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A NOTE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE + ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

St. Cecilia Music Center's 2024/25 season was one for the record books! In its 141st year as a cornerstone of the West Michigan arts community, **SCMC served more than 11,000 music enthusiasts** through excellent, educational, and accessible music programs.

The 2024/25 Presenting Series featured incredibly memorable, sold-out concerts from the world's best chamber, jazz, and folk artists. The Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center impressed with programs like *Schubert's Trout Quintet*, increasing audiences over the previous year. The Jazz Series grew to add a fourth concert and featured the outstanding Josh Redman, Julian Lage, Cécile McLorin Salvant, and Christian McBride. The Folk Series welcomed Michigan-born duo The War and Treaty, legends like Del McCoury and Judy Collins, and many more. **In all, the Presenting Series welcomed 7,500 audience members** to enjoy an inspiring evening of music in Royce Auditorium.

The School of Music, led by SCMC Education and Community Engagement Director Cyndi Betts, engaged more students than ever before via SCMC's youth ensembles with 175 participants. Additionally, SCMC's In the Classroom program Strings to Schools expanded to a second school, serving 44 Sibley and Dickinson Elementary students with free in-school strings instruction. Feedback highlights the overwhelmingly positive impact of music participation for students. One educator offered,

"I have seen students in this program bursting with pride and also becoming much more focused on their studies, and better at relating to their peers. It's been absolutely AMAZING for the Dickinson students!"

Our donors continue to show their unwavering dedication to SCMC's mission, with our annual Meijer Match campaign seeing incredible results, thanks to our partnership with the Meijer Foundation.

2024/ 2025 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS



SIERRA HULL OPENS THE SEASON AND RHIANNON GIDDENS RETURNS

Accomplished mandolin player Sierra Hull opened SCMC's 2024/25 season to a **sold-out crowd in our 625-seat Royce Auditorium.** Returning to SCMC as a part of the Folk Series in May 2025 was Rhiannon Giddens. The two-time Grammy winner created a remarkable band in Old-Time Revue, which featured an array of American musical traditions.



NEA RECOGNIZES THE JAZZ SERIES

In 2024, the National Endowment for the Arts awarded SCMC a grant of \$20,000 to support the 2024/25 Spectacular Jazz Series. "Projects like St. Cecilia Music Center's Spectacular Jazz Series exemplify the creativity and care with which communities are telling their stories, creating connection, and responding to challenges and opportunities in their communities—all through the arts," said former NEA Chair Maria Rosario Jackson, PhD. of the award.



ONGOING BUILDING PRESERVATION

Given SCMC's 130-year-old building, ongoing facility maintenance remains essential to preserve our venue. During the recent weatherization process of our exterior brick, workers discovered a remarkably well-preserved painted advertisement from the 1960s that had been concealed beneath, demonstrating how historical renovations can yield unexpected treasures.



RECORD NUMBER OF YOUTH ENSEMBLE PARTICIPANTS

SCMC School of Music youth and adult ensembles had 310 participants during the 2024/25 school year. Our Sinfonia, Concert Orchestra, and Philharmonic youth orchestras provided opportunities for 175 young artists. "The healthy combination of work and fun provides for a very unique experience," said one youth ensemble member.

HELEN DeVOS LEGACY AWARD HONORS KATE PEW WOLTERS

In May 2025, we honored Kate Pew Wolters with the Helen DeVos Legacy Award for her incredible contributions to arts and advocacy in West Michigan. On May 10, we celebrated Kate with a spirited evening featuring a jazz performance from Edye Evans Hyde, Mike Hyde, and Robin Connell followed by a delightful dinner and award presentation.



13 YEARS OF CMS AT SCMC

SCMC's partnership with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center (CMS) saw a successful season, which featured three exceptional programs curated by CMS co-artistic directors Wu Han and David Finckel. Overall, the CMS series was attended by 1,654 individuals, with 229 being students who received free and reduced-cost tickets. The CMS series saw a 15% increase in attendance.



STRINGS TO SCHOOLS EXPANDS

SCMC Education Director Cyndi
Betts established partnerships
with two new Grand Rapids
Public elementary schools to
host Strings to Schools: Sibley
and Dickinson. 44 students in
grades 1st - 5th participated.
Both programs culminated in a
final performance held in SCMC's
Royce Auditorium in May.

MEIJER MATCH EXCEEDS GOAL

SCMC's annual Meijer Match campaign is a valued collaboration with the Meijer Foundation, featuring a generous \$50,000 matching gift that inspires community support from mid-May through June 30. The 2025 campaign exceeded its overall goal and increased donations by 17% over the previous year. SCMC extends profound gratitude to the Meijer Foundation for their continued partnership.

ACCESS TO MUSIC

We reduce significant barriers to high-quality arts experiences by offering accessible ticketing options, bringing performances to schools and centers for older adults, and offering financial support for School of Music participants. We partner with local music educators and community organizations to provide free and reduced-cost tickets. "So grateful for this opportunity. Been going through a rough time financially and the chance to go to a concert like this for free? A night out at little or no cost? An absolute blessing," said one concert-goer.



