RESOLUTION #108-2025

WHEREAS, the Town of Holland (hereinafter "local government") believes that the lack of housing for New York residents of all ages and income levels negatively impacts the future of New York State's economic growth and community well-being;

WHEREAS, the housing crisis has negative effects at regional and local levels, we believe that every community must do their part to contribute to housing growth and benefit from the positive impacts a healthy housing market brings to communities;

WHEREAS, we believe that supporting housing production of all kinds in our community will bring multiple benefits, including increasing housing access and choices for current and future residents, providing integrated accessible housing options that meet the needs of people with sensory and mobility disabilities, bringing economic opportunities and vitality to our communities, and allowing workers at all levels to improve their quality of life through living closer to their employment opportunities;

WHEREAS, we believe that evidence showing that infill development that reduces sprawl and supports walkable communities has significant environmental and public health benefits; and

WHEREAS, we believe that affirmatively furthering fair housing and reducing segregation is not only required by law, but is essential for keeping our community strong and vibrant;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that Town of Holland, in order to take positive steps to alleviate the housing crisis, adopts the Pro-Housing Communities pledge, which will have us endeavor to take the following important steps:

- 1. Streamlining permitting for multifamily housing, affordable housing, accessible housing, accessory dwelling units, and supportive housing.
- 2. Adopting policies that affirmatively further fair housing.
- 3. Incorporating regional housing needs into planning decisions.
- 4. Increasing development capacity for residential uses.
- 5. Enacting policies that encourage a broad range of housing development, including multifamily housing, affordable housing, accessible housing, accessory dwelling units, and supportive housing.

Special Use Permit – Lifepath Yoga Center LLC – Maria Czechowski – 13225
 Parker Road

Maria Czechowski requested a special use permit to operate a Yoga and Tai Chi business at her home address – 13225 Parker Road, Holland. She will teach the classes in a 20' round yurt that will be placed behind their home's garage and not visible from the road. The yurt is a temporary structure and has already been approved by Justin Quant (building inspector). There is adequate parking for 8 cars.

This business was previously located on Whitney Road and the town approved a special use permit in 2012.

- Hours of operation Tuesday AM/PM; Wednesday PM; Saturday AM 1-hour classes – and/or by appointment
- Sign would be the same as used at prior location Whitney Road.

After discussion, the Planning Board voted unanimously to recommend that the special use permit be granted based on all information provided in the application and the following conditions:

- 1) Adequate lighting of driveway/parking area.
- 2) Must obtain permit from Building Inspector for signage.
- 3) Add shrubs/hedges along front, but not blocking visibility for pulling out to road.
- 4) Walking paths are level and well lit.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:25 p.m.

Restriction:

The portion of Holland Glenwood Rd-Capital Heights (CR-240) from Pleasant View Dr. to S. Main St. (NY-16) will have a single lane restriction. This restriction will begin December 15, with an anticipated completion date of January 2, or until complete. Work will be performed between the hours of 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., daily. This restriction is for the purpose of utility work. National Fuel will be performing the work.

A closure is executed under Article V, Section 104A of the Highway Law in order to permit a proper completion of work of improvement thereon.
