A Word on the Market

Market Update:

- We had a nice broad rally from the recent low up roughly 5%, some of that was during a quiet market before and after Thanksgiving. Most indexes are at a resistance level, and now near the old highs.
- The easy money from the oversold condition in the very short term has been made.
- The month of December, since 1950, the market has positive returns 79% of the time. Wow!
- The leading stocks generally perform well, and underperformers are pressured by tax loss selling.
- Next Wednesday the Federal Reserve should announce they are cutting by another .25% from the current 3.75%-4.0%. We would expect the FF rate to come down to 3% or lower in 2026. Don't Fight the Fed! We would also caution that the market is up on a very high ladder, and Powell's last news conference was not good.
- We think the market's P/E ratio is not going to advance a lot as economic growth next year will come from other sectors than just AI infrastructure to more traditional areas, consumer, financials, and healthcare. The weighting of around 48% in tech and related is where the high valuations are, so as the market broadens the valuation boost comes from other smaller sectors or stocks, not generally the market itself...this could be a lot of fun! That does not mean the risk is not elevated.
- One thing to remember is the JP Morgan
 Healthcare conference (and other firms at the

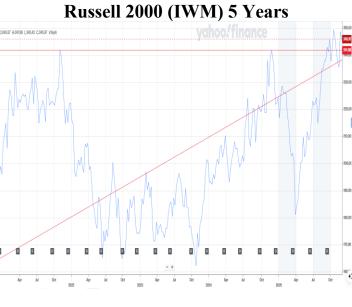

- The One Big Beautiful Bill Act (1%-2% additive to GDP) was signed into law in July of 2025 and was retroactive to the beginning of the year. The nice refunds will likely benefit the smaller retailer as opposed to WMT or AMZN. I wonder why AMZN does not buy TGT...maybe it doesn't make sense. Also, capital spending should be strong.
- The financials are a natural winner as short-term rates fall.

Buffet Indicator:

- The Buffet Indicator is the total stock market value divided by the U.S. GDP. It is at an alarmingly high level, but it is not as bad as you think.
- Our point in talking about it is coming up a lot in the media recently as it is so far past the previous peak in the year 2000.
- When you adjust for profitability, we are actually at a discount to 2000. The operating margins of the total market of all the companies in 2000 were 7.4%.
- We think operating margins may be going higher and the economy should have a cyclical pick up.
- The market is still expensive, but many companies will likely see a cyclical improvement in 2026.

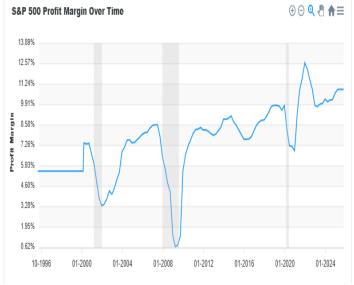
Total Stock Market/GDP
