▲ Farmers Reject Net Zero & the Paris Accord

- 94% say being in the Paris Accord is not in NZ's best interest.
- 95% say NZ should abandon Net Zero by 2050.
- 90% disagree that NZ should remain a signatory to the Paris Accord.
- 71% are "not at all confident" NZ agriculture can survive climate policy pressures.

Farmers Say Climate Policy Will Harm NZ's Economy

• **87%** say Paris Accord compliance will **negatively or very negatively affect** farm profitability in the next 10 years.

NZ Farmers Slam the Paris Accord.

This major independent farmer survey reveals overwhelming rejection of the Paris Accord.

These results reflect a growing rural sentiment that current climate policies are out of step with economic realities and farming needs.

This landmark survey sends an unequivocal message: New Zealand farmers feel ignored, overburdened, and economically threatened by current climate strategies. Farmers are calling for a shift away from ideology-driven targets and toward grounded, practical environmental action that aligns with rural values and realities.

ECONOMIC & SOCIAL IMPACTS BEING FELT NOW

Carbon Forestry Taking Over Rural NZ

- 48% say carbon farming conversions are negatively impacting their district.
- Areas like Pongaroa/Akitio and Taumarunui are seeing shrinking communities, job losses, and rising pests.

New Zealand farmers are calling for a **rethink** of climate policies that they believe are economically damaging, socially destructive, and disconnected from practical, local solutions.

Disconnect With Industry Leadership

One question remains: Who truly represents grassroots farmers?

Despite clear opposition to the Paris Accord from farmers themselves, levy organisations and sector leaders continue to endorse these commitments. Many farmers now feel abandoned by the very groups meant to advocate on their behalf.

FARMER FEEDBACK

Let's not forget that agriculture is the backbone of our economy. Hear what real New Zealand farmers have to say:

"Bottom line!! Listen to the farmers. Let's not pretend here that we would be in one great big mess without the food security which we currently hold in New Zealand to very high standard.

The pines are killing the soil for 60 odd years! No to trees that won't allow the land to reproduce!

Unsubstantiated science claims. Political alliances that are best for their egos and list of acclaimed success. Politics should not interfere with farmers and their ability to find a solution to problems. Farmers are not being listened to.

A very simple race to the bottom.

Net zero is the de-industrialisation of the world.

Neighbours have planted in pines. Our land value has increased as a result of the high prices being paid increasing our rates. Pests also becoming a problem,

The nonsensical thinking of certain "Out of touch" left and right wing parties within our I'll not call them leadersadministrators is a more fitting description.
