

The Weekly Vine – Produce Market Update November 7 thru 14, 2025

Overview & Key Themes

- Seasonal transitions are in full swing as many commodities shift from California coastal regions to
 desert and Mexican growing areas, and from domestic to import programs in Central and South
 America.
- Inconsistent weather patterns—including unseasonably warm temperatures in the desert Southwest and intermittent tropical rains in Mexico and Central America—are impacting field conditions and causing variable sizing and shorter shelf-life in tender items.
- Thanksgiving pull is well underway, with heavy retail and foodservice demand focused on celery, green beans, potatoes, onions, and holiday herbs, while citrus and root vegetables see steady momentum.
- Cross-border delays continue to influence short-term availability on Mexican vegetables and tropical fruit.

Fruit & Citrus

Apples	Excellent; new-crop fruit from WA and MI in full swing. Demand strongest on Honeycrisp, Fuji, and Gala.	Large sizes dominate; smaller fruit commands premiums. Outstanding crunch and flavor.
Avocados	Mexico remains primary source; market trending slightly higher due to strong holiday demand.	Good internal oil content; 48ct–60ct most available. Rain may cause occasional harvest interruptions.
Bananas	Supply consistent from Ecuador and Costa Rica. Pricing steady.	Ripening uniform; minor cosmetic issues from humid ports but overall quality good.
Grapefruit	Texas and California Marsh Ruby supplies strong.	Excellent color and internal sugars; mostly 40s–48s.
Limes	Supply tight; smaller fruit dominates due to excess rainfall.	Predominantly 230s–250s with occasional rind oil spotting. Market firm.
Oranges	Early California Navels increasing; Valencia season finished.	Navels trending small (88s–113s), high sugars and excellent taste; sizing expected to improve later in November.
Cantaloupe	Transition complete to Mexico crops; market firm.	High sugar levels; very clean interiors. Volume remains moderate.
Honeydew	Mexican production steady; slight price uptick.	Good sugars and flesh quality; minor wind scarring. Sizes 6s–8s.

Watermelon	Mexican regions producing well; market steady to higher.	Flavor strong; variable external appearance, occasional hollow heart.
Pineapple	Tight supplies from Costa Rica after extended rainfall.	Excellent flavor but increased external scarring and crown rot risk; prices remain strong.

Tomatillos	Remain extremely tight; limited	Variable color and softness; handle

Onions	Good storage crop; weather slowing late harvest in NW.	Clean internal quality; some external staining.
Potatoes	Russets steady; sweet potatoes in peak demand.	Excellent internal quality; minor scurf on sweets.
Squash (Yellow/Zucchini)	Mexico producing steadily.	Strong color, occasional scarring from wind.

***** Berries

- Strawberries California nearly finished; desert and Mexican volumes increasing slowly. Quality fair with smaller fruit and occasional softness due to warm nights.
- Raspberries Short supply; market firm to very high. Mexican fruit improving but limited.
- **Blueberries** Imports from Peru, Argentina, and Chile increasing. Market easing slightly. Flavor good; sizing mixed.
- Blackberries Excellent quality from Mexico; consistent supply and color.

iii Outlook (Next Few Weeks)

- Lettuce and leafy greens will remain tight until desert volumes reach full stride around mid- to late-November.
- Celery, herbs, and green beans expected to see continued upward pressure as Thanksgiving approaches.
- Citrus sizing should gradually improve by late November; sugars remain strong.
- Pineapple and limes may face intermittent shortages if Central American rainfall continues.
- Root vegetables and potatoes in peak condition for storage and seasonal promotions.
- Expect **freight costs** to edge up slightly through the holiday period as demand for trucks increases.
