Transition Security Project follows the money from defence ministries to the investors that own military contractors, analyses the greenhouse gas emissions and resource demands of military spending, and commissions research on how US and UK military interventions threaten geopolitical stability.

Working alongside trade unions, grassroots movements and policymakers, Transition Security Project designs alternatives from place-based proposals for military industrial conversion to security strategies that prioritise everyday, universal safety over the profits of military contractors.

Researcher for Transition Security Project: Overview

Transition Security Project's new researcher will be part of a four-person transatlantic staff team working at the cutting edge of economic, climate and geopolitical analysis on militarisation. The precise research focus of the role will depend on the experience and background of the successful candidate.

In collaboration with the Transition Security team and its network of twenty-two fellows — all of whom are leaders in their fields — you will support the development of research and policy across our programmes. You will conduct high-quality qualitative and/or quantitative research, contribute to policy development, and produce outputs such as reports, briefings, articles, or multimedia content. You will engage with policy, political, trade union, social movement and media audiences to disseminate our work.

The ideal candidate will bring a mix of analytical rigour, creativity and political awareness, and be committed to building a more democratic and sustainable economy.

This role is at the core of our research team, offering the opportunity to help shape Transition Security Project's agenda and contribute to real-world change.

As with all roles at Common Wealth, this position involves working collaboratively and flexibly within a small team, and you may be asked to contribute across projects or areas beyond your core responsibilities.
