

LEADERSHIP MESSAGE

As we approach October half-term, I am delighted to share our academy news from this first eight weeks of the academy year. The year has started very well, and we have already seen students securing significantly more positive points than at the same time last year. The improved attendance we achieved last year has also continued into this academic year to date. This is very pleasing and will directly impact learning and outcomes, as lost learning is significantly reduced.

Two weeks ago, we had our Trust review where one of our Co-CEOs and members of the Central Team reviewed the academy over the course of two days. Students were excellent, showing real engagement with their learning, as well as politeness, maturity and ambition. This excellent climate for learning demonstrates our culture of high expectations and the desire our students have to do well.

I have been very proud of our young people's achievements in a number of areas this half-term. Those who volunteered to help out at Open Evening in September were excellent ambassadors for the school, and we received much positive feedback about them following the event where we had the best turn out to date.

Last week, Mrs Watson, Head of Health and Personal Development, was invited to deliver an oracy workshop at the Great Oracy Exhibition in Birmingham to share our good practice and the ways we teach our young people to talk fluently and with confidence. Four students accompanied Mrs Watson and Mr Cross, and they were an absolute credit to the school, demonstrating great speaking skill and maturity.

This week, all year groups have benefited from a motivational talk delivered by Andrew Jenkins who was a finalist in the reality television show, 'Traitors'. He spoke to them about resilience, the importance of having a growth mindset, and how they too can overcome 'failure' and trauma to achieve their very best. It was an excellent opportunity to reflect and reconnect with ambition and self-awareness.

There are many achievements you will be able to read about in this half-term's newsletter. As always, I am proud of our young people and feel privileged to be Head of Lightcliffe Academy where we have such amazing young people and staff. LITERACY AND ORACY

Oracy

Over this half term we have been using talk tactics to support and develop student talk in the classroom, these are designed to help students instigate talk and probe each other to challenge and develop discussion.

Next half term we will be focussing on a different strategy called a Bullseye, this will support students to use sophisticated language when discussing and debating a variety of topics.

Reading

So far this academic year students have been engaging in a variety of texts through Faster Read Fridays in form time. Year 7 have been reading Echoes of Reflection which was written by a past student of Lightcliffe Academy and Year 8 have been reading Cirque Du Freak.

In addition, we have had a launch of our new Lightcliffe 100 words which are designed to develop students' vocabulary. Over the past few weeks, we have looked at: adept, advocacy, affirmation, aesthetics, allure, altruistic, ambiguous, ambitious, aspire, avarice, beguiled, benevolent, bias, boycott and chagrin. Every week there are 3 new words that students are tasked with learning and using in both their written and verbal work.

SAFEGUARDING UPDATE

As we reach the end of our first half term at Lightcliffe Academy, we wanted to share an update on how we continue to make sure that all our students feel safe, supported, and cared for in school.

Safeguarding is at the heart of everything we do at Lightcliffe. Our aim is to ensure that every child is happy, feels listened to, and knows who they can turn to if they ever need help or support.

Over the past few weeks, we have:

- Provided refresher safeguarding training for all staff to ensure everyone knows how to recognise and report any concerns quickly and appropriately.
- Updated our Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy in line with the latest national guidance (Keeping Children Safe in Education 2025).
- Placed a strong focus on attendance and wellbeing, recognising that good attendance is closely linked to feeling safe, settled, and ready to learn.
- Supported our new staff through induction sessions that cover all safeguarding procedures and expectations.
- Promoted online safety through assemblies and tutor activities, helping students understand how to stay safe and make positive choices online.

Our Safeguarding and Pastoral Teams have worked closely with families and outside agencies to provide early help and additional support when needed. We are very grateful for the strong partnership we have with parents and carers—your communication, trust, and vigilance all play a vital role in keeping our young people safe.

Next half term, we will be focusing on:

- Continuing to monitor and support attendance and punctuality.
- Encouraging kindness, respect, and positive friendships across the school.
- Gathering student feedback on how safe they feel in different areas of school life.

ATTENDANCE

As part of the Department for Education's working together to improve school attendance guidance we have been working closely with the Local Authority and other agencies to help support our young people and their families to help improve school attendance.

As we reach the end of our first half term, we are delighted to celebrate the strong start we have made as an academy. Many students have shown fantastic commitment to attending school every day, arriving on time, and making the most of every learning opportunity.

Good attendance is vital to success. Students who attend regularly achieve better outcomes, build stronger friendships, and feel more connected to school life. We'd like to thank all our parents and carers who continue to support us in ensuring their children attend every day and on time.

While attendance across the academy has started well, we are still seeing too many term-time holidays and unauthorised absences. These absences have a real impact on learning and can quickly lead to gaps in progress. Over the next half term, we will be looking closely at patterns of absence, including students who are regularly missing Mondays and Fridays, to provide additional support and, where needed, take further action.

