As part of the Department for Education's working together to improve school attendance guidance we have been working closely with the Local Authority and other agencies to help support our young people and their families to help improve school attendance.

We fully understand that genuine illness happens. If your child is unwell enough to stay at home, please continue to keep us informed and ensure they return as soon as they are fit to do so. For minor ailments, tiredness, or winter cold symptoms, attending school where possible helps maintain routine and prevents students from falling behind.

Each half-term we give updates on a range of subjects. For this half term, it's English, Information Technology and Design and Technology

English

As we come to the end of our first term, the English Department is delighted to see students responding with enthusiasm and curiosity to our varied and challenging curriculum. From exploring powerful themes, introducing new texts and preparing for important assessments, we've seen some fantastic work completed.

Across Key Stage Three, our Year 7 students have been studying either Animal Farm by George Orwell or A Monster Calls by Patrick Ness - texts that offer rich opportunities for discussion and the exploration of themes such as power, friendship, courage, and the consequences of our choices. Tying in with Remembrance, Year 8 have been focusing on war poetry. Not only have we had some incredible creative writing, but students have been developing their analytical skills, exploring poet's intentions with emotional maturity and insight. Moving onto Year 9, students have been studying media and advertising, examining how language and image can shape, influence and sometimes, manipulate our perceptions of the world around us – all vital skills to become discerning consumers of the media.

At Key Stage Four, Year 10 have begun their study of Shakespeare's Macbeth and Dickens' A Christmas Carol, two of their GCSE Literature texts, whilst Year 11 have been working hard to prepare for their mock exams. Using the rubrics, lessons have focused on exam skill and revising key texts to ensure they feel as confident as possible. It's been excellent to see so many students making the most of our after school revision sessions and we look forward to seeing their continued progress as the new year unfolds!

Thanks, as always, goes to Mrs Whitworth in the library for offering so many wonderful opportunities for our learners and for always keeping shelves stocked with the latest releases. Students are strongly encouraged to select a book (or two!) to keep them occupied over the festivities.

As we head into the holidays, we are reminded of the words of Dickens from A Christmas Carol in that 'I have always thought of Christmas time... as a good time; a kind, forgiving, charitable, pleasant time' so we hope everyone has a relaxing break, ready for a successful Spring term.

SPOTLIGHT ON...

Each half-term we give updates on a range of subjects. For this half term, it's English, Information Technology and Design and Technology

Information Technology

Year 7

Our Year 7 students have been getting hands-on with Scratch programming, learning how to design interactive animations, games, and digital stories. They've explored key concepts such as sequencing, selection, and iteration while building confidence in thinking like real programmers.

Year 8

Year 8 have been diving into the world of binary, discovering how all digital data—text, images, sound, and more—is stored using only 1s and 0s. Students have converted numbers, experimented with pixel art, and learned why binary is the foundation of every computer system on the planet.

Year 9

Year 9 have been developing their Python skills using the TuringLab website FarmBot program, allowing them to practise writing real code and understand how commands control digital systems.

In line with the Academy whole school reading strategy, they were introduced to SNAKE reading, this took the form of a personalised story that incorporated many of our Computer Science Subject 60 Tier 3 words to strengthen both literacy and subject knowledge.

Key Stage 4

Our KS4 students have been preparing for their mock examinations. Once complete, students will receive a detailed Question Level Analysis (QLA) to help identify strengths, pinpoint gaps in their knowledge, and guide them on where to focus their revision. This targeted approach will support every student in working towards achieving their best possible grade in May.

Design and Technology

Engineering Design students in Year 11 have been producing engineering drawings of their own Photo Display designs. The 2025 R039 unit tasks students to design and create their own Photo Display that will hold at least two photographs and can be wall hung or be freestanding.

They produced a series of design ideas, developed their preferred option, then create formal engineering drawings, including 3rd angle Orthographic drawings and virtual 3D models. All Orthographic drawings had to be drawn to scale and include critical dimensions.

Food Technology

I'm excited to share an innovative learning experience our Year 8 students recently enjoyed. This term, we explored the concept of food miles—the distance food travels from farm to plate—and linked it to a practical cooking challenge: creating a DIY Big Mac in collaboration with our local McDonald's.


Students began by investigating where the ingredients for a Big Mac originate. From UK beef and dairy to lettuce often sourced from Spain, they discovered how global supply chains impact sustainability and the environment. This sparked discussions about reducing food miles and supporting local producers.

The highlight of the lesson was the hands-on activity: assembling their own Big Mac! Students prepared patties, layered fresh ingredients, and recreated the iconic burger while considering how each component contributes to environmental impact. The collaboration with McDonalds enabled us to create products with a low food mile but an authentic taste.

This engaging session combined practical skills, sustainability awareness, and real-world industry links, giving students a taste of both culinary creativity and environmental responsibility.

Resilience means not giving up, even when things are tough. This value links to attendance and mental health, encouraging everyone to keep going, show up, and support each other through challenges.


E - Equity


The last half-term has been spent working on individual scenes from the show. We have now completed all the work on the first act, and we will start the second act after the Christmas Break.

Seth has been skateboarding since 6 years old and has developed his talents to elite level, despite only being 11 years old, competing in national competitions in mostly open-age events.


His exceptional ability has been recognized by the Talented Athlete Scholarship Scheme (TASS) at Leeds Beckett University and Seth has already been accepted onto their scholarship scheme post Lightcliffe Academy which we are all extremely proud of and excited about.

Seth's talents have also been recognised at international level, in particular in the USA, where he has recently returned from Los Angeles after being invited to a host of prestigious skate competitions. 


