Duncan Mcclellan

Duncan McClellan is a renowned glass artist and the founder of the Duncan McClellan Gallery (DMG) in St. Petersburg, Florida. His fascination with glass began at age five during a visit to a glass factory in West Virginia. After honing his skills in leather and clay, McClellan pursued glassblowing in Ybor City, Florida, in 1987. He furthered his studies at the ARS Studio in Murano, Italy, becoming the second American invited to work there.

In 2005, McClellan transformed a 7,800-square-foot former fish and tomato packing plant into the DMG, a vibrant space that includes exhibition galleries, a hot glass workshop, and lush sculpture gardens. The gallery showcases rotating exhibitions of nationally and internationally recognized glass artists and serves as a hub for community engagement and education. Through the DMG School Project, McClellan offers mentorship and workshops to artists and students, fostering a deeper appreciation for the art of glass.

Mary Reeser

One of the Old Northeast's most puzzling and talked-about mysteries is the story of Mary Hardy Reeser, a 67-year-old widow who lived in a small apartment at 1200 Cherry Street and mysteriously passed away in 1951 under unusual circumstances – seemingly a victim of spontaneous combustion: One summer night, Mary returned home after visiting family and settled into her favorite chair. By the next morning, she was gone, her favorite chair burnt to cinders. Few remains were found, while the rest of the apartment was strangely untouched by fire.

The case confused both local police and the FBI, who concluded she may have accidentally fallen asleep while smoking, though the limited damage around her chair left many questions unanswered. Over the years, her story gained national attention and became one of the most well-known cases linked to the idea of spontaneous human combustion—a highly debated theory suggesting the human body could catch fire without an obvious cause.

While science generally disputes this, the case has remained unsolved, and some say Mary's kind spirit might still linger in the neighborhood, remembered not only for the mystery surrounding her death, but for the gentle presence she left behind.

Old Bill

Old Bill the Alligator, a longtime feature in a curio shop near St. Petersburg's Mirror Lake Park, became an unlikely witness to a dark and often overlooked chapter in the city's history. In 1914, just steps from where he sat on display, a Black man named John Evans was lynched by a white mob without trial or justice. For years, the story of Evans' brutal death was buried, left out of official narratives and public memory. Old Bill, as a symbol of the park and its past, now represents more than local nostalgia—he stands near the very site where violence and racial terror once went unacknowledged. As the truth about Evans' lynching comes to light, Old Bill becomes a silent reminder of the history hidden in plain sight and the need to confront it with honesty.

Peter Demens

Peter Demens, born Pytor A. Dementyev in Russia, played a pivotal role in Florida's early development despite living there for only eight years. Raised in privilege and trained as a military officer, Demens fled Russia in 1881 due to political persecution or possibly scandal—and settled in Central Florida. There, he became a successful entrepreneur, building structures for Rollins College and gaining control of the Orange Belt Railway after a series of financial setbacks. He extended the railway to the Gulf Coast and named the final stop St. Petersburg, after his childhood home in Russia, laying the foundation for the city's development. Though he left Florida in 1889 and later aided Russian immigrants in California, Demens is remembered as one of St. Petersburg's founding figures, commemorated at Demens Landing Park.

Jack Kerouac

Jack Kerouac, iconic author of On the Road and a leading voice of the Beat Generation, spent the final years of his life in St. Petersburg, Florida. He moved there in the 1960s with his mother and third wife, seeking a quieter life away from the literary spotlight. Kerouac lived in a modest home in a suburban neighborhood, far from the bohemian scenes he once thrived in. Despite his fame, his time in St. Pete was marked by personal struggles, declining health, and increasing isolation, fueled by alcoholism. He died there in 1969 at the age of 47. Today, Kerouac's former home has become a quiet landmark for fans and literary pilgrims, symbolizing both his enduring legacy and the tragic end of a restless, groundbreaking writer. A friend to Mary Reeser; they were neighbors. Courage by Jack Kerouac was written around 1942 but not published until 2011.

Cora & Cornelius, The Mystery Monkey Of Tampa Bay

The "Mystery Monkey of Tampa Bay" was a wild rhesus macaque that roamed the Tampa Bay region for several years, eluding capture and captivating locals with its audacity and near-mythical status. Nicknamed "Cornelius" after his eventual capture, the monkey was known to rummage through trash, scale rooftops, and even bite a resident events that turned him into a local celebrity with Facebook followers and media attention. In October 2012, after a multi-year pursuit, wildlife officials finally subdued him via tranquilizer dart and took him into guarantine, where he was evaluated and later readied for relocation to a sanctuary or wildlife facility. Cornelius's story raises important questions about invasive species, human-animal interaction, and the ethics of how we handle nonnative wildlife found in residential settings. His mate, named in Weird in St. Pete as "Cora," was a female rhesus macaque whom zoo officials relocated to serve as a companion for the famous solo primate.
