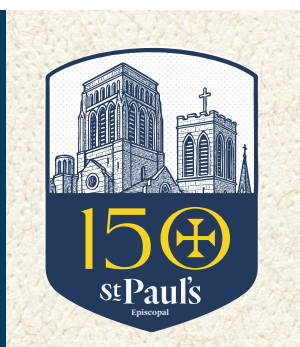

The Rev. Jane Patterson, PhD

Emerita Professor of New Testament at Seminary of the Southwest, Austin, TX, and Project Director for Collegeville Institute Seminars on Vocation & Disability and Vocation & Trauma. She has authored and/or contributed to several books and academic journals as well as a writing poetry and blogs. Dr. Patterson will be kicking off our Sesquicentennial by leading a retreat on January 23-24 on Paul as Mystic and then preaching the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul on Sunday, January 25.

The Very Rev. Andrew McGowan, PhD

Andrew McGowan is the Dean of Berkeley Divinity School, the Episcopal seminary School at Yale. He is an Anglican priest and historian from New Zealand whose scholarly work focuses on the life of early Christian communities, and on aspects of contemporary Anglicanism. He is author or editor of six books, a dynamic preacher, and publishes a popular weekly lectionary commentary, Andrew's Version at <https://abmcg.substack.com>.

The Most Reverend Michael B. Curry

(Bishop) Curry served as the 27th presiding bishop and primate of The Episcopal Church from June 2015 until 2024. The author of five books, a regular guest on national and international media outlets, and he is widely regarded as one of the most dynamic preachers of our time. Bishop Curry was named the 2018 religion newsmaker of the year by the Religion News Association.

The Rev. Canon Kelly Brown Douglas, PhD.

Dr. Douglas is the Canon Theologian at the Cathedral Church of St. Peter and St. Paul (also known as the National Cathedral). In 2017, she was named Dean of Episcopal Divinity School at Union Theological Seminary in New York, and her most recent book, "Resurrection Hope: A Future Where Black Lives Matter," was the 2023 winner of the Grawemeyer Award, one of the most prestigious prizes in religion.

The Rt. Rev. J. Neil Alexander, ThD.

A Winston-Salem native, bishop Alexander served as the ninth bishop of the Diocese of Atlanta from 2001-2012, after which he joined the faculty and served as dean and president of the School of Theology at The University of the South, Sewanee. He has published widely in the fields of liturgics, homiletics, sacramental theology, and pastoral practice. Currently, he serves as the Custodian for the Standard Book of Common Prayer for The Episcopal Church.
