, some subjects may make some adaptations to ensure that pupils are able to access the learning remotely.

Remote Teaching and Study Time Each Day

How long can I expect work set by the school to take my child each day?

All pupils will be set 5 hours of learning per day (including live teaching and independent work). There may also be assemblies and homework added to this.

Accessing remote education

Students will find work on Microsoft Teams. Further details of the work will be emailed directly to students. Teams will be used to deliver live lessons. Students should be familiar with Microsoft Teams as it is used frequently in school. A live lesson timetable will be provided for all pupils.





If my child does not have digital or online access at home, how will you support them to access remote education?

We understand that some pupils may not have suitable online access at home. Please contact the relevant Year Leader in school to make them aware that your child does not have digital or online access at home and they will ensure your child is supported in accessing remote learning.

How will my child be taught remotely?

Pupils will receive a combination of live taught lessons and independent learning tasks. Learning will include new content, delivered through high quality curriculum resources and/or videos.

What are your expectations for my child's engagement and the support that we as parents and carers should provide at home?

It is expected that your child will engage with every lesson on their timetable, every day of the week. This timetable mirrors the school day. Information for parents/carers to support their children at home will be available on our website. We will also send parents a letter detailing remote learning provision and support for each year group.

How will you check whether my child is engaging with their work and how will I be informed if there are concerns?

Attendance at every live lesson will be registered by the teacher. Engagement with remote learning will also be logged on Arbor, by teachers. Parents/carers will be contacted by phone if their child hasn't engaged in remote learning or attended live lessons.

How will you assess my child's work and progress?

Pupils will receive feedback, at least weekly, on their work and progress. Active feedback will be given regularly during live lessons and will also take the form of self marking quizzes and whole class feedback. Pupils may also receive written feedback via email and as part of any assessments or pieces of work they submit.

How will you work with me to help my child who needs additional support from adults at home to access remote education?

We know that some pupils, for example, pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), may not be able to access remote education without support from adults at home. We acknowledge the difficulties this may cause, and we will work with parents and carers to support those pupils.



If my child is not in school because they are self-isolating, how will their remote education differ from the approaches described above?

If your child is at home because they are self-isolating, they will still be able to access remote learning as detailed above. Remote learning will always mirror the curriculum that is taught in school.