We understand that sometimes children are unwell, and we will always treat each child as an individual. Absence due to illness will be recorded as authorised unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness. If a child's attendance is low (regular attendance is classed as above 95%), has frequent illness-related absences, or often misses the occasional day, we may ask parents or carers to provide medical evidence. This could be a doctor's note, prescription, appointment card, or another suitable form of confirmation. Please be assured that we will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily, but it may be required if a pattern of absence becomes concerning.

Any child who has multiple instances of illness-related absence is likely to fall into this category. If the school is not satisfied that the illness is genuine, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

We remain committed to supporting all our students and families to improve attendance and ensure every child can reach their full potential. Thank you for your continued support in helping make Lightcliffe Academy a place where every day counts.

Holidays in Term Time

Mathematics

What's new in Maths 2025!

We have been very fortunate to have a new refurbished Maths area. There are new carpets in the corridor and a newly carpeted Maths workroom. The Maths workroom is to be used by both staff and students. We will be using it for small Maths intervention groups to support those learners who need that level of support.

Homework

As you know this time last year we made a move away from online homework. The online homework providers really are very impressive, but it is at the same time often fraught with issues. Online homework relies on a good internet connection, remembering logins and passwords, and particularly a good size screen. A number of our students found that a smartphone screen was sometimes too small and difficult for working on calculations especially within algebra topics.

Therefore, we now issue a sheet of A4 paper once a week. We rotate the focus every fortnight. On week A it is a generic retrieval homework focussing on AO1 topic skills essential to further progress. Week B homework is specific to the topic the students are studying in class and chosen by the teacher to either consolidate or extend learning. For any students experiencing difficulty with homework the Maths team are happy to help and support them during lunchtime or after school.

Calculators

A calculator is a very important piece of equipment. Students need to bring a calculator to school every day as they are used in Science, Geography and Computer Science as well as in Maths.

To support you in choosing the right one we advise that the calculators are scientific, this means to look for the Sin, Cos and Tan buttons. All the major supermarkets sell their own brand scientific calculators for approx. £5-£6. This is half and sometimes a third the cost of the big-name calculator manufacturers. The supermarket own scientific calculators are more than good enough to use all the way until the end of Year 11 and beyond.

All the Maths teachers are happy to support your choice and guide you through the options, plus we can support the students in school on how best to use the calculators.

Geography

It's been an exciting and busy start to the term in the Geography Department! Our students have been exploring a wide range of fascinating topics, deepening their understanding of the world and developing key geographical skills along the way.

This Half Term's Topics

Our curriculum is designed to inspire curiosity and help students make sense of the complex and everchanging planet we call home. This half term, each year group has embarked on a different geographical journey:

- **Year 7** Wild Isles: Discovering the amazing geography of the UK, from dramatic coastlines to mountain landscapes and unique ecosystems.
- **Year 8** The Development Gap: Exploring why some countries develop faster than others and what can be done to create a fairer world.
- **Year 9** Unfair World: Investigating the causes of global challenges and conflicts, and considering how cooperation and sustainability can make a difference.
- **Year 10** The Economic World: Beginning their GCSE studies with a deep dive into how economies grow and why inequality persists between nations.
- **Year 11** Natural Hazards: Understanding the power of our planet through studies of volcanoes, earthquakes, and extreme weather events as they prepare for their GCSE exams.

Upcoming Guest Speakers

We're delighted to announce two special events this term that will bring geography to life beyond the classroom:

- Monday, 10th November A representative from Cromwell Bottom Nature Reserve will visit to talk about the importance of local conservation and the amazing biodiversity right on our doorstep.
- Wednesday 10th of December A guest from Chatsworth Forestry will speak to students about how Geographical Information Systems (GIS) are used in environmental management and how geography skills open doors to a wide range of careers.

Inspiring Future Geographers

These events aim to help students see the real-world impact of geography and the exciting career paths it can lead to—from environmental science and urban planning to data analysis and sustainability work. We're incredibly proud of our students' enthusiasm and curiosity this term and look forward to sharing more of their successes later in the year.

PERFORMING ARTS UPDATE

KS4

Students in KS4 have returned from the summer and quickly settled back into their Tech Award coursework. Pupils in Year 10 have started to work on their first component, which forms 30% of the course. The assessment for this work takes place at different points through the year. Media students will complete this work before Christmas, and those studying drama and music will hand this in later in Year 10. For all three subjects (drama, media and music) this component puts in place the foundations of the key elements that will be studied over the next two years.

The pupils in Year 11 have all started work on the third component of the course. They worked on the first two components in Year 10 and their work this year builds upon this. Having looked at the skills needed across the two years they will begin to study these in more depth over the coming months. This will lead to a mock assessment before the Christmas holiday and then continue with the final piece of assessed work which will be completed between January and the start of May.

KS3

Students in KS3 have all completed the first couple of lessons of the new topics they are studying. These topics will be studied over the coming term, leading to an assessment in November and December. The topics being studied are:

Drama - Witchcraft (Year 9)
Music -Music for Computer Games (Year 9)
Performing Arts - Chords and the Elements of Music (Year 7); Film Music (Year 8)
