DECEMBER PROGRAM UPDATES

In the first week of November, we kicked off our first Learning Circles of the 2025–2026 cohort. As part of the Refugee and Immigrant Well-being Project (RIWP), Learning Circles begin each year in November, bringing together UNM students and newcomer families for cultural exchange and one-on-one learning.

By December, families and students had begun building deeper, more meaningful relationships through shared activities such as the River of Life, where participants reflected on and shared their life experiences.

The group also engaged in cultural exchange sessions exploring how winter holidays are celebrated around the world. In addition, families learned more about Know Your Rights and discussed recent changes in immigration policies.



Tea Circle | New Mexico Immigrant Workforce Study

During November's Tea Circle, UVNR partnered with the UNM Health Sciences Center on the New Mexico Immigrant Workforce Study, an effort spearheaded by the Department of Workforce Solution's Office of New Americans. The study aimed at understanding and improving the workforce experiences of newcomers across the state. As part of the New Mexico Immigrant Workforce Study, UVNR held focus groups during our Tea Circle to better understand participants' professional journeys. Community members shared their work and training experiences before arriving in the U.S., the challenges they face in finding employment or using their skills upon arrival, and the types of support that would help them continue in their chosen fields. The insights gathered will inform future programs, partnerships, and policy efforts aimed at strengthening workforce pathways for immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers across NM.

In November, YCAC hosted a session centered on Thanksgiving and gratitude, where participants made gratitude jars, talked about how gratitude is linked to mental health, created cards for their families and friends, and took part in a Gingerbread Team

On December 13 and 14, UVNR hosted a gift-wrapping booth at the Rail Yards Holiday Market, and it was a great success thanks to our dedicated volunteers. The event provided a meaningful opportunity to connect with new community members, share information about UVNR's work, and engage in thoughtful conversations about supporting newcomers. Operating on a donations-only basis, the booth raised over \$260 to directly support UVNR's programs and services. The weekend also strengthened our relationship with the City department that manages the Rail Yards, and we are excited to be invited back for future events, including the Rail Yards Valentine's Market this February. Thank you to our volunteers, donors, and community supporters for helping turn holiday generosity into lasting impact.




Supporting Families Through The Diaper Project
