Emotionally intelligent leadership becomes highly stabilising during uncertainty.

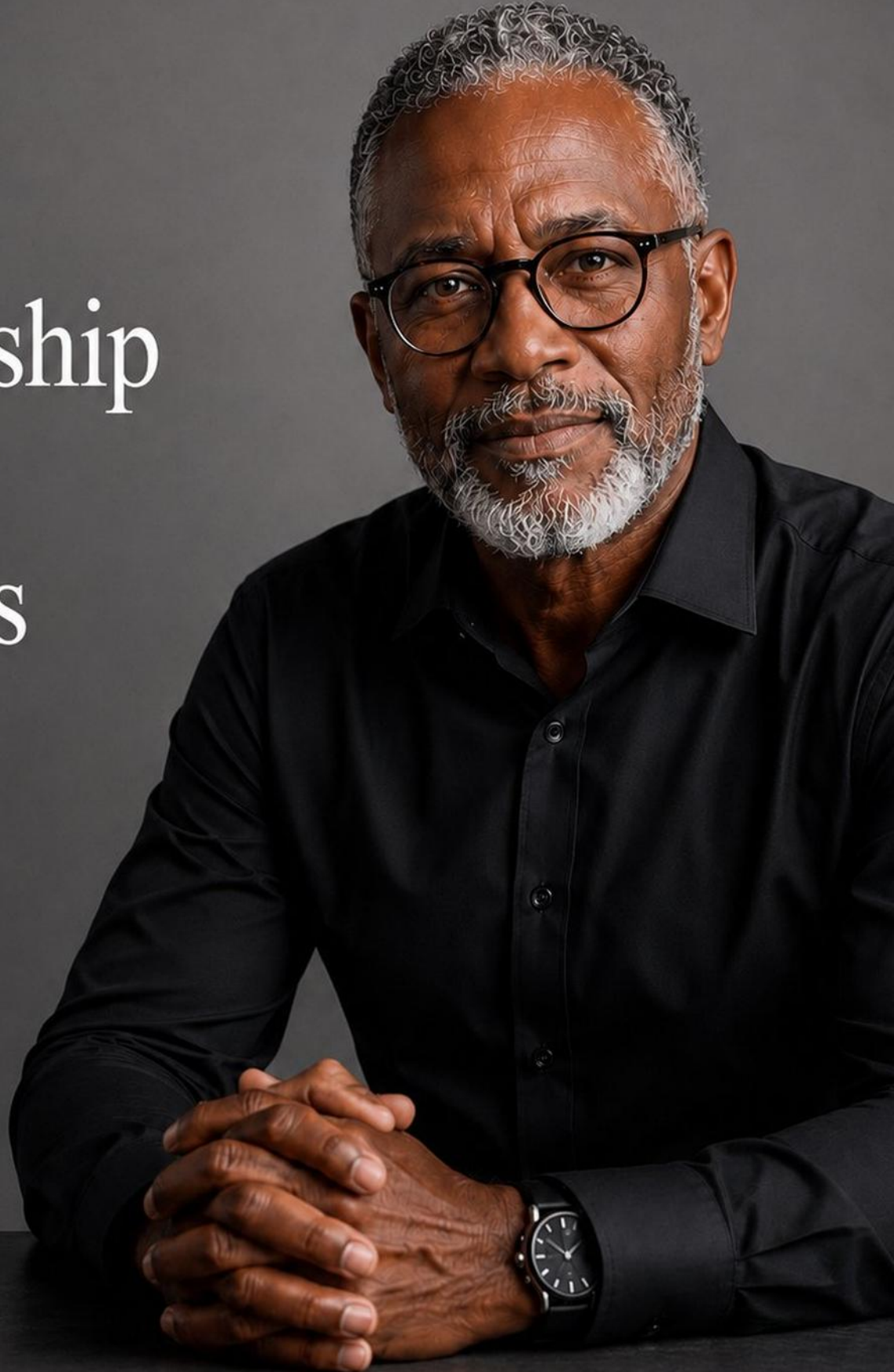
