Our Own Tribal Council Member, Anita Mitchell, Has Been Recognized as Part of the 2026 Native American 40 Under 40 Class

MUCKLESHOOT — The Native American 40 Under 40 award honors Indigenous leaders under the age of 40 from across the United States who are carrying forward the work of their people through leadership, service and commitment to community. Recipients are nominated by their peers and selected for the impact they are making today and the responsibility they carry for future generations.

Mitchell currently serves as Treasurer on the Muckleshoot Tribal Council. In this role, she participates in tribal governance, actively fighting for and protecting tribal sovereignty, managing resources and continuously paving the way for our future generations.

Elected to Tribal Council at the age of 26 and sworn in at 27, Mitchell has continued to serve her people in multiple leadership roles. Her service includes time as Vice Chair during the early development of the Tribe’s Economic Development Branch, known today as the Muckleshoot Development Corporation. She has also served on the Native American Rights Fund Board of Directors, sits on Washington State’s MMI-W/P Task Force and is a champion for the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA). Mitchell is also the first Muckleshoot tribal member to become a bar-certified attorney.

Mitchell said the recognition is both personal and humbling.

“It is such an honor to be recognized by my peers through the nomination and to be selected by other Native leaders I look up to,” Mitchell said. “Personally, I wish I could share this moment with loved ones who have gone on, because they have truly been my inspiration throughout the years. Professionally, it feels like I still have more work to do before being awarded but am blessed that others see the work I have put in.”

She also shared advice for those stepping into leadership roles.

“Always look at the whole forest when trying to help your people. Lead with a leadership mindset that uplifts others, instead of a political mindset that you know best. Stay humble and keep your loved ones close.”

Originally postponed due to recent flooding, the reception brought together elected officials, community partners, and guests for an evening centered on relationship building and collaboration.

Guests gathered and enjoyed a shared meal while connecting with one another in a relaxed and welcoming setting. The evening included special appearances by the Seattle Mariners Moose and the Running Salmon,

adding energy and celebration to the event.

Chairman Jaison Elkins welcomed guests and spoke to the significance of gathering together on the ancestral homelands. His remarks reflected the Tribe's enduring presence and commitment to working alongside neighboring governments and regional partners.

The program was emceed by Madrienne White, who guided the evening's program. Members of the Canoe Family led the gathering with songs, grounding the reception in culture and tradition. The event opened with prayer by Warren King George.

Members of Muckleshoot Tribal Council were also in attendance, including Councilmember Jessica Garcia-Jones and Vice Chair John Daniels Jr., along with local dignitaries and officials.

Throughout the evening, guests shared conversation and strengthened connections that support ongoing collaboration across the region. The Tribe is grateful to all who attended and looks forward to welcoming partners again at its next Legislative Reception later this year.





Laura Rudert joins Muckleshoot as Chief Operating Officer

MUCKLESHOOT — When Laura Rudert talks about leadership, she does not start with titles or credentials. She starts with people. With community. With responsibility to those who come next.

“I don’t see this work as just about the people today,” Rudert said. “I see it as about future generations.”

That perspective has shaped her 24-year career in public service and is what ultimately brought her to the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe, where she recently began her role as Chief Operating Officer.

Rudert brings experience across federal government, philanthropy, global development, and climate resilience work. She previously served as a senior executive with the Millennium Challenge Corporation, a federal agency focused on poverty reduction and economic growth through large scale infrastructure investments. Through that work, she helped support projects ranging from schools and roads to public financial management systems, often in places where strong governance and community trust were essential.

She later joined the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, where she supported global advocacy strategy and managed operations for teams working across the world. More recently, she founded her own consulting firm, Partners for Reimagined Economies, focused on climate resilience and equity. Her work included partnerships with the World Bank, Clean Air Fund, Seattle Public Utilities, and supporting the Muscogee Creek Nation in Oklahoma.

Across all of that experience, one thing consistently stood out to her.

“One of the most important ingredients for success is community,” Rudert said. “I’ve seen that everywhere I’ve worked.”

That understanding is what made coming to a Tribal nation feel like the right next step, not just professionally but personally.

“I was very purposeful in my intent to come to the Tribe,” she said. “I am incredibly impressed by what is being built here and honored to support it.”

Her academic background reflects a long-standing interest in governance and Indigenous communities. Rudert earned her bachelor’s degree in political science from New College of Florida, the honors college of Florida, a nontraditional university that emphasizes written evaluations and original research rather than grades. Her undergraduate thesis focused on democratization in Guatemala, examining how Indigenous Mayan communities blended

customary governance, laws and traditions with Western democratic systems at the local, municipal level. Through that work, she built close relationships with Indigenous leaders and learned directly from communities working to preserve culture, autonomy, and peace after conflict.

