There is a quiet truth about hospitals that the world rarely sees: the walls do not heal anyone. The policies do not hold a hand at three in the morning. The strategy does not notice when a patient's breathing shifts, when her color fades, or when something is about to go wrong.

The nurse does.

And when she sees it, what she does next matters more than almost anything else that happens on that shift.

She **speaks up**.

She calls the physician a second time when the first response was not enough. She escalates when the vital signs do not match the plan. She names the near miss, files the variance, and tells the story honestly at handover so that the next shift is not walking blind. She raises her hand in the huddle even when everyone else in the room is more senior than she is, because she has seen something that others have not yet seen.

This is what a safe hospital sounds like. Not silence. Not deference. Not hoping someone else will notice. **A voice.**

I want to be very clear with each of you today, because it matters.

If you see something that is not right a medication that does not fit the patient, a colleague who is drifting, a process that is unsafe, or a decision that worries you, you are expected to speak. **Not permitted. Expected.** That is the standard of this profession, and it is the standard of this hospital.

And when you speak, you will be heard. You will not be punished for raising a concern in good faith. You will not be marked for questioning a plan. You will not be left alone with the weight of something you saw and could not carry by yourself. This is our commitment to you, and it is not conditional.

We work in a Just Culture. That means we separate the human being from the system, and we ask better questions than, **"Who is to blame?"** We ask, **"What did the system allow to happen, and how do we make it safer?"** Every voice that speaks up makes that possible. Every silence makes it harder.

So, to each of you, I offer this as more than an invitation. I offer it as a charge.

Speak up when the patient in front of you needs a second set of eyes. Speak up when a protocol is being bent in a way you cannot defend. Speak up for the colleague who is exhausted, for the family who are confused, and for the patient who cannot advocate for themselves. **Speak up when you are the most junior person in the room and the most senior person is wrong.**

The patient does not have time for our hesitation. The profession does not grow through our silence.

Lead from where you stand. Speak from where you stand. **Right now. As you are.**

Gamifying the Grind

We took the complexities of insulin types, dosage calculations, and treatment modalities and translated them into interactive challenges. The units buzzed with excitement as staff dove into:

"Bring It On" Game: A high-energy competition where staff raced to press the bell. The first to ring got the chance to answer the clinical question and earn a point for their team.

Spin the Wheel: Turning clinical Q&As into high-stakes fun.

Sugar Guessing: A visual challenge where staff guessed the sugar content of various foods in teaspoons.

"Arrange Me" Game: Sharpening diagnostic eyes by correctly arranging the signs and symptoms of hypoglycemia.

Real-Talk Discussions: Sharing up-to-date details on monitoring and patient care.

The "Why" That Moved Me

What touched me most was the sheer willingness of our staff. We all know how demanding the floor can be—nurses are often stretched thin, navigating "toxic" or overwhelming shifts where they barely have a moment to breathe. Yet, despite the pressure and the busyness, our nurses made the choice to show up. They found the time to join in, to learn, and to truly have fun. Seeing a nurse step away from a stressful moment to engage in a puzzle or a clinical discussion with a smile on their face was the ultimate "teaching moment." It proved that no matter how heavy the workload, a culture of support and cooperation can transform the atmosphere of the entire unit.

Lasting Impression

Looking back on that December, it's clear this campaign didn't just raise awareness for Diabetes; it raised the spirit of our entire department. It served as a lasting reminder that even on the most difficult days, a sense of achievement and joy is possible when we stand together.

9th Nursing Symposium 2026; Value-Driven Nursing - Aligning Care, Cost, and Compassion

The 9th Nursing Symposium, held on February 3, 2026, as part of the 4th Fakeeh Care Annual Congress, brought together nursing leaders, clinicians, and educators to celebrate innovation and excellence in nursing practice. Hosted at Laylati Hall, the symposium was centered on the theme “Value-Driven Nursing: Aligning Care, Cost, and Compassion.”

The event opened with a welcome address by Ms. Khadra Mohamed Omar, setting the tone for a day focused on high-quality, evidence-based nursing that enhances patient outcomes while optimizing resources.

Highlights of the Scientific Program

Session 1: Clinical Excellence & Outcomes

Expert speakers emphasized the pivotal role of nursing leadership in advancing value-based care. Discussions highlighted how efficiency, empathy, and outcomes-driven nursing systems contribute to sustainable healthcare transformation.



