

Growing in Worship

remember my early days as a worshiper, sitting in the back row of the sanctuary with my two sisters and mother (because of my mother's claustrophobia). At that time, Dad was often away doing pulpit supply, so it fell to Mom to wrangle the children. I gave my focus to filling in every letter "o" in the printed bulletin. Then would come the long-awaited moment when Mom would give us a piece of Beemans chewing gum—a special treat to make worship more palatable. But interesting things were happening around me: people singing, people praying, people standing and sitting, people listening, ushers passing offering plates through the rows. I was absorbing more than I knew.

Another memory of worship as a child washes over me. I am older now, probably around 12. Dad is now in the picture. Worship has become more attractive. I am in the front row of the balcony with him and my sister, Marcia, because that somehow was a fun place to be, looking down on the other worshipers. I am singing the hymns robustly (no doubt a bit louder than polite), and Dad is cheering me on, telling me how much he enjoys hearing the voices of his children.

The years roll by, and now I am in high school. I am attending worship by myself at a different church. I am there because I want to be. I especially enjoy the preaching of Pastor Conrad who opens the text for me in ways I had never experienced before. It is powerful. It is life-changing.

Now I am an adult at the National Gathering of ECO at First Presbyterian Church of Greenville, South Carolina. Hundreds are gathered in the sanctuary. We are singing "Behold, Our God" along with a huge choir, orchestra, piano, and organ. Tears are streaming down my cheeks. I sense the Holy Spirit filling that space.

All along I was growing in worship. I was growing in my understanding of worship. I was growing in my enjoyment of worship. I was growing in what I gave to the Lord and others in worship. How did this happen?

It happened because I had an advocate. My mother faithfully brought me to worship, even when I was squirmy. For those without a church home, or for those without church experience, coming to worship can take great courage. For whom can you be an advocate? Is there someone whom "you can bring on your arm" (to borrow a phrase from Don Everts)?

It happened because I had a teacher. My father helped me go deeper into the elements of worship. He encouraged me to find my voice (literally). He showed me the beauty of coming into the Lord's presence with singing, "making a joyful noise" (Psalm 100).

It happened because of the ministry of the Holy Spirit. The Word proclaimed crackled with life as the Spirit opened my mind and heart to deeper levels of understanding and application. The Holy Spirit helped me worship in spirit and truth (John 4:23). The Holy Spirit helped me gaze upon the beauty of the Lord (Psalm 27:4).

How wonderful that we can grow in worship and help others to do the same! It is our destiny to be a people at worship, joining "with every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and in the sea, and all that is in them," to say, "To him who sits on the throne and to the Lamb be blessing and honor and glory and might forever and ever!" (Revelation 5:13).

s a child, the Nativity scene fascinated me. My mom, in all her preschool teacher expertise, created a Nativity scene I could play with. It gave a beautiful soundtrack to the true story of Emmanuel, God with us (which was now a musical). It was joy-producing to invite others to enter the story of Christmas.

It was no surprise then, when I began working at Hope Church in Children's Ministry, that it was important to me to continue the touchable Nativity experience and invite the kids at Hope Church to enter the story of Jesus together. For years I have been blessed to lead in this ministry of Christmas Story-Telling at the Community Christmas

Celebration and on Christmas Eve. Every year I find myself in the story again, and I am eager to find a spot for others in the story too!

Looking back at my childhood, I see how God used the touchable Nativity scene for my growing up in him. He used this hands-on Nativity to grow my love for his story and give me the creative freedom to not only enter it but find ways I could invite others to enter it with me! It has been the deep joy of my life to be in ministry and reveal the story of God through community participation. The touchable Nativity is for all ages. We will never outgrow God's story!

Worship in Word and Deed

n September, I (Hilary) gave a training to our Sunday morning volunteers about what it means to grow in worship, even when what you're doing may not seem like "worship." I sat down with Stacey Gibbs, who coordinates the café on Sunday mornings, to talk more.

Hilary: In our training, I talked about how growing up in worship for me meant learning that worship is not just music. In my job as a worship leader, there are a lot of other things I do, so I had to learn how to worship in everything.

Stacey: It was a relief to hear that serving in the café is worship too. It was a kind of reset for me.

Hilary: Both things can be true, you can worship God in a worship service and while serving.

Stacey: Yeah. It's all about community. Being together at church gives a certain structure and learning in community. Whether it's in a church service or at the café, we're making space for people to feel welcome or just fed or loved. Because that's what we really need.

Hilary: Absolutely. We want people to be connected in community, both with God and with each other. How has thinking about service as a form of worship impacted you and your team?

Stacey: I think anytime you learn these little nuggets about your faith, it allows you to refocus and just be more present to the people around you. And it reminded me of the importance of the team of people around me in the café. Whether we're sitting in a pew or in the kitchen, being around people of faith rubs off.

