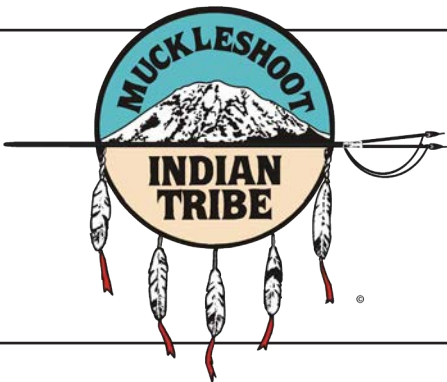

Muckleshoot Supports Home Team Harvest with \$50,000 Donation

... At this year's Home Team Harvest event hosted by Northwest Harvest, the Muckleshoot Tribe contributed \$50,000 to support hunger relief efforts across the region. Councilmembers Virginia Cross and Anita Mitchell attended the event on behalf of the Tribe.

Muckleshoot has partnered with Northwest Harvest for nearly 25 years supporting efforts to address hunger and food access for families throughout King County. The tribe also contributes to food banks and hunger relief programs throughout the year recognizing that access to food is foundational to health dignity and community wellbeing.

As Seattle's Host Tribe Muckleshoot continues to step forward in caring for people beyond their own community. The \$50,000 donation reflects both a long standing partnership and an ongoing commitment to taking care of people today and for future generations.



Federal Way Lightrail Expansion

The Sound Transit Federal Way light rail extension opened Dec. 6, expanding regional transit access in South King County.

Vice Chairman John Daniels Jr. attended the opening and offered remarks. Eli Nelson represented the Tribe's canoe family and sang a song for those who came to see this historic expansion.



Indigenous Peoples’ Night Hosted by Muckleshoot Indian Tribe at Seattle Kraken Game

SEATTLE — On Dec. 16 Muckleshoot Indian Tribe hosted Indigenous Peoples’ Night with the Seattle Kraken at the Climate Pledge Arena. It was a reminder that Native peoples are still here.

Members representing the Muckleshoot Canoe Family opened the night with song, welcoming fans and setting the tone for the evening. The opening reflected the continued presence of Indigenous culture and community in this region.

The night was part of Muckleshoot’s ongoing partnership with the Seattle Kraken, which has created space for Indigenous

visibility and representation in professional sports. Hosting Indigenous Peoples’ Night continues that work and strengthens the relationship between the Tribe and the organization.

For Muckleshoot, hosting the night meant showing up in a public space and being visible. It was an opportunity to acknowledge the Tribe’s connection to this place and to remind the broader community that Native people remain present today.

The event brought Indigenous presence into Climate Pledge Arena in a visible and meaningful way.

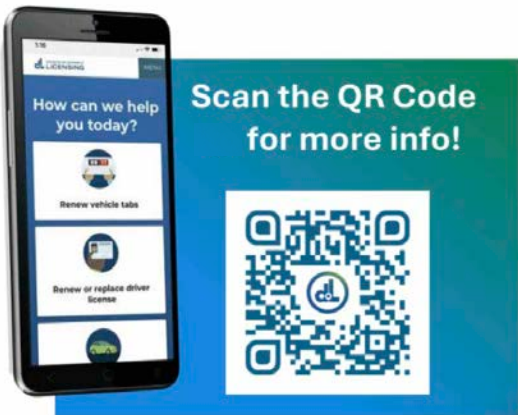

Tacoma City Ballet Donates Tickets to the Muckleshoot Tribal Community

Tacoma City Ballet donated 250 tickets on Dec. 12, to members of the Muckleshoot Tribal community offering families and youth the opportunity to experience ballet and the performing arts together.

The donation reflects a desire to build stronger relationships with Native communities and to create opportunities for Indigenous families to experience the arts. Under the leadership of Erin Ceragioli, executive and artistic director of Tacoma City Ballet and director of the Tacoma City Ballet School, the organization continues to explore ways to expand access and participation.

Ceragioli has shared her respect for Indigenous history in ballet and her admiration for the legacy of Maria Tallchief, the first Native American prima ballerina and one of The Five Moons who helped shape American ballet. Inspired by that history, she introduced an annual Indigenous Peo-



ples’ Night during The Nutcracker in 2024 with the hope of encouraging Indigenous youth and families to see themselves reflected in the art form and to consider participating in ballet.

In addition to the ticket donation, Tacoma City Ballet has begun offering free ballet classes to Indigenous youth who are interested in learning the art form, helping remove financial barriers and create

welcoming entry points. Ceragioli often speaks to the lifelong value of ballet, emphasizing that it teaches discipline, perseverance, and confidence qualities that stay with students throughout their lives.

Through these efforts, Tacoma City Ballet continues to open doors, build relationships, and support access to the arts in ways that are respectful, intentional, and community focused.

