

after receiving VR services



IDVR assists Idaho businesses in hiring and retaining qualified employees

IDVR's Business Engagement Team members are available in each region to address the needs of local Idaho businesses including:

- ⇒ providing technical assistance/training with accommodations on the job,
- ⇒ connecting business with a relatively untapped and diverse labor pool, and
- ⇒ help employers work with their employees with disabilities to keep or modify their job, or even training to help move to a new position.

## **HP Spectrum Success Program**

Leveraging the talents of individuals on the Autism spectrum, this week-long cohort included tours of HP, team building activities, presentation skills workshop, social and writing workshops, informational interviews and interviewing techniques, and an overview of jobs.

Of the cohort participants, two were hired for summer internships, including one from Idaho. HP was so impressed with the outcome they anticipate another cohort beginning in **January**, **2020**. IDVR will continue to provide support and technical assistance to the program.

## **Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS)**

IDVR served **3,155 students** and spent a total of **\$2,937,732.43 of program funds**. IDVR continues to provide valuable Pre-Employment Transition Services (**Pre-ETS**) to students with disabilities around the state.

A focus of Pre-ETS is the paid summer work experiences. Over **340** students participated in one week of job skills training, followed by five weeks of paid work with businesses in 15 different areas around the state; additional on the job work training was provided to students when needed. In addition, 35 students who are deaf or hard of hearing from around the state participated in job skills training followed by four weeks of paid work experience in their local community. Employers continue to express the value of this program and assisting students to learn on the job.



## SELKIRK OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP and EDUCATION PROGRAM (SOLE)

For the past three years **SOLE** has partnered with the **Lake Pend Oreille School District** and IDVR to encourage students to take leadership roles and provide a safe space to push through personal challenges. This Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (**STEM**) focused program teaches students leadership skills while also highlighting high demand employment opportunities specifically in forestry and conservation.

## BOISE STATE POSTSECONDARY REWARDING EDUCATION IS POSSIBLE (PREP) ACADEMY

Students who participate in the **PREP Academy** learn college skills through participation in course presentations, career development activities including career pathways, in-demand industry needs, independent living skills, financial literacy instruction, and developing next steps for students on their path to postsecondary education.





#### **Boise School District** Summer School Work Program


Boise School District students had the opportunity to participate in work readiness training and a short paid work experience during summer school, while earning academic credit.

For Federal fiscal year 2019, U.S. Department of Education awarded total federal grant funds of \$17,263,470. The State of Idaho funded the remaining 21.3 percent of the costs at \$4,672,324.