Hilary: There's something that happens when we get together with other Christians.

Stacey: It's re-centering for me. Certainly serving in the café isn't a substitute for worshiping God in the sanctuary or PWC, but it's cool to see that you can worship in different spaces in different ways. And it doesn't always have to be church-based. How can I worship God in my job during the week? I want to be the same person during the week that I am at church.

Hilary: I totally agree. Worship isn't limited to Sunday mornings. We can turn any moment into a time to worship and glorify God. Thanks for talking, Stacey!

Worship in the Midst

t the end of last summer, I felt like God was finally answering my prayers for a long term career solution. After over a decade of wandering through various industries and trying to find a good fit, I felt like God was finally delivering it. For the first time in our 12 years of marriage, I asked our young family to move away from family and across the country for what felt like God's provision. When I joined my new employer, I felt like I was walking down the red carpet. With a setup like that, you know what's coming. In September, a little over a month later, my employment was terminated. I'll never forget that call. I felt like the pit in my stomach was big enough to swallow me whole.

I won't gloss over the fact that this was a tremendously difficult time. I felt like I put my family up as collateral for this move, and I couldn't pay up. Man's best laid plans, as they say. Honestly, it wasn't until I became gainfully employed again that I felt I had passed the point of inflection in recovering my emotional wellness. But in the midst of it, I encountered a rare opportunity to worship our Lord in a special way.

We often—if not always—think of worship as musical offerings to God (cue Psalm 40:6). And coming from the guy at the piano, you probably expected just that. But no, the opportunity I share with you here was to glorify God in my friendships. In this incredibly trying time, I reached out to numerous Christian friends of mine and asked them to pray for us and encourage us. This was no glamorous attempt to loudly proclaim that we were trusting that God, in his infinite goodness, would surely deliver us from this trial. For all we knew, we might have to sell our house that we just

bought and painted and decorated and got the girls adjusted to and move somewhere else. I cringe at the platitude of "everything happens for a reason." But in retrospect, I'm so glad that we gave our friends the opportunity to surround us in their prayers and that we, in the middle of our flailing for what normalcy we could hold on to, reminded ourselves and our friends that God was still the center of our lives. We remembered that God would be with us, even if our troubles should increase.

So, take this as an encouragement that while, yes, worship does look like corporate singing and, yes, it does look like evangelizing on the city streets, it also looks like a simple, confident declaration to your own network that God is at the center of your life.

We were trusting that God, in his infinite goodness, would surely deliver us from this trial.

PNC Progress Report: Listening, Discerning, and Trusting God's Timing

Thank you for your continued prayers, encouragement, and patience as the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) moves forward in this season of discernment. It's been a time of prayerful listening and faithful teamwork. We continue to see God's hand guiding each step.

Thank you as well for your thoughtful responses to the congregational survey. Your input was an important step in identifying the strengths of Hope Church, our areas for growth, and the qualities we hope for in our next pastor.

In addition to the survey, the PNC hosted focus groups to listen more closely to voices across our congregation—especially among staff, young families, and session members. Together with the survey these conversations have given us a rich picture of who we are as a congregation and how God is shaping our preferred future.

All of this input has helped us build the foundation for two key documents: our church profile and lead pastor position description. These materials reflect Hope's heart and our shared vision to go deeper with Jesus, wider in the kingdom, and closer in community.

Next, we'll submit these documents for approval to the Session and Presbytery. Once they are approved, our Opportunity Profile will be posted publicly on sites including the ECO Job Board, EPC Job Board (a global movement of evangelical Presbyterian churches) and Hope's website. We are beginning to prepare for the application review and interview processes.

As we move forward, please continue to pray for discernment and unity for our team and for the pastor God is already preparing to join us.

Hope has always been, and will continue to be, a church that listens for God's voice and follows where he leads. We are trusting that the same Spirit who has guided us is already preparing the next chapter of Hope's story.

May we wait with hope, pray with faith, and walk together in love as we trust God's perfect timing.

Year-End Giving Tips & Requests

ecember is always a busy month for completing gifts to family, friends, and of course Hope Church. Here are some tips to avoid confusion and making sure the gift is recorded in the intended calendar year.

- 1. Include the correct date on all checks, and make sure it is delivered or in the mail by December 31.
- 2. Include the gift designation in the memo line of each check. Every year, some members wish to pay on their 2026 pledge early. The Hope office can document the receipt in 2025 (for income tax reporting) and apply it to the 2026 pledge, but they need written instructions to make it happen.
- 3. Gifts of marketable stock, direct IRA donations (QCDs), or gifts from trusts or donor advised funds require extra time to accomplish by year-end. Please instruct your investment advisor early in December. A call to Kim Laufenburger at Hope Church (612-866-4055, ext. 3137) is the best way to safely document such special donations.


