The musical celebration of the nation's 200th birthday was written to accompany the 50 Conestoga wagons that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania presented to each state in the Union. Five companies traversed the continental United States, giving more than 2000 performances of the *Wagon Train Show* from June 1975 through August 1976. The five companies all converged at the Valley Forge Encampment on July 4, 1976.
