2025 has been a year of milestones.

We received a record number of songs entered into our competitions, we awarded over 200 of these songs as finalists and a day in a recording studio to professionally record their song. We launched the Play It Strange podcast, and have partnered with festivals and radio stations to continue providing more opportunities to the talented rangatahi who enter our Play It Strange world.

876 original songs and waiata have been entered into our competitions this year from secondary school students nationwide – the most in our 22-year history. Behind each of those songs are young people finding their voice, building confidence, and feeling empowered to share their creativity with the world.

This year we launched our first-ever podcast series, On The Record. Season 1 hosted by Play It Strange alumni Rei debuted in July, followed by Season 2 hosted by another alumni Chaii in November. Across both seasons, our hosts sit down with some of Aotearoa's leading artists and industry legends – acting as a toolkit for emerging artists to navigate the music industry in Aotearoa. If you haven't watched or listened yet – please check it out on Spotify, YouTube, or Rova!

We have also strengthened our alumni pathways through more live performance opportunities than ever before – through partnerships with Moana Auckland, Press Play with BIG FAN, and bFM, and by taking alumni to industry events such as the Aotearoa Music Awards, Taite Music Prize, Pacific Music Awards, Synthony in the Domain, and the APRA Silver Scrolls.

Our 2025 mentors and judges, including Bic Runga, Louis Baker, Rebel Reid, Dame Hinewehi Mohi, Kings, Chaii, our founder Mike Chunn and more continue to give their time and wisdom generously. Their support, alongside the dedication of our partners and funders, reminds us that Play It Strange is a true community, and only exists because of those who believe in and support us.

Finally, I want to acknowledge our small but mighty team – Evie, Paige, Emily, and Brad – whose creativity, passion, and relentless mahi make everything you read in this report possible. Thank you also to our founder, Mike Chunn, for his ongoing passion and wisdom, and to our Board of Trustees for their support in everything we do.

Salem is a five-time Play It Strange finalist (in 2023, 2024 and 2025), in 2023 won Rockquest Solo-Duo and in 2022 won Whakaata Māori TV's singing series '5 Minutes of Fame'.

"[A girl named Abigail] is a metaphorical song that I wrote after watching a movie called We Live in Time [a romantic drama starring Andrew Garfield and Florence Pugh]. It's about a woman with cancer and [the song] is based on my auntie Keri, who passed away from cancer when I was 4."

Betty was a Play It Strange finalist twice last year with her songs 'Willow's Song' and 'Sweet Potato'. Betty also had the winning album artwork on the 2024 Peace Song Competition album.

Betty's music has been influenced by Radiohead, Elliott Smith, Linda Perhacs, and competition judge Bic Runga.

As part of her prize, Betty received the opportunity to work with composer, James Cullen to create a backing arrangement for a quartet of orchestral instruments - cello, French horn, clarinet and flute - thanks to Auckland Philharmonia and their Learn & Participate programme, who joined Betty in the recording studio.

Betty celebrated her success winning this competition during interviews with ZM, bFM, LifeFM amongst others.

Mike Chunn CNZM

For the past 21 years, Mike has listened to every single Play It Strange submission more than 6500 songs.



Dave Johnston

Three-time Aotearoa Music Award winner, Dave is a producer, engineer, composer, musician, lecturer and songwriter. Not only is he a founding member and drummer of iconic alternative rock band Villainy, he's also one half of DJ duo Delivery Boys.



Louis Baker

An APRA Silver Scrolls nominee, Louis was a Play It Strange finalist in 2009 and has now toured New Zealand, Australia, the UK and Europe multiple times.



Dianne Swann

Dianne first gained recognition in the Aotearoa industry with When the Cat's Away, the iconic Kiwi supergroup of the late 1980s. Dianne has been nominated for the Taite Music Prize and was inducted into the NZ Music Hall of Fame in 2021.

CHAII, Play It Strange alumni from 2009, stood beside Stan Walker in the highest number of nominations for the 2025 Aotearoa Music Awards.



Josh Fountain

Josh's band LEISURE recently completed a sell-out USA tour and have over 400 million streams on Spotify. He is Benee's producer and main writing collaborator, winning the APRA Silver Scrolls in 2020 with 'Glitter' and being added to the 1,000,000,000 List for surpassing 1 BILLION streams of 'Supalonely'.



Georgia Lines

Bic Runga

Recently nominated as a finalist for the 2025 Taite Music Prize and Aotearoa Music Award for 'Album of the Year, Georgia released her first album in lockdown and she's been capturing hearts with her soulful vocals ever since.

award. Her large discography has

resonated with listeners all around

the world for over two decades.



Rebel Reid

A 2005 Play It Strange finalist, Rebel is a producer, songwriter, and quitarist. As a member of the band Valkyrie, she has ventured into the Nevada desert to film epic music videos and played at Aotearoa's top festivals such as Splore.



In his role as co-Managing Director at Universal Music NZ, Matt is responsible for working with some of Aotearoa's most prestigious artists such as Six60, Lorde, Muroki, and Shapeshifter.





Hinewehi Mohi

Dame Hinewehi (Ngāti Kahungunu, Ngāi Tūhoe) has been a pivotal force in the widespread revitalisation of te reo Māori in contemporary music. Her performance of the National Anthem in te reo at the 1999 Rugby World Cup is a defining reason as to why we sing it in both Māori and English today; and her double-platinum, debut album released in the same year was the first contemporary Māori language album to be released internationally.



Kings

Producer and hip-hop artist Kings has won multiple Aotearoa Music Awards including Breakthrough Artist of the Year, Best Pacific Male Artist, Best Urban Artist and Best Producer.





Paige

Paige is an award-winning singer-songwriter from Tāmaki Makaurau. Her 2023 debut album saw her nominated for 'Album of the Year' and 'Best Pop Act' at the 2024 AMAs. Paige's 2020 EP, ALWAYS GROWING, has been certified platinum in South Korea and earned her two nominations at the 2020 Aotearoa Music Awards for 'Pop Artist of the Year' and 'Breakthrough Artist'. It also saw Paige awarded 'Best Māori Female Solo Artist' at the 2021 Waiata Māori Music Awards. Paige also works with us at Play It Strange as our Operations & Marketing Manager.



Eliette Roslin

Play It Strange alumni Eliette launched Eliettes Music Academy in 2016 which has since grown to three locations and 700+ students enrolled in their music and songwriting classes. In 2018, Eliette launched The Green Room Charitable Trust, a music programme supporting young people struggling with mental health. She was named a KiwiBank Local Hero in 2019 and a semi-finalist for Young New Zealander of the Year in 2020!



Laughton Kora

Laughton has been at the forefront of New Zealand music for over the past decade. At 17 years old he won Smokefree Rockquest and went on see great success as a founding member of Aunty Beatrice, Soul Charge and KORA. Laughton has toured extensively around the world.



Troy Kelly

Troy is the founder and engineer of The Armoury, a world-class recording studio in Wellington. As well as being a 2025 judge, Troy has been supporting our finalists in their recordings for many years.



Lilv Paris West




