


THE HUNTING GROUNDS

Only forty-five minutes from Windhoek International Airport lies a wilderness unlike any other – 80 square miles of pristine Camelthorn Kalahari, privately owned and carefully stewarded by the Lamprecht family for over four decades. Fourteenth-generation Africans, the Lamprechts have dedicated their lives to preserving this land in its natural state, ensuring it remains a sanctuary of abundance and authenticity.

The terrain is as diverse as it is striking: vast golden grass plains scattered with ancient camelthorn trees, rugged hills and rocky outcrops, dense bushveld thickets, and sweeping open flats. This variety of habitats allows game to thrive naturally, creating a true wilderness where wildlife is entirely free-ranging and self-propagating.

To safeguard both the land and its wildlife, we host no more than ten hunting parties each year. This rare exclusivity ensures not only exceptional trophy quality, but also a safari experience defined by authenticity, challenge, and the untamed spirit of Africa.



HUNTING AT HUNTERS NAMIBIA SAFARIS

Hunting at Hunters Namibia Safaris is guided by a philosophy of respect, conservation, and tradition. We practice only fair-chase hunting, conducted entirely on foot in the classic spot-and-stalk style. Every encounter is earned, ensuring that the hunt remains an authentic and deeply personal pursuit.

We focus exclusively on mature, post-reproductive animals – old, heavy-horned specimens that have lived full lives in the wild. We are not “inch hunters” chasing measurements, but conservationists who value age, character, and the integrity of the hunt.


The varied terrain – from open plains to rugged kopjes and thick bushveld – offers both challenge and diversity, demanding skill, patience, and adaptability from hunter and guide alike. Trophy quality is consistently outstanding, with clients averaging one trophy per day, though there is no limit to the number of species pursued. We recommend safaris of 10–14 days to allow the rhythm of the veld to unfold naturally, though a minimum of 7 hunting days is required. Certain species, such as leopard and cheetah (note: cheetah trophies cannot be imported into the USA), require a minimum of 14 days. Every safari is conducted with integrity, patience, and reverence for the land – ensuring your time here is both personally rewarding and a lasting contribution to conservation.



PROFESSIONAL HUNTERS AND VEHICLES

Every safari is guided by one of Namibia's finest Professional Hunters – men of exceptional skill, with decades of experience and reputations that are respected throughout the country. Their deep knowledge of the land, wildlife, and traditions of fair-chase hunting ensures not only success in the field but also an enriching experience filled with insight, camaraderie, and unforgettable stories. Each P.H. hosts no more than two hunters at a time, guaranteeing personal attention and guidance of the highest standard.

For the hunt itself, classic open Toyota Land Cruisers are used for transport, while all stalking is conducted on foot in the true spirit of fair chase. Each vehicle is immaculately maintained and fully outfitted with first aid kits, tools, two-way radios, electric winches, and refreshments to ensure both safety and comfort in the wilderness.



MEALS & DAILY SCHEDULE

Each day begins just before sunrise, with coffee or tea served in your suite, followed by a hearty breakfast. Our gourmet chef, Henock, and his dedicated team prepare world-class cuisine, with venison from the hunt complemented by fresh salads, fruits, vegetables, and herbs from our gardens. Daily baked breads and treats from the old wood-burning oven add a touch of tradition, while non-venison and vegetarian dishes are gladly provided on request.

Guests return to camp at midday for a leisurely buffet lunch by the poolside summerhouse, with time for a siesta before afternoon adventures.

Evenings unfold with sundowners by the fire, where stories are shared in the glow of acacia flames, before the traditional drumbeat calls you to a candlelit three-course feast.

A curated cellar of fine South African wines, premium spirits, world-class Namibian beers, and fresh juices ensures every taste is indulged, with special requests warmly accommodated.



THE LODGE

Our lodge is run in the classic, elegant tradition of Africa's great safari camps – a sanctuary of stone and thatch designed by Joof Lamprecht to blend seamlessly with the Camelthorn Kalahari's rocky kopjes and vast golden savannahs. Here, old-world charm meets modern comfort, creating a timeless atmosphere where every detail reflects the Lamprecht family's heritage of hospitality.

