006 CLERK (CONT'D)

Now enter, the Queen's prosecutors, Richard Topcliffe, Francis Walsingham, and Lord Burghley.

A PAUSE AS FEET SHUFFLE IN.

007 CLERK (CONT'D)

And the defendant, Robert Southwell.

CHAINS CLINK AS ROBERT IS DRAGGED TO HIS SEAT. WALLA: A FEW PEOPLE GASP AT ROBERT'S STATE.

008 JUDGE

START >>> Robert Southwell, you stand here accused of high treason. You are to be judged on the Statute by which to be a priest is in itself treason. And the court asks that the citizens present bear in mind the wise grounds on which the Statute has been enacted. As long as a priest is at large in England, Her Majesty's life is not safe. (BEAT)

> Will the clerk now read the Bill of Indictment?

009 CLERK

Robert Southwell, you are arraigned here as a traitor to the Crown. You, being a subject of the Queen, became ordained as a priest of the Roman Catholic Church, and therefore, by your words and actions, set allegiance to the Bishop of Rome above loyalty to your sovereign, Elizabeth, Queen of England. And in said practice, you conducted a Catholic Mass at the Bellamy residence on the 26th of July, 1592. How do you plead?

010 ROBERT

I confess I am a Catholic priest, and I thank God for it, but I am no traitor. No law can make it treason to be a priest.

011 JUDGE

You must answer the whole indictment, Mr. (MORE)

JUDGE (CONT'D)

Southwell, and either confess it, or say, Not Guilty.

012 ROBERT

I do not deny that I was at the Bellamy residence, but I never intended, as God Almighty knows, to commit any treason to the Queen or to the State. Only to minister the Sacraments to those that seemed willing to receive them.

013 JUDGE

Mr. Southwell-

014 ROBERT

Not guilty of any treason.

015 JUDGE

Very well. How will you be tried? By God and by your country?

016 ROBERT

By God and by you, I would say. For I would not lay upon my country the quilt of my condemnation.

Topcliffe, frustrated, interjects:

017 TOPCLIFFE

We are not to try you. You are to be tried "by God and by the laws."

018 ROBERT

By God, I will be tried, Topcliffe, but not by the law. For the law here is contrary to the law of God.

019 WALSINGHAM

If you refuse the trial, it shall be a sufficient condemnation.

020 ROBERT

Ah, good Sir Walsingham, I am loathe that these poor men, the jurors, should be guilty of my inevitable death. But if this is the only answer that you shall accept, then I will be tried by God and the country.

021 JUDGE

Do you wish to challenge any of the jurors before they are sworn in, Mr. Southwell?

022 ROBERT

I will challenge none.

023 JUDGE

Then I welcome the prosecution to the floor.



MUSIC UNDERSCORES THE OPENING STATEMENT.

024 LORD BURGHLEY

These indictments shall be proven easily, as it seems Mr. Southwell, despite claiming innocence, has not denied any of the indictments brought against him. Mr. Southwell having acknowledged himself to be a Catholic priest, and thanking God for it, you need not any further proof. He need not confess that he was made a priest since the first year of Her Majesty's reign, for he was not yet born when her Majesty began her reign.

(a pause, sarcastic) How old are you, anyway?

025 ROBERT

I think that I am near the age of Our Saviour who lived upon the earth thirty-three years.

026 LORD BURGHLEY

(clearing his throat) For a third point, you have already admitted you were at the Bellamy residence to administer the sacraments. Did you not know The Statute that has made this same act treason?

027 ROBERT

I know the statute. But it is impossible to make any such law agreeable to the word of God.

028 LORD BURGHLEY

Mr. Southwell, you once again let slip a word, that I must insist the jury acknowledge.