Always read and follow your car seat and vehicle instructions for proper use and installation of your car seat.

AAP RECOMMENDATIONS

RCW 46.61.687

1



Children should ride in a rear-facing car seat as long as possible until they reach the height or weight maximum of the car seat.

Children up to age 2 must be properly secured in a rear-facing car seat.

2



Children should ride in a forward-facing car seat, with a harness, until they reach the height or weight maximum of the car seat.

Children ages 2-4 years must ride in a car seat with a harness (rear or forward facing).

3



Children should use a booster seat until the vehicle lap-and-shoulder belt fit correctly. Most children will need a booster seat until they are between 8-12 years old.

Children 4 and older must ride in a car or booster seat until they are 4'9" tall.

4



All passengers should buckle up safely for every ride.

Children over height 4'9" must be secured by a properly fitted seat belt (typically starting at 8-12 years old).

Under 13?

Per WA State Law, all children under 13 years old should ride in the backseat, when practical to do so.



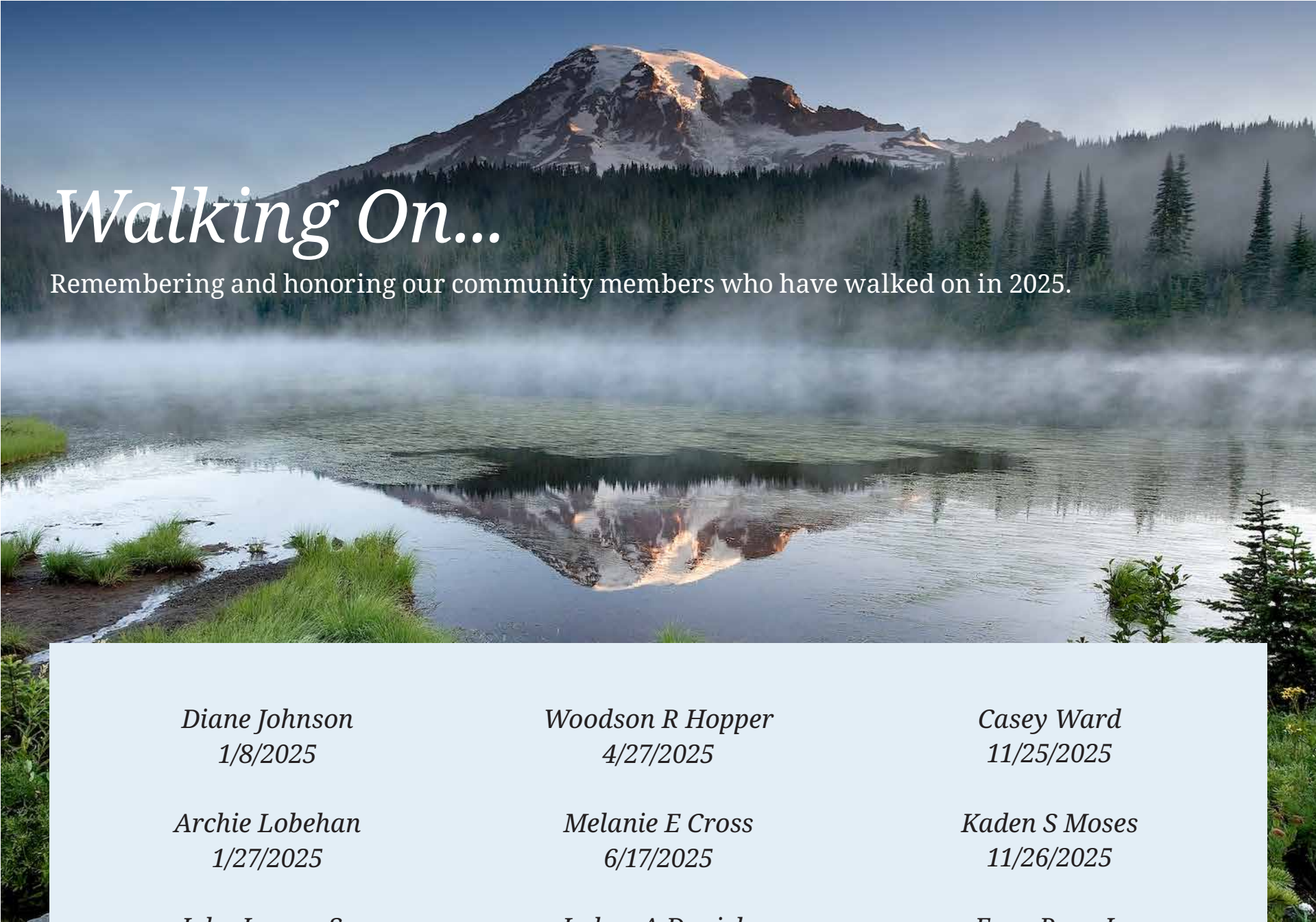
