

# The Weekly Vine – Produce Market Update December 5 - 11, 2025

## Overview & Key Themes — December 5, 2025

- New Desert-region (CA/AZ) production is increasing but still below seasonal norms, keeping leafy greens and tender-leaf items tight and quality mixed.
- Mexico's fall programs (veg + tropicals) continue expanding, but **recent humidity + cool nights** are producing **variable sizing and external scarring** in sensitive items.
- Imports from Peru, Chile, Central Mexico, and offshore continue building for grapes, berries, and winter melons, helping stabilize volume.
- **Holiday demand** remains elevated across celery, potatoes (especially sweet potatoes), winter squash, Brussels sprouts, and storage onions.
- Freight/logistics are volatile: increased port activity, border wait times (Laredo/San Diego), and early-winter weather disruptions are contributing to occasional delays — tropical fruit and Mexican veg especially affected.

#### Fruit & Citrus

Apples	Ample overall; larger profiles most available	High sugar and crispness; premium Honeycrisp/Cosmic Crisp strong. Small sizes remain tighter.
Avocados	Strong supplies from Mexico, prices lower.	Good dry matter; consistent ripening. Occasional lenticel spotting from recent humidity.
Bananas	Steady volume from Central America	Ripening uniform; minor peel freckles from transit moisture but no major defects.
Grapefruit	Good CA/TX availability; markets stable	Good color and internal sweetness; normal size distribution.
Limes	Tighter availability; pricing higher	Weather impacts; thinner skins = higher dehydration risk. Handle cold-chain carefully.
Oranges (Navels)	CA harvest expanding; supply improving weekly	Excellent sugars; sizing leaning mid-to-large. Some early-season puffiness but improving.
Cantaloupe	Imports + Mexico supporting supply	Good brix overall; some surface scarring and color inconsistency from moisture.
Honeydew	Volume improving from Mexico	Flesh quality solid; occasional external blemishes and sugar spotting.

Asparagus	Peru steady; Mexico slowly increasing	Slightly smaller sizing; some knuckling from past moisture events.			
Bell Peppers	Western supply moderate; Mexico improving	Good color; sizing still variable. Green bells tighter than colored.			
Jalapeño & Poblano	Still <b>tight</b> ; prices elevated	Mixed sizing; pale shoulders and tender tips from cool nights.			
Broccoli	Limited; pricing elevated	Pin rot, hollow stem, and rain-related defects continue.			
Cauliflower	Very tight; markets extremely firm	Undersized heads, leaf intrusion, and weather blemishes persistent.			
Brussels Sprouts	Very tight supplies, high prices continue.	Smaller sizing; some insect scarring and internal spotting.			
Celery	Good holiday-driven demand; supply moderate	Mild fringe burn common			
Carrots	Adequate and stable	Firm, good color; no major issues. Still promotable.			
Spinach / Tender Leaf / Cilantro / Arugula	Very limited availability	Leaf burn, small leaf profiles, lower weights, and weather-related defects linger.			
Lettuce (All Types)	Desert transition slow; supply limited	Light heads, rib discoloration, tip burn, uneven weights — especially on hearts/value-added.			
Tomatoes (All Types)	Florida light; Mexico improving; <mark>markets slightly</mark> <mark>elevated</mark>	Good color; occasional pressure bruising and softness on Romas.			
Green Onions	Gradually improving	Some tip burn; sizing improving week-overweek as desert fields strengthen.			
Mushrooms	Balanced; steady markets	Uniform size/quality; no supply disruptions.

#### • Berries

#### Strawberries

- Supply very tight.
- CA nearly finished; Mexico increasing but behind pace from earlier weather delays. Florida berries starting, should help availability
- Markets remain high; sizing inconsistent, occasional bruising and white shoulders.

## Raspberries

- Mexico (Baja + C. Mexico) improving; markets firm but stable.
- Quality generally good; some lots with softer fruit from humidity.

#### **Blueberries**

- Peru and early Chile shipments stabilizing supply; Mexico gaining momentum.
- Pricing easing; flavor generally good.
- Some size variation between import regions.

#### **Blackberries**

- Mexico remains strong supplier; consistent volume.
- Quality solid with good firmness; occasional red cell from transit swings.

### Outlook (Next Few Weeks)

Leafy Greens & Tender Leaf:

Supply remains strained until desert yields fully normalize — likely **mid-December**, weather permitting.

• Holiday/Winter Vegetables:

Good supply on storage crops (potatoes, onions, squash, carrots).

Brussels sprouts and cauliflower will remain tight through mid-December.

Citrus & Tropical Fruits:

CA navels improving; expect stable pricing.

Limes/pineapples likely remain tight as Central American weather impacts continue.

Berries:

Blueberries improving via imports; raspberries and blackberries steady.

Strawberries remain volatile until Mexico + Florida volume expands.

• Freight/Logistics:

Expect periodic delays from port congestion, border traffic, and early-season storms impacting transit times — particularly for **Mexican veg**, **berries**, **and tropical fruit**.
