Introduction

Putting It Into Practice

- **Reject cultural definitions of success:** Realize that high achievement in the world can still be a wasted life if it’s not aligned with eternal values.
- **Pursue faithfulness over outcomes:** God measures faithfulness, not flash. Stay steady even when results seem slow.

When you live like this, your life becomes a visible testimony of an invisible faith. And you prepare yourself for that moment when, face to face, you’ll hear the words you’ve been longing for: “Well done.”