When the opportunity to serve as Chief Operating Officer at Muckleshoot came up, that early work felt especially meaningful.

“For my parents, this felt like a full circle moment,” she said. “I get to do this work at home, in my own country, after doing so much of it internationally.”

She later earned a master’s degree from Harvard Kennedy School in political and economic development.

“I did not think I was smart enough to get in,” Rudert said. “When I received the acceptance email, I thought it was a mistake.”

Despite her credentials, Rudert is thoughtful about how titles and institutions can create distance. As she gets to know the Muckleshoot community, she has been clear that she wants to be approachable and grounded.

“I don’t want credentials or titles to get in the way of people getting to know me. Some of the best people I’ve known have never had fancy titles, and they have done some of the most important work in the world.”

That mindset shapes how she views the COO role itself. For Rudert, operations are not about control. They are about support.

“When systems do not work, it is communities that feel it first,” she said. “Operations matter because they affect real lives. My role is to help systems work better so staff can focus on serving the community,” she said.

Outside of work, Rudert describes herself as very family oriented. She and her husband have a five-year-old daughter, and motherhood has influenced many of her professional decisions, including her decision to step away from federal service in search of better balance.



“Being a mom matters deeply to me,” she said.

She is also an avid traveler and lifelong learner, driven by curiosity about culture, language, and how different communities approach problem solving. She speaks three languages and often draws inspiration from places she has lived and worked. Rudert, who is half American and half Dominican, was born in the Dominican Republic and grew up bilingual, an experience that informs her deep respect for culture, family, and community.

“I see that same creativity here,” she said of Muckleshoot. “A willingness to find solutions that fit the community.”

Although she has only been with the Tribe a short time, Rudert said she has already been struck by the scope of services and the care shown for the people.

“Every department I visit, I learn about something incredible that is happening here,” she said. “I feel very privileged to be part of it.”

As she continues to settle into her role, Rudert says listening, learning, and supporting the people who already do this work every day. “I know trust is built over time,” she said. “My goal is to show up, do the work, and earn that trust.”

“I know first impressions matter,” she said. “I want people to know that I care.”

As we welcome Laura Rudert to Muckleshoot, we are honored to have a Chief Operating Officer whose leadership is grounded in service, humility, and respect for community. We are confident her experience and values will support the Tribe’s continued work for the people today and for generations to come.

Muckleshoot Athletic Center Opens, Expanding Training and Opportunity for Future Generations

... Developed to serve as more than a recreational space, the center provides structured environments for baseball and softball training, speed and agility work, and coaching support. The facility fills a long-standing gap by giving Muckleshoot athletes a safe, dedicated place to train, build skills and stay active close to home.

The opening celebration brought families and community members together for a day of activity and connection. Children rotated through batting cages and fields while food trucks, a live DJ, community giveaways and bounce houses added more fun as the facility came alive with great energy.

The opening also included appearances by members of the Seattle Mariners, including the Mariners Moose, who greeted families throughout the day, and Mariners infielder Ryan Bliss provided autographs and worked with community members and shared his experience and love of the game.

Former University of Washington collegiate softball player Silent Rain Espinoza was also in attendance, offering a visible example of how access to training, mentor-

ship and opportunity can lead to collegiate and professional athletic pathways.

The project was developed in partnership with the Seattle Mariners, who emphasized the importance of access, training and long-term development.

Kevin Martinez, the Mariners President of Business Operations said the partnership reflects a shared belief in the power of sport to strengthen communities and create opportunity.

“From day one, this partnership has focused on expanding access and supporting meaningful growth through baseball and softball,” Martinez said. “This facility creates a place where skills can be developed over time and where opportunity can grow for future generations.”

Muckleshoot Tribal Chairman Jaison Elkins said the vision for the athletic center came directly from community need and lived experience.

“This is all for the kids and for the future,” Elkins said. “We now have trainers, speed

and agility work, baseball and softball coaches, and a safe place where our people can stay active and build skills. This is an investment where an idea turned into something real that will serve generations.”

Elkins also thanked tribal staff and leadership for completing much of the work in-house, transforming the space from storage into a fully functional athletic center through collaboration and vision.

The Mariners committed to year-round involvement at the center, including youth camps, baseball and softball programming and special appearances by coaches and players.

Muckleshoot Athletic Center represents a long-term investment in health, confidence and opportunity, creating pathways for athletic growth that extend beyond youth programs and into future generations.

Elders Celebrate a New Year



Green River Fish Passage Project Update

KING COUNTY — A long-delayed project to restore fish passage on the Green River may begin construction as early as this summer. According to The Seattle Times, Congress recently approved about 190 million dollars to restart work on the fish passage and water storage project at Howard A Hanson Dam.