Lodge Features & Amenities

- Five spacious guest suites with en-suite bathrooms (basins, flushing toilets, and generous high-pressure showers)
- Solid wood extra-length beds with down duvets and pillows
- Flexible room arrangements: king or twin beds, with one suite offering an inter-leading children's room
- Two loft suites with cozy stone fireplaces
- Classic safari furnishings: writing desks, wardrobes, rifle cabinets, reading lamps, USA adaptors, air conditioning/ceiling fans, and balcony furniture

WING SHOOTING

Wing shooting in the Camelthorn Kalahari offers a challenging and rewarding complement to plains game hunting. Guineafowl and francolin are pursued on foot through the bush, while all three of Namibia's sandgrouse – Burchell's, Double-banded, and Namaqua – provide some of the most exciting bird shooting in Africa.

Each morning around nine o'clock, flights of sandgrouse sweep in high and fast, circling the water before settling, and offering a thrilling challenge even to the most experienced bird hunters. A bush breakfast at the water's edge makes the spectacle all the more memorable. Though Namibia's arid climate means bird numbers are not vast, the hunts are highly sporting and deeply rewarding.

Bird Hunting Season in Namibia by Species

Helmeted Guineafowl: 1 June – 30 September

Red-billed Francolin: 1 May – 31 August

Cape Turtle Dove: 1 May – 31 October

Namaqua Sandgrouse: 1 September – 30 November

Double-banded Sandgrouse: 1 September – 30 November

Burchell's Sandgrouse: 1 October – 30 November



MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Hunters Namibia Safaris is the sole source of protein for a nearby rural school of more than 500 children, where dedicated teachers provide an excellent education. The meat from your hunt helps to feed these children throughout the year.

Guests are welcome to visit the school, provided the visit does not interrupt the school day, and many describe it as a highlight of their safari. Supplies are always appreciated and can easily be purchased in Windhoek before being delivered directly. The children also enjoy any activities guests may wish to share.

While there is no expectation to contribute, those who do often find this connection with the community a memorable and rewarding part of their safari.




NON-HUNTERS

If your spouse or other companions prefer shooting with a camera, Hunters Namibia offers splendid game drives to show them the landscape, animals, and birds. We take great pride in the fauna and flora of Namibia. The fact that Hunters Namibia Safaris does not hunt from vehicles allows close encounters with the game. This is an experience not to be missed by you, your spouse and your children.

We offer non-hunter activity options near the safari property that can be planned before or while on safari, availability permitting: All activities will have some additional expense such as fuel, entrance fees, specialised guide if needed for overnight trips etc.



- Erindi Game Park (3 hours): spend a night or two away from camp and see the lions, leopards, elephant and Rhino and enjoy the watering hole filled with hippos, crocs and other animals.
- Shiloh Wildlife Sanctuary/N/aankuse (1 ½ hours): tour this world-renowned sanctuary supported by Angelina Jolie
- Tour Windhoek and visit unique artists galleries
- Tour the Lamprecht shotgun shell factory
- Enjoy a spa day in Windhoek or a treatment from our in-house masseuse
- Visit the local school that is supported solely through this family operation and the protein provided by hunters. If you like, purchase books and other supplies in town and take them to the school. Your hunting meat is the sole source of protein for the school.
- Walk with Cheetah
- Swakopmund (4 hours): non-hunters/ observers might enjoy touring for a couple of days during the hunt to enjoy overnight stays in this historical sea-side village as well as the Namib Desert, desert creature tours, horseback riding, dune surfing, dolphin cruises and more. Since you will have the lodge to yourselves at HNS, the schedule and the staff are at your disposal to make a trip to the coast at the last minute. We can plan this ahead of trip time or make plans on the property!
- Pre-planned touring around Namibia before or after your safari: At additional expense
- We specialize in exclusive customized photographic, sightseeing safaris throughout Namibia to suit your personal interests. Destinations include, among others:
 - Etosha National Park
 - The historical sea-side village of Swakopmund, the Skeleton Coast and the Namib Desert
 - Numerous other destinations around Namibia via light aircraft.
 - Hot air balloon rides, Desert creatures' tours, dolphin cruises
 - These excursions can be undertaken in comfortable air-conditioned vehicles or by chartered flights as requested.