Dr. Maureen Lal, DNP, MSN, RN, Senior Director of the Magnet Recognition Program, delivered a standout presentation titled **“Nursing Leadership as the Engine of Clinical Excellence: Advancing Nursing’s Role in Value-Based Care.”** She highlighted how empowered nurse leaders drive superior quality outcomes, strengthen patient safety, and optimize resource utilization—while ensuring compassion remains central to care delivery.



“From Efficiency to Empathy: Exploring How Nursing Systems Can Better Support People While Strengthening Value-based Care.” Insights by **Mr. Hisham Bawadi, Director of Nursing at the American University of Beirut Medical Center,** on building more human-centered healthcare models.



“Delivering Outcomes That Matter: Highlighting Nursing’s Vital Role in Driving Value Transformation.” **Ms. Mawahib Samater, General Director of Nursing Administration Medical Services Ministry of Defense Riyadh, KSA,** highlights that through direct patient care, coordination, and advocacy, nurses drive better outcomes, enhance efficiency, and play a key role in transforming healthcare systems toward value-based care.

The session reinforced nursing leadership as a strategic force in building resilient, outcomes-driven healthcare systems and elevating nursing’s contribution to organizational value and long-term transformation.

Session 2: Patient Experience & Engagement

This session highlighted the growing importance of person-centered care as a cornerstone of value-based healthcare. Presentations focused on partnering with patients to co-create care plans, and on translating compassion into measurable outcomes—demonstrating clear links to patient satisfaction, engagement, and overall value.



Adel Al-Shabaan, Managing Director at Health.Links, presented **“Invisible Moments: Observation-Based Learning in Patient Experience and Person-Centered Care.”** He explored how subtle, often overlooked interactions shape patient perceptions and how structured observation can uncover opportunities to enhance the care experience.



Sara Alrumikhani, Patient Experience Director, delivered a presentation titled **“Co-Creating Care Plans with Patients: A Core VBC Strategy.”** She emphasized the value of engaging patients as active partners in their care, highlighting how collaborative planning improves outcomes, strengthens trust, and supports more personalized, effective care delivery.



This session also highlights the insights from one of the speakers, **Dr. Tagwa Omer, Member of The Shura Council of Saudi Arabia**, who talks about **“Leading Healthcare Transformation: The Strategic Role of Nursing Leadership in Driving Quality and Value Under Vision 2030”**



“Linking Compassion to Value: Exploring How Positive Patient Experiences Enhance Healthcare Value”. Prof. Samar Alsaggaf, ead of International and National Cooperation at the College of Medicine, King Abdulaziz University, and Consultant to national education and health standards bodies, highlights that when patients feel heard, respected, and supported, outcomes improve, satisfaction rises, and overall system efficiency increases. In short, positive patient experiences lead to better results at lower long-term cost.



Ms. Mylene Frieres, Senior Clinical Nurse Specialist at KFSH & RC-Madinah, sharing insights about **“Integrating Competency, Communication, and Compassion to Achieve High-Value Nursing Care”.**

Session 3: Empowering Nurses Through Culture, Competency & Compassion

Speakers shared insights on developing nursing leadership, strengthening professional competencies, and fostering a culture of safety and collaboration. A dynamic panel discussion explored aligning leadership, workforce capability, and engagement to deliver high-value nursing care, in line with Vision 2030.



“Developing Nursing Leaders for Value-Based Care: Building, Empowering, and Retaining a High-Performing Workforce”. Insights by **Mr. Mohammed Fakih, CNO - Fakeeh University Hospital Dubai, UAE** highlighting the importance of building skills, empowering nurses, and retaining talent to create a high-performing workforce that improves patient outcomes, efficiency, and overall healthcare value.

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Session 4: Internal Excellence Showcase – Value-Based Initiatives

Nurses from across Fakeeh Care and affiliated institutions presented evidence-based projects, quality improvement initiatives, and research studies. Topics included patient safety, infection prevention, simulation-based education, interprofessional collaboration, digital tools for nursing competency, and strategies to enhance patient experience and operational efficiency.

