Police brutality escalates in the aftermath of Nahel's killing

 Since the murder of Nahel Merzouk, police brutality has skyrocketed, forming part of a police backlash to the mass protests around the murder.

New cases have been documented on a weekly basis - 5 individuals lost an eye, one is in a coma, and another one had to undergo surgery which removed part of his skull.

There are strong indications that police killed another man too.

 Police unions have exerted political pressure on the government to release a police officer incarcerated because he shot the individual who lost part of his skull.

The unions are also pressuring lawmakers to loosen the legal framework regulating their intervention through a permissive 'self-defence' excuse.

 The Minister of the Interior, Gerald Darmanin, <u>stated that he "understood</u> the police's anger".

Military coup in Niger further weakens France role in West Africa

- A military junta deposed Niger's president Mohamed Bazoum on July 26.
- Niger is an ex-French colony situated in the Sahel region. Despite its

independence, it remained structurally subordinate to French authorities who exerted a de facto neo-colonial rule over Niger.

- The country houses <u>key uranium mines</u>: it is the seventh largest uranium producer in the world and delivers 25% of Europe's supplies. It is France's third-largest supplier. Uranium is used in nuclear plants to produce electricity.
- The coup is believed to be supported by Russia as a means to undermine French influence in the Sahel, though it is not suspected that they had any involvement themselves.
- It could also deepen the energy crisis in Europe if the junta was to decide to cut its uranium supplies to the EU.

Uranium production could become a decisive lever used to weaken the EU's opposition to Russia vis-a-vis the Ukraine war.

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Islamophobia

Far-right pundit appointed as new editor-in-chief of a mainstream weekly media

- Geoffroy Lejeune a journalist supportive of Eric Zemmour - has been appointed as new editor-in-chief of "Le Journal du Dimanche" - a right-wing mainstream weekly newspaper.
- Far-right narratives are now the new official editorial line of this outlet. The media is owned by far-right mogul Vincent Bolloré - who stated that <u>"he uses</u> his media to lead a civilisational struggle".

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