WEATHER

April – nice and green, cool in the mornings and 80-90’s midday

May – green is gone and it’s cool (30’s) up to 70-80’s midday

June – cold (40’s) and it warms to 50-70’s midday

July – coldest month (30’s) with 50-60’s midday

August – cool (40’s) and it warms to 70-80’s

September – 50’s to 90’s

October thru November – Hot (Good bow hunting time)

Namibia, the land of shifting sands, is a rare gem along Africa's southwestern coast – vast, wild, and waiting to be explored, hunted, and photographed by you and your family. Beyond its iconic deserts, Namibia boasts sweeping savannas teeming with wildlife, dramatic rivers, and a richness of habitats that fulfill every African safari dream.

With just over 3 million people spread across 318,000 square miles, Namibia is the second least densely populated country in the world, with only about 10 people per square mile.

Since gaining independence in 1990, Namibia has emerged as one of Africa's most stable democracies. Modern infrastructure and the warmth of our peace-loving people ensure that every visitor experiences this breathtaking land in both comfort and security.

GRATUITIES

This is not expected, nor required, but just a guideline as guests often ask for this information.

- \$100 per day per PH if 1x1
- \$70 per day per PH per hunter for 2x1
- Tips for lodge and support staff - whatever % you would normally tip in a restaurant calculated against your total daily rate.

Not Included:

- Trip Insurance is required
- Trophy fees of animals killed, wounded and lost (See list below)
- Airfares: international, national or charter
- VAT 15% on daily rates
- Any costs arising before or after scheduled pick up or departure
- Packing, dipping and shipping. Freight charges for shipment of trophies to USA or any other country, customhouse broker fees, insurance, inland freight from airport to taxidermy studio or tannery or to your home
- Taxidermy
- Special requested: Alcoholic beverages (beer @US\$3, white wine bottle@US\$20, red wine bottle@ US\$25, liquor @ US\$30 per bottle!) Special requests at cost POR
- Rental rifles: for those who do not have a suitable rifle or do not wish to travel with one,
 - .300 caliber or similar is available at \$75 per day per firearm.
 - Ammo is \$7 per round - subject to change
 - Firearm permits and assistance through customs if you are traveling through South Africa - \$250 PP, subject to change.
- Any nights needed before or after your safari because of flights through JNB
- Customised touring itineraries priced per request
- Transport to other areas, activities, specialised guide or to town on clients request
- UDS\$2.00 per kilometer
- Telephone charges
- Any personal items purchased on the client's request
- CITES permits, if needed

Wounded Game Policy

All game wounded is considered taken and will be expensed to you.
The professional hunter will make this call.

Taxidermy and Shipping Information

Taxidermy and shipping for your trophies is always something to consider as you budget for your trip. Once you harvest your trophies, we will skin the trophies in preparation for the taxidermist. Then, it will be your decision where your trophies are shipped and what taxidermist you choose to mount them. There will be shipping expenses associated with the transfer of trophies from the lodge to your taxidermist. These can often be expensive and you should consult your taxidermist before your trip to see what expenses you will incur for taxidermy and shipping.

Although the outfitters is always ready and willing to try and help with matters concerning trophies and shipping after your Safari, their responsibility for your trophies ends when they are dropped off safely with the shipping agent. The outfitter and booking agents are not responsible for the taxidermy process and shipping. While we are both happy to assist you in your decision making, we are not responsible for this portion of your trip.

PRACTICE, PRACTICE, PRACTICE

Shoot, shoot, shoot.....Not just off a bench rest but from improvised rests and shooting sticks. Some practice sessions should also be done after a strenuous exercise.

Precision Shooting School and Safari Prep Course

We highly recommend attending a safari prep course before you go on safari. There is nothing worse than dreaming of your African safari and then once the hunt comes, you do not shoot as well as you would like. A safari prep course will teach you various shooting positions, how to shoot off of sticks, distance shooting and adrenaline shooting. We highly recommend, from personal experience, the SAAM course.

