SVWC Purchases 88 Acres

On September 15, 2025, the SVWC Board of Trustees approved the purchase of 88 acres adjacent to the campus. M. A. Smith Family, LLC owns the property. The purchase approval followed a 90-day due diligence study period. The final closing date will be in October.

Purchasing this property is a great opportunity for SVWC. The Smith property shares a large, contiguous boundary with our campus. It is one of the last remaining vacant land parcels of any size in the City of Winchester and Frederick County. Purchasing the property was a strategic move to control the land surrounding our campus for the betterment of our residents. It will allow SVWC to expand our mission and perhaps diversify our business lines. It gives the community an opportunity to expand and increase revenues.

SVWC is currently developing a new strategic plan, and we will include this newly acquired land in our discussions as we plan for the future success of the community. This property could be transformational for our community. It is an opportunity that we simply could not pass up.



Chaplain's Message

In the Gospel According to Matthew, Jesus says, "Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear... Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?"



These words bring to mind a prayer that is familiar to many, the Serenity Prayer – a prayer asking for wisdom to understand the difference between circumstances that *can* be changed and circumstances that *cannot* be changed, and asking for courage to take action in the case of the former and serenity to accept in the case of the latter. The prayer is often attributed to American theologian Reinhold Niebuhr (1892 – 1971), although there is some question as to its actual origins.

Regardless, the prayer has achieved wide distribution, used by many church groups starting in the 1930s, and adopted by groups like Alcoholics Anonymous and other 12-step organizations since 1941.

Since the early 1960s, the poem has even been co-opted by commercial enterprises like Hallmark who have used the prayer in greeting cards and on gift items.

As we travel through difficult times, may the words of this prayer offer you guidance and a sense of peace:

God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference.

Lifelong Learning

SVWC Lifelong Learning will host sessions every Monday in October starting at 2:00 p.m. and ending at approximately 3:00 p.m. in the Abbey.

The session on October 6, is called "Cryptocurrencies - Update, Projections, Markets, Regulations." Traditionally, people have exchanged goods, then gold, then currency when buying or selling things. Banks safeguarded our currency assets for us. The internet allows transactions to occur digitally, without the exchange of physical currency. "Cryptocurrency" can be created, stored, and exchanged without government or bank controls. Is it safe?

The session on October 13, addresses the "History of Vaccines." For centuries, humans have sought to protect themselves and others from diseases. Technologies and scientific tests have improved the methods over the years, and many deadly diseases now can be totally eradicated with universal vaccine use. How should public health authorities balance this public good with individual freedom and liberty to accept or decline participation?

On October 20, Dr. Roy Schwarz presents a paper he prepared for the Torch Club, "Globalization of Science." In 2024 the world spent \$2.5 trillion on scientific research. The US share of this was \$1 trillion or 3.5% of our GDP. Scientific advances improve lives and simultaneously create new problems. This paper will discuss whether new science is worth the cost.

On October 27, Peggy Miller returns to Lifelong Learning to present "The Science of Cyclical Glaciation." She plans to address advancing and receding glaciation periods, and related ocean levels as they impact human migration over many centuries.

The dedication of the putting green 25 years ago, as reported in the *Westbury World* for October, 2000:

Putting Green Dedicated

The SVWC putting green was dedicated in early September when Lewis Hyde, its donor, returned from Maine.

Joan Butler, president of the Residents Association, introduced Bill Jones who presented Hyde with a concrete core from one of the holes on a mounted plaque that read, "Thank You, Lewis Hyde, for the Hyde Park and Putting Green. SVWC Residents, August, 2000."

Bill acknowledged contributors to the pro-

ject: Andy Keeler donated the use of his Bobcat, dump truck and laser leveler; Brad Fout donated use of his concrete finishing equipment: and the Residents Woodworking Shop designed and manufactured the rack to store putters and balls on site. After Lewis's honorary "first putt," many attendees joined him on the green. All applauded Sue Jones as she sank three long aces, and retired, to preserve her "Tigress" reputation.
