## **Christmas in Kentucky**

## for SATB Chorus with optional Oboe Poem by James Stephens (1880-1950) Music by Bruce Trinkley

James Stephens, Irish poet, novelist and political activist, was an ardent Irish Republican and wrote and spoke Gaelic. He became famous for his versions of Irish folktales and legends. He lived in Paris, London and Dublin, and in the 1930s was a friend of James Joyce. Between 1925 and 1935 he went almost annually to the United States, giving lectures and staying frequently with his friend, W. T. H. Howe, President of the American Book Company, who had a home in Freelands, Kentucky. Stephens wrote "Christmas in Freelands" either at the home of his friend or in memory of his frequent visits to Freelands. To musicians, Stephens is today probably best-known as the author of the texts to Samuel Barber's *Reincarnations*.

The composer has altered the title to a better known locale, "Christmas in Kentucky".

The Red-Bud, the Kentucky Tree, Bloomed the spring to life for me In Freelands; and the Mocking Bird, — Nimble chorister of glee, Sweet as poet ever heard In a world of ecstasy— Sang the summer, and the sun; Sang the summer in to me.

The spring is gone! The summer gone! The Cardinal has gone away! The fire-flies, dancing on the lawn, — Each a little moon at play— Are gone, with summer, gone away! And, where green acres were aglow, Daisy munches in the snow!
