Her winning piece, which took two to three weeks to complete, was a testament to her dedication, as she worked on it bit by bit.



## Power to the Future!



he Virginia, Maryland & Delaware Association of Electric Cooperatives, along with its Education Scholarship Foundation, proudly announces the awarding of \$124,500 in college scholarships to exceptional high school students for the 2024-25 academic year.

To qualify, recipients' parents must reside in areas served by electric cooperatives within the three-state region. Students from the Craig-Botetourt Electric Cooperative's service area who received scholarships include: Shailyn Wickline from James Monroe High School in Monroe, WV, awarded the C.D Hypes Scholarship of \$2,500; Jaycob Wolfe from Craig County High School in New Castle, Va., granted the Worth Hudson Scholarship of \$2,000; and Jadyn Miller from James River High School in Buchanan, Va., received a Worth Hudson Scholarship of \$1,500.

In honor of the Foundation's first chairman, 33 students received Worth Hudson Scholarships of \$1,500 or more. Hudson also chaired the board of directors for Mecklenburg Electric Cooperative in Chase City, Va.

Additionally, the Foundation has approved four cooperative-specific scholarships. The Gertrude Winston Memorial Scholarship, valued at \$2,500, was awarded to a student in the Rappahannock Electric Cooperative service area, established in memory of the mother of longtime REC board member Richard Oliver.

The C.D Hypes Memorial Scholarship, also worth \$2,500, as mentioned above, went to a student a in the CBEC service area. Hypes was both an educator and a board member for CBEC.

Five students in the Delaware Electric Cooperative service area received Cook Scholarships, each amounting to \$1,500, made possible by a generous recurring donation from Leslie and Larry Cook of Delaware.

In memory of a former *Cooperative Living* magazine editor who passed away in 2020, five students were awarded Bill Sherrod Memorial Scholarships, each valued at \$2,000 or more

Lastly, the Foundation's largest award, the Roberta I. Harlowe Scholarship of \$3,000, was presented to a student in the Central Virginia Electric Cooperative service area. Harlowe and her husband, Bill, made a historic donation to the Foundation, establishing its first endowment fund to secure its future for generations. The Harlowes have contributed over \$50,000, creating a lasting financial foundation for VMDAEC's charitable initiatives.

"Electric cooperatives adhere to the 7 Cooperative Principles," says VMDAEC President and CEO Brian Mosier. "The fifth principle emphasizes education, training, and information. These scholarships reflect our commitment to support, train, educate and empower the next generation of electric cooperative leaders. Helping deserving students pursue higher education or acquire skills strengthens our communities."

Scholarship recipients are chosen through a competitive evaluation process that considers financial need (40%), academic achievement (20%), and community involvement and personal history (20%). Applicants must be graduating high school or homeschooled seniors in the application year and provide proof of acceptance into a postsecondary education institution or program. Scholarships can be used for tuition, fees and books.
