Remembering Bill Hantke *A Legacy Of Service And Brotherhood*

AGR Iota Chapter recently lost one of its most dedicated alumni when **Bill Hantke #740** passed away on July 8, 2025, at age 80. His gentle humor, generous spirit, and unwavering integrity embodied Iota Chapter's highest ideals throughout his life.

Bill's journey began on the family farm near Edgerton and led him to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he became a lifelong member of the Iota Chapter. After building a successful food and wine packaging machinery business in California, Bill and his wife Leslie returned to Madison in 2003, where he immediately reconnected with his fraternity roots and began what would become a transformative chapter in our history.

Leading The Charge For Excellence

Upon returning to Wisconsin, Bill didn't simply rejoin AGR—he helped lead it into a new era, sustaining Iota's legacy for years to come.

Rick Daluge #787 recalls, "In 2003, when Bill and Leslie moved back to Madison, he called me and wanted to get involved with AGR. We were just starting to plan for a major remodel to the house, and Bill immediately got involved. He provided the lead gift of \$100,000 for the campaign and later took on the Corporation Board Secretary job from Dale Bruhn."

Bill's business acumen and commitment to excellence proved instrumental in driving the successful renovation of the landmark AGR house on campus in the early 2000s. **Bob Hagenow #1048** recalls Bill as "the quintessential AGR alumni that was gone from the organization for a few years and then re-engaged with complete dedication to give back to the next generations."

Bill's involvement extended far beyond financial contributions. He opened his home for training sessions, coordinated alumni and collegiate member events, and served as a mentor to countless brothers. "He gave of his time, talent and treasure," Bob noted, emphasizing how Bill's wealth of experience shaped many members of the fraternity.

A Life Of Service Beyond Brotherhood

Bill's commitment to service reached throughout his community. In recent years, he became deeply involved in voter engagement efforts, going door-to-door in Madison as part of Get Out The Vote initiatives—reflecting his belief that civic participation could help restore public confidence in democratic institutions.


His love for the natural world led to another meaningful contribution. Living in the UW Arboretum neighborhood since 2003, Bill and Leslie became passionate advocates for environmental stewardship. Their generous donation funded new stone entrance columns and 400 feet of split-rail fencing for the Longenecker Horticultural Gardens, replacing decades-old wire fencing.

The project exemplified Bill's approach to life—quietly making things better without seeking recognition. Whether working on Arboretum beautification, assisting with genealogy research, or mentoring young AGR brothers, Bill consistently demonstrated that true leadership means lifting others up.

A Lasting Legacy Of Making Better Men

Bob captured the sentiment of many, "It was a pleasure to know him and work with him over the years." Rick's words echo this sentiment, "Bill has always been one of my favorite people, and he will be sorely missed by so many of his brothers. He was a true AGR brother in all respects."

For the Iota Chapter, Bill Hantke represents the very best of what it means to be an Iota Chapter brother—some-

The Treasurer's Take *A Busy Summer At AGR*

Iota Chapter's alumni boards and collegiate chapter recently wrapped up a bevy of summer house repair and improvement projects ahead of fall semester move-in.

The following projects were completed this summer:

- "Phase 1" exterior repairs – partial reconstruction/repair of all four chimneys, exploratory work on the north (lakeside) elevation, and targeted tuck-pointing to address areas of concern
- Re-carpeting of nine student rooms
- Resurfacing epoxy floors in bathrooms and replacing one bathroom vanity
- Painting the resident advisor suite and powder room
- Cleaning and painting lower-level bike storage area
- Cleaning and re-organizing house storage areas
- Waxing basement floors

- Cleaning and painting the walk-in cooler floor
- Replacing all student room mattresses
- Refreshing house landscaping

What's on tap? Due to contractor availability, we were unable to have the white cornice on the house repainted this summer. We will look to schedule that as a future project. We're also working on some much-needed network upgrades to improve WiFi and planning for "Phase 2" exterior work.

To our donors – thank you! These projects would not have been possible without your continued support. Our collegiate members appreciate the continued commitment of our alumni to maintain a first-class living and learning environment.