BROAD ARTISTIC PERSPECTIVES

SCMC is dedicated to broad representation and welcoming programming in our Presenting Series and School of Music. **Representation in our featured artists is paramount.** For example, the 2024/25 season featured artists like Valerie June who describes her perspective as "multidimensional Blackness steeped in laughter, truth, magic, delight, and interdependence." Musical styles are also varied, including everything from "Carolina piedmont blues" with Rhiannon Giddens & Old-Time Revue to "Haitian Creole jazz" with Cécile McLorin Salvant.



CONNECTION THROUGH MUSIC

At SCMC, we take our responsibility to provide welcoming, accessible, and memorable experiences very seriously. SCMC's volunteers are exceptional and offer vital support to patrons. "I don't know how you do it, but these concerts are some of my favorite events of the year. It's an intimate setting. The feel is friendly and warm. The ushers are delightful and helpful. What a gem of Grand Rapids!" said one concert attendee. Post-concert receptions are held following each Presenting Series concert, allowing attendees to chat with artists and each other.

ILLUSTRATING IMPACT: School of Music

St. Cecilia Music Center (SCMC) provides opportunities for young people and adults to experience the many benefits of music, engaging more than 3,000 students, families, and community members through School of Music (SOM) programs each year. Programs include youth and adult performance ensembles, youth summer camps and In the Classroom music education opportunities that happen in local schools. Music instruction fosters a more holistic approach to education, and research demonstrates the numerous benefits of music participation for both adults and young people.

YOUTH ENSEMBLES

SCMC's School of Music youth ensembles include Sinfonia, Concert Orchestra, and Philharmonic. During the 2024/25 school year, these groups provided opportunities for 175 young artists to build their confidence and challenge themselves by collaborating with excellent instructors and youth players from throughout the region.



ADULT ENSEMBLES

Conducted by Shannon Shaker, adult ensemble Beer City Winds performed in June and July 2025, creating a unique instrumental community that emphasizes technical precision, musicality, and emotional depth. Adult ensemble Grand Strings emphasizes having fun and learning classical and popular music in a non-competitive atmosphere.



IN THE CLASSROOM

We've recently sought to better understand the impact of SOM programs through a more extensive survey process. The response has been encouraging.

Strings to Schools is SCMC's longest-running In the Classroom program. Strings to Schools provides 40+ Sibley and Dickinson elementary students with free beginning strings instruction onsite at their school three times per week throughout the school year. Our recent survey of Strings to Schools participants, parents, and educators showcased how music supports young people holistically:

At the beginning of the school year, 20% of Dickinson students said that they thought learning to play music would be 'boring.' By the end of the year, 100% of students reported that learning to play music was 'fun.'

71%

of students made a new friend in strings class.

of parents with students in the program saw an increase in their child's confidence.

"I have seen students in this program bursting with pride and also becoming much more focused on their studies, and better at relating to their peers. It's been absolutely AMAZING for the Dickinson students!" offered one educator.

We also asked the 419 students from Brookside, Dickinson, and Ridgemoor Park Montessori who participated in the Jazz and Folk Assembly program about what they learned:

"I learned that jazz is beautiful."

"I heard the different types of music and different styles. I also saw how they all worked together to play and how challenging it can be to play an instrument."

"I learned that when you are playing an instrument, you destress."





SCMC FY25 BUDGET


SCMC's finances are overseen by a finance committee that is made up of staff, board, and community members who meet monthly to review SCMC's current fiscal status, discuss cash flow projections, implement policy, and keep the full board apprised of the overall financial position. The committee also works on the annual budget for board approval and conservatively sets goals so that the organization is working toward realistic expectations. An investment subcommittee monitors SCMC's \$3M Endowment Fund, a crucial piece of the organization's long-term sustainability.



FY25 REVENUE




FY25 EXPENSES






Maintaining our historic venue remains a vital component of SCMC's ability to achieve our mission. The majority of our programs take place in-house, including our Presenting Series concerts and School of Music rehearsals and concerts. Additionally, our space serves as a community gathering place with more than 100 community events,



To support our 130-year-old building, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, we are currently seeking contributions to support SCMC's Building Reserve Fund, which will ensure that unexpected building repairs do not impact programming. FACILITY UPDATES

Thanks to support of grants and private donations, SCMC is making investments to help preserve our historic building and ensure visitors safely enjoy their time here.

Exterior Repairs

In the summer of 2025, SCMC began work to secure a section of bulging brick located on the south elevation of the building, which was caused by moisture seeping in the wall.

- Bricks were removed and existing bricks were salvaged.
- Bricks were cleaned, replaced, and secured to the existing wall.
- Entire south elevation underwent tuckpointing.
- Wall was cleaned to match existing brick and ensure a weather-tight seal.

Stone repair, window sealing, and tuckpointing also took place on the front facade.

Artist Lounge

- Walls and fixtures in the Artist Lounge, which is used by artists and by guests who rent the building, were painted.
- Furnishings were updated and replaced.
- Artwork featuring hand-drawn blueprints of the building were hung throughout.