The dam has provided flood protection and drinking water for decades, but it has also blocked salmon and steelhead from reaching more than 100 miles of habitat upstream. The project is intended to allow fish to safely pass the dam and return to ar-

reas they have not accessed in generations.

Muckleshoot Tribal Chair Jaison Elkins has emphasized the importance of this work, saying, “We have to have salmon to continue our way of life. It’s a keystone species.”

The project has faced repeated delays over the years, largely due to funding challenges. With new funding now approved, federal officials say construction could move forward soon. Once complete, the project is expected to support healthier salmon runs and improve the overall balance of the Green River watershed.



2025 Salmon Jam recap

MUCKLESHOOT — The 7th annual Salmon Jam is a one-day Tournament at Wellness and the Community Center. Breakfast was provided and food throughout the day for the players. They all received a swag bag with a Hydro Flask, candy, hat, and a shirt. First – third receive a \$50 Nike gift card. The entry fee was unwrapped toys that are donated to Mary Bridge Children's Hospital.

Two core components are:

- Teaching kids the dangers of smoking cigarettes and vaping.
- Teaching kids empathy for others.

It would not be possible to do this without the help of the other departments. We worked closely with Jaron Artis, Recreation, on planning and scheduling. The rest of the teams are there on the day to help us manage courts, time-keep, book-keep, and cleanup. This included Recreation, YDP, Events, the Community Center, their facility and support staff, BHP Sieglinde Parker, the clinic, Amy Carey, and Dr. Ram, who provided the education component, and last but not least, the Wellness Team. The Wellness team works an additional day annually to ensure this is a fun, positive event. The Trainers and aquatics assist with the time clocks, brackets, crowd control setup, and teardown. The Wellness Coordinators start preparing food at 6 am and continue until the last game. 2025 had 23 teams with a total of 202 players, 400 spectators and 275 toys were donated to Mary Bridge.



How To Use a Car Seat Harness

What Is a Harness?
 A car seat harness keeps a child correctly restrained in the event of a crash and spreads crash forces across the strongest areas of the child's body (hips and chest).



5-point adjustable harness

Where Do the Harness Straps Go?



Rear-Facing Seats
 Shoulder harness webbing **AT or BELOW** the child's shoulders



Forward-Facing Seats
 Shoulder harness webbing **AT or ABOVE** the child's shoulders

Where Does the Chest Clip Go?
 The chest clip should be placed at the child's armpit level.



How Tight Should the Harness Be?
 The harness should pass the 'pinch test': when pinching the harness webbing vertically at the shoulder with the thumb and forefinger, your fingers should slide off easily and you should **not** be able to pinch any webbing between them.

The harness should lie flat and fit snugly at the child's shoulders and hips.



The Simple Facts About LATCH

Lower Anchors and Tethers for Children



- LATCH is a system that makes child safety seat installation easier – without using seat belts. LATCH is required on child safety seats and most vehicles manufactured after September 1, 2002.
- LATCH is not required for booster seats, car beds, and vests.
- Attachments on a LATCH-equipped child safety seat fasten to lower anchors and a tether anchor in a LATCH-equipped vehicle.
- The top tether strap is located at the top rear of convertible child safety seats, forward-facing toddler seats, and combination seats. Most rear-facing infant seats do not have a top tether strap or hook as they do not generally use this equipment for installation.
- The lower anchor straps are attached to the rear of the child safety seat. Most U.S. child safety seats come with flexible lower attachments. There are a few models of child safety seats that have rigid lower attachments. Be sure to read the manufacturer's instructions.
- LATCH-equipped vehicles have lower anchors in the right and left rear seat positions. If the center seat doesn't have lower anchors, you can install your child safety seat securely using a seat belt.
- There are a minimum of three tether anchors (metal loops) in the vehicle. In sedans, these are usually located behind the vehicle's rear seat on the rear shelf. In some larger vehicles such as vans, pickup trucks, and SUVs, these anchor points may be found on the rear of a vehicle seat itself, on the floor, the roof, or other location. Be sure to carefully read your vehicle owner's manual to find out where they are in your particular vehicle and to avoid confusing them with other vehicle hardware such as luggage tie-downs.
- If your vehicle isn't LATCH-equipped, use the seat belt to install the child safety seat and, if available, a top tether.
- If your child safety seat isn't LATCH-equipped, it's still safe to use as long as it has been correctly installed using a seat belt, hasn't been recalled, and hasn't been damaged.
- For correct installation and use of **ALL** child safety seats, **ALWAYS** follow your vehicle owner's manual and child safety seat manufacturer's instructions.
- Remember, children of all ages are safest when properly restrained in the back seat.