A strong indication of what someone values is what they consistently dedicate effort and resources to preserving or improving. Whether it's equipment, buildings, or relationships, in order to keep something healthy, it must be nurtured. This is also the case with our beloved chapter house and the Iota Chapter as a whole.

The first phase exterior repairs on the chapter house for \$250,000, necessitated by decades of enduring Lake Mendota's weather, have been completed. Additional ongoing repairs are estimated at \$75,000 to \$100,000 annually based on a third-party assessment. This is the "planned" work and does not account for any surprises that may be encountered while repairing a brick house that is over 100 years old.

The ongoing maintenance of the chapter house is a big reason for the creation of the Sustain Iota initiative. The Educational Foundation is also responsible for funding scholarships, leadership development training, and general chapter improvement. By becoming a sustaining donor, you are contributing to all of these efforts. We hope that the easier-to-budget donations will encourage more brothers to commit to helping.

There was a good response to the initial mailing this summer, as detailed elsewhere in this edition of the Crescent. That being said, I feel like there is a critical opportunity to get more brothers engaged in supporting the organization and the chapter house that I know contributed to a good deal of our personal and professional successes.

Join me in committing to the mission of AGR Iota of making better men by becoming a sustaining donor. If 200 brothers gave \$30/month, roughly one coffee per week, we would cover the projected annual maintenance of the chapter house.

As the fall semester kicks off in Madison, the Iota Chapter is excited to be back together at 233 W. Lakelawn Place. While saying goodbye to summer is always a little tough, there's a lot of energy in the house as brothers return and get ready for the busy months ahead.

Before the brothers moved in, the executive team gathered in August to reflect on the spring semester and set priorities for the semester ahead. While we celebrated many successes, the conversation centered on recruitment. With the support of our alumni, we set a clear goal: at least 15 new initiates per class. Maintaining this benchmark will ensure a strong, consistent chapter size of 60 collegiate members and keep our house full year after year.

Thanks to a fantastic Competitive Edge program organized by brothers Ben Lukasek and Nate Sorensen, we already have four incoming freshmen moving into the house this fall. The event also gave us a list of 15 additional prospects we're excited to connect with in the coming weeks. Building on this momentum, the executive team set a goal of initiating 12 new members this semester—not including the four already moved in. We're also broadening our approach to include transfer students and other non-traditional avenues of recruitment.

Another key discussion point was housing contracts. With Madison's rental market becoming more competitive each year, it's crucial that AGR stays ahead. To that end, we plan to distribute and secure contracts by the end of October, putting us in a stronger position to remain competitive and keep our chapter house full.

Of course, the semester won't be all business. We've planned a variety of activities to strengthen our brotherhood, including a trip to a Brewers' game, Parents' Day, volunteer opportunities, and plenty of other events that bring us together outside of class.

The brothers of the Iota Chapter are fired up and ready for another semester filled with growth, camaraderie, and opportunities to continue building better men.



Roundtable: Summer Internship Experiences

Internships give AGR brothers the chance to apply classroom learning, gain professional skills, and explore career paths. We asked members to share their experiences from this past summer.



Nate Sorensen – #1770; Fall Creek, WI; Senior; Biological Systems Engineering; Meyer Manufacturing – Mechanical Engineering Intern

“This summer I worked as a Mechanical Engineering Intern at Meyer Manufacturing, where I focused on prototype equipment and test engineering. I worked on spreaders, TMR mixers, and forage boxes, traveling to farms across Wisconsin as well as to Indiana, Pennsylvania, and Massachusetts to conduct field testing. My role involved hands-on testing, diagnosing issues, documenting results, and providing feedback to improve designs. One of the most important things I learned was the value of adaptability and being able to respond to change. Prototype testing does not always go as planned, so being able to troubleshoot and find different solutions is key to project success.”



Garrett Ulness – #1772; Valders, WI; Junior; Dairy Science; Rolling Lawns Farm – Greenville, IL

“I was fortunate to get the opportunity to intern at Rolling Lawns Farms this summer. I helped out with all aspects of the farm and also their direct market dairy store. The dairy farm milks 80 cows, where I assisted with herdsman work, milking, feeding cows and heifers, and daily chores. At the store, I learned about dairy processing, worked with fluid milk and ice cream production, delivered products to consumers, and helped with consumer education. The first day of my internship, I learned my boss, Michael Turley, was also an AGR from Iowa State. I enjoyed sharing that connection with him and really got a grasp on how AGR impacts agricultural men across the country.”




