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Subject: Badger Battleground Poll Results

Tiffany, Barnes hold leads in primaries for Wisconsin governor; many remain undecided Republicans have narrow edge in generic governor race as nearly half of Wisconsin voters identify as MAGA supporters. Voters nearly unanimous in concern about increasing political violence

Platform Communications recently commissioned its latest Badger Battleground Poll to survey the political landscape in the state of Wisconsin. The poll surveyed **500** likely General Election voters using live telephone interviews on a combination of landlines and cell phones and was in the field **Sept. 28-30**. It revealed leads for U.S. Rep Tom Tiffany and former Lt. Gov. Mandela Barnes in each of their parties' primaries for Wisconsin governor, among other political dynamics headed into 2026.

Tiffany had the support of **30 percent** of poll respondents in the Republican primary, with the nearest prospective candidate, Eric Hovde, garnering **14 percent** from voters, while **34 percent** of the Republican electorate remained undecided. The poll also included candidate and Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann, and prospective candidates Tim Michels and Mary Felzkowski. Just more than **10 percent** of voters favored "none of these" candidates, and the poll was conducted before news that former Gov. Tommy Thompson was also considering a run.

In the Democratic primary, Barnes opens as a potential candidate with the highest marks among poll respondents, with **16 percent** saying they would support him in a primary, while declared candidate Lt. Gov. Sara Rodriguez is in second at **8 percent**. Nearly **38 percent** of Democrats remain undecided in the race. Also included in the poll were declared candidates Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley, State Rep. Francesca Hong, State Sen. Kelda Roys, ex-WEDC CEO Missy Hughes, and prospective candidates Attorney General Josh Kaul, and former Democratic Party of Wisconsin Chairman Ben Wikler.

(All candidate numbers include Tiffany 30 percent, Hovde 14 percent, Michels 9 percent, Schoemann 4 percent, and Felzkowski 1 percent for the Republicans. For the Democrats, it includes Barnes 16 percent, Rodriguez 8 percent, Crowley 7 percent, Kaul 7 percent, Hong 4 percent, Roys 4 percent, Hughes 2 percent, and Wikler 1 percent.)

The Wisconsin electorate remains closely divided, with a shift toward the GOP ahead of a mid-term election year that could still create challenges for Republicans, as often happens to the party holding the White House. Republicans hold a narrow **43-40** lead on the generic Gubernatorial ballot in the state's first open gubernatorial race since 2010. The Republican Party is viewed net favorably **(48 percent favorable-44 percent unfavorable)** while the Democratic Party is viewed unfavorably by a solid majority of voters **(37 percent favorable-54 percent unfavorable)**.

President Trump holds a **48 percent favorable-48 percent unfavorable** rating, while Gov. Evers sits at **47 percent favorable-44 percent unfavorable**. When asked if they personally considered themselves supporters of the MAGA movement, **46 percent** of voters said they identified as MAGA.

There is near-unanimous agreement that the increase we have seen in political violence is concerning. **95 percent** of voters say they are concerned about the rise in political violence, and **79 percent** say they are "very concerned." This sentiment is remarkably consistent across race, political party, age, and ideology.