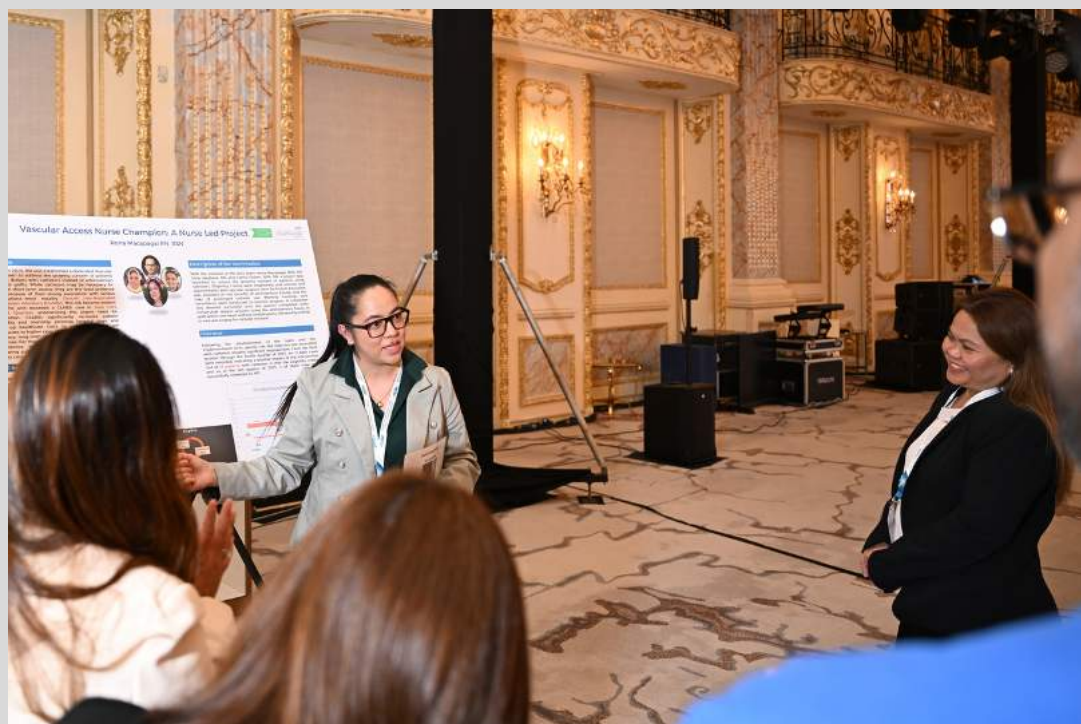

Safe Cast Care Practice: A Hands-On Training Initiative for Nursing Excellence

The Safe Cast Practice Workshop: Essential Principles for Safe Nursing Care, held on **27 January 2026**, marked a significant step toward enhancing the quality and safety of orthopedic nursing care within the outpatient department. Organized in response to a request from the Orthopedic Clinic Nurse Manager, Catherine Amandy, the workshop was designed to strengthen nurses' clinical competencies in cast application and management. This initiative directly addressed key gaps identified in everyday practice, particularly in the areas of neurovascular assessment, safe casting techniques, and the delivery of clear, effective patient education.

The program began with a comprehensive and engaging theoretical session delivered by orthopedic consultant Dr. Mohammed Alsobeai. His lecture provided participants with a solid foundation in essential orthopedic principles, including an overview of fracture types, the selection and properties of various casting materials, and the critical steps involved in safe cast application. Particular emphasis was placed on the importance of accurate and timely neurovascular assessment, as well as the early identification of serious complications such as compartment syndrome—an area where prompt recognition can significantly impact patient outcomes.

Building on this knowledge, the workshop transitioned into an interactive, hands-on training session facilitated by Dr. Rayan Mohammad Suqaty and Dr. Ghiath Sobhi Kazmoz. During this practical component, participants actively engaged in applying casts, splints, and bandages for both pediatric and adult scenarios. The small-group format allowed for individualized guidance, while real-time feedback from facilitators ensured that each participant could refine their technique, build confidence, and align their practice with established safety standards.

The workshop was attended by orthopedic clinic nurses from both DSFH-J and The Executive Clinic, who play a vital role in supporting fracture management and patient recovery. Through a combination of theory and practice, participants enhanced their ability to assist with safe cast application, perform thorough neurovascular assessments, and provide patients and their families with clear instructions on cast care and warning signs of complications.

Feedback collected after the session reflected a high level of satisfaction among attendees. Nurses reported increased confidence in their clinical skills, a deeper understanding of safe casting practices, and a greater sense of preparedness to manage patients effectively. Attendees also highlighted the value of the hands-on component and the opportunity to learn directly from experienced orthopedic specialists.

Overall, the Safe Cast Practice Workshop not only strengthened individual competencies but also contributed to a broader culture of patient safety and clinical excellence. By reinforcing standardized care practices, supporting the upcoming Cast Room expansion, and promoting continuous professional development, this initiative helps ensure the delivery of high-quality, consistent, and safe nursing care across the orthopedic service.