Brandon Boyd – #1773; Watertown, WI; Junior; Agronomy & Agricultural Business Management; Insight FS – Mapleton, WI (Growmark Agronomy Intern)

“This summer, I had the opportunity to intern at Insight FS in Mapleton, Wisconsin, as an agronomy intern through Growmark Inc. My work involved scouting fields, setting pest traps, making product deliveries, and helping customers make agronomic decisions. I also networked with other interns in the Midwest at events in Illinois and attended sales and product training sessions. The most important thing I learned was how to properly scout fields and identify various indicators of weed pressure and plant health that I had often overlooked in the past.”



Gage Anderson – #1780; Waupaca, WI; Junior; Agronomy with Certificate in Agricultural Business Management; Pest Pros – Plainfield, WI (Allied Coop. Division)

“This summer I interned at Pest Pros, a division of Allied Cooperative. I was primarily scouting potatoes, but also corn, soybeans, green beans, carrots, cabbage, and alfalfa. I looked for insects, diseases, weeds, and nutrient status. With that information, I wrote reports for each field that were sent to the grower and agronomist to help make recommendations. I learned how to time spray applications of insecticide, herbicide, and fungicide, as well as alternatives for organic systems.”



Jason Burck – #1782; Middleton, WI; Junior; Food Science; Grande Cheese Company – Research & Development Intern, Custom Ingredients Group (CIG)

“This summer, I interned at Grande Cheese Company, an Italian cheese manufacturer based in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. I was responsible for formulating new products, conducting laboratory tests, and identifying new applications for Grande’s custom whey-based ingredients. Through these responsibilities, I gained experience in project planning, conducting research, creating nutrition labels, and presenting findings to large audiences. One of the most valuable lessons I learned was how to collaborate effectively with people who have different communication styles, even in high-pressure environments.”



Garrison Korn – #1797; Westby, WI; Senior; Biological Systems Engineering; 1901 Inc. – AutoCAD & BIM Designer

“During my internship with 1901 Inc., I supported the plumbing design team by creating and modifying detailed drawings and models using AutoCAD and Revit. I developed coordinated plumbing layouts for the EPIC Systems campus, helping to expand their growing facilities. My work included drafting piping systems, reviewing design clashes, updating plan sets, and collaborating with engineers and project managers to integrate plumbing systems with other trades. This summer, I learned how to navigate the full process of building design on a large scale, which strengthened both my technical skills and confidence in plumbing design.”



Nick Needham – #1800; Fennimore, WI; Sophomore; Dairy Science (Pre-Vet); Lancaster Veterinary Clinic & Grant County Humane Society

“I got to observe and stand in on everything the doctor did throughout the week, learning side-by-side. I also volunteered at the humane society, helping with the animals housed there, cleaning, and assisting with adoptions. I got to see all the aspects of the business and acquire lots of knowledge about the field I want to pursue.”

Roundtable Discussion: Why I Joined AGR

“I joined AGR because of the people and the opportunities to grow personally and professionally. The brotherhood, leadership experiences, and connections in agriculture have already pushed me outside my comfort zone and helped me develop skills I’ll use long after college.”

Brandon Boyd – #1773; Watertown, WI; Junior; Agronomy and Agricultural Business Management

“I joined AGR for two reasons. First, I would have never joined AGR if it were not for the brothers who went out of their way to welcome me when I was deciding on which college to attend, and the connections I made with them before starting college. Second, I feel this is the best organization on campus for men entering agriculture to network and gain professional skills.”

Gage Anderson – #1780; Waupaca, WI; Junior; Agronomy with a certificate in Agricultural Business Management

“I joined AGR because I liked the sound of it being a social-professional organization. The genuine brotherhood and supportive community have made my college experience what it is. It has been a great way to connect with like-minded men in agriculture on a big campus. The professional development opportunities, such as the Recruitment School and National Convention, have been great experiences.”

“I joined AGR to connect with students from other agricultural majors and to feel more a part of the broader ag community.