Rifles & Ammunition

Rental Rifles

For your convenience, we offer camp rifles in .223, .270, .300 Win Mag, and .458 (right-handed only). Ammunition is provided at additional cost.

Bringing Rifles to Namibia

Importing rifles into Namibia is straightforward. Forms are emailed directly to the Namibian Police (we will advise), and firearms are checked in on arrival and out on departure. Each hunter may bring two rifles with up to 100 rounds per caliber, though airlines generally limit ammunition to 11 lbs per traveler. Ammunition must match the rifles brought in and may not be packed in the rifle case. Some transit countries require ammunition to be in a separate lockable container.

Legal Requirements

- Minimum caliber for plains game: 7mm
- Minimum muzzle energy: 1350 Joule (small antelope), 2700 Joule (larger plains game such as kudu, gemsbok, wildebeest, eland)
- Dangerous game: minimum .375
- Black powder rifles and bows are legal; crossbows are prohibited
- Handguns, pistols, and automatic/semi-automatic firearms are not permitted

Recommendations

- Plains game: .300 magnum or larger with a 3x9 x40 scope, though any legal rifle you are comfortable with is suitable
- Premium bullets are essential: Nosler Partition, Swift A-Frame, Barnes X, Winchester Fail Safe, and Trophy Bonded Bearclaw are proven choices
- Wingshooting: bring your favorite shotgun and ~50 shells (#7 shot); Namibia places no restriction on temporary shotgun import

Traveling with Guns to Namibia

If you are traveling with guns, you must go to your US Customs Office and fill in a form 4457 for your rifles. This requires you to take your guns to the customs office.

The Basic Regulations for a Temporary Import Permit are as follows:

- No more than ONE firearm or shotgun per caliber or gauge,
- Only 200 rounds for each permitted firearm or shotgun will be allowed.
- Check with your airline for their rules on traveling with ammunition. Most limit you to no more than 11 pounds of ammo. HOWEVER: The Namibian authorities do not place any restrictions on the temporary importation of hunting rifles.
- A maximum of 100 rounds per weapon may be imported. You will receive a form to fill out on your arrival and the permit will be issued at the airport – the process is uncomplicated.
- No ammunition for other firearms (caliber or gauge) is permitted, in other words, do not try and bring ammunition for your PH's rifle.
- You may only bring two shotguns if they are different gauges,
- Firearms must bear the manufacturer's serial number or any other mark by which the firearm can be identified. The identification number must be stamped and the mark affixed in the prescribed manner on the barrel, the frame or the receiver of the firearm,

Prohibited firearms which may NOT be imported into Namibia, includes:

- Any fully automatic weapon,
- Any semi-automatic weapon,
- No semi-automatic shotguns,
- Handguns
- Weapons which fall under military categories.

Travel Information

Flights

Book with professional assistance when possible, and choose direct flights to Windhoek.

- Arrival: No later than 4:00 p.m.
- Departure: No earlier than 9:00 a.m. (to avoid driving in the dark due to wildlife).

Airport Transfers

You will be met after customs in Windhoek by our HNS team and escorted throughout your safari until your return.

Water & Electricity

Lodge water is drawn from deep boreholes, sealed, filtered, and excellent in quality. Permanent 220-volt electricity is available.

Language & Currency

English is the official language. The Namibian Dollar (N\$) is linked 1:1 with the South African Rand.

Health

Our hunting area is malaria-free with no special vaccinations required. A government clinic is 15 minutes from camp; Windhoek (1 hour) has excellent private hospitals. Airlift is available in emergencies. PHs and staff are first-aid trained, and international medicines are stocked in camp. Health insurance and a consultation with your physician before travel are essential.

Safety

Namibia is peaceful and welcoming, with a strong pro-hunting culture protected in its Constitution. For current advisories, visit travel.state.gov.

Passport & Visa

- Passport valid at least 6 months beyond departure with 3 blank visa pages (endorsement pages not valid).
- From April 1, 2025, all tourists require a visa. Apply online via Namibia's e-Visa portal or obtain a Visa on Arrival at major airports/borders. A printed e-Visa (if pre-applied) must be presented.

- Carry on arrival: proof of accommodation, sufficient funds, travel itinerary, and travel/medical insurance.
