Brandon is the Executive Director of Spark The Journey, a mentoring organization that prepares low-income high school students for college and continues working with them once they enroll to ensure that they remain on track for stable and successful careers. Before starting at Spark The Journey, Brandon obtained his AB in English from Princeton University, an MA in Cultural Production from Brandeis University, and his PhD in English from the University of California, Berkeley. It was teaching at a large public university like Berkeley, where many of his most successful students were either the first in their family to attend college or else had reached Berkeley by non-traditional paths that encouraged Brandon to look for ways to support students at an even more systemic level. He is also a graduate of Princeton AlumniCorps' Emerging Leaders program, and former chair of AlumniCorps' Washington, DC Area Committee.

Marty's prior work in the not-for-profit sector includes having served as the first Director of the Aspen Institute Seminars, the Founding President of American Leadership Forum, the Executive Director of The Coalition for the Presidio Pacific Center in San Francisco, and the Program Director of the National Humanities Series, based at the Institute for Citizens and Scholars (formerly known as the Woodrow Wilson Foundation) in Princeton.

His corporate employment includes directing public affairs at Levi Strauss & Co. and managing executive development at ARCO. He has extensive board experience in the arts, the environment, health, independent schools, leadership development, performing arts, philanthropy, publishing, and social justice. His poems and short stories have been published in American and British journals and anthologies. Elizabeth currently serves as a Senior Program Officer with the France-Merrick Foundation in Baltimore, Maryland, which provides approximately \$10 million in grants to nonprofits annually. Her portfolio is broad though she has a focus on climate change and working with the next generation of family members.
