

SCHOOL UNIFORM UPDATES

At Bishop Young Academy, we believe that uniform is more than just clothing – it's a reflection of who we are as a community and an important part of fostering pride and unity within our school. It also helps prepare our students for life after school, where dressing smartly is often expected in professional settings.

After listening to feedback from our students and hearing a presentation from the Student Council to our Senior Leadership Team and Academy Governors, we are pleased to announce some updates to our uniform policy. These changes will take effect in September, but we'll be trialling them during the Summer Term to get valuable feedback from students, staff, and parents.

Here's a breakdown of the changes that will be introduced when students return from the Easter break:

- **Jewellery:** Students will now be allowed to wear one stud earring in each earlobe. In addition, the only other permitted jewellery will be a wristwatch and a simple cross and chain. Multiple earrings or nose piercings will not be allowed.
- Hair Colour: Students will be permitted to add one extra colour to their hair. For example, students who choose braids may have a natural colour along with one additional colour of their choice.
- Summer Uniform: Students will be able to wear the new pale blue branded BYA polo shirt as part of their summer uniform (please note, this is different from the polo shirt worn for PE). Starting on 1st May, students will have the option to wear either their regular uniform of jumper/blazer, shirt, and tie, or the new branded summer polo shirt. The polo shirt can be paired with jumpers or blazers if needed, but this will not be mandatory. This option is for the summer term only.
