Family Memorial of Remembrance

After the Israelites crossed the Jordan River, God asked them to create a memorial with twelve stones so they would always remember what He did that day. Take some time as a family to create a memorial for your home in order to remember significant things God has done for you.

As a family, talk through the ways God has been faithful to you and led you through good and difficult times. Print some photos or invite the kids to draw pictures that represent significant moments in the life of your family. Put the photos into a family album or create a collage on the fridge as a way to remember how God has been faithful in leading your family.



Who's the Leader?

God led Israel into the promised land, and He chose Joshua for a very specific leadership role. In your home, kids and adults often have different roles. Try switching things up for a little bit, so you can experience how to lead in different areas!

Consider inviting the kids to be in charge of preparing a meal for the whole family or doing the laundry if that's a role they don't normally have. Talk through the role and all the things they will need to consider in order to make the task a success. If the children are usually in charge of cleaning their rooms or taking care of the recycling, the adults can take on that responsibility for the day.

As you take on each other's roles, talk through what it means to lead in that area and how each member of the family is invited to lead in their own unique ways.
