By providing this notice, First Harvest Federal Credit Union (“First Harvest”) located at 1617 Hurffville Road, Deptford, NJ 08096, does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or about February 3, 2026, First Harvest became aware of suspicious activity involving an employee email account and promptly launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the activity. The investigation determined that an unknown actor accessed one email account on January 14, 2026, and potentially accessed certain data within the email account. As a result, First Harvest began working with a third-party to perform a thorough and time-intensive review of the potentially accessed data to determine the types of information contained within and to whom the information belonged. This review recently concluded on April 17, 2026. Although First Harvest has no evidence of any identity theft or fraud in connection with this incident, First Harvest is notifying those individuals whose information was potentially impacted.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name, Social Security number, financial account information, and payment card information.

Notice to Maine Residents

On or about May 6, 2026, First Harvest provided written notice of this incident to eight (8) Maine residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, First Harvest moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of First Harvest’s email environment, and identify potentially affected individuals. First Harvest is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. First Harvest is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, First Harvest is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. First Harvest is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one’s credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

First Harvest is providing written notice of this incident to relevant state and federal regulators, as necessary, and to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

First Harvest Federal Credit Union (“First Harvest”) writes to inform you of a recent event that may affect the privacy of some of your information. This letter provides details of the event, our response, and resources available to assist you in safeguarding your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened. On February 3, 2026, First Harvest became aware of suspicious activity involving an employee email account. In response, we launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the activity and determined that an unknown actor accessed one email account on January 14, 2026, and potentially accessed certain data within the email account. As a result, we began working with a third-party to perform a thorough and time-intensive review of the potentially impacted data to determine the types of information contained within and to whom the information belonged. This review recently concluded on April 17, 2026. Since then, we have worked to validate the data and confirm necessary address information to prepare for notification.

What Information Was Involved? The review determined your <<b2b_text_2 (name data elements)>> were present in the involved email account and potentially viewed. At this time, we have no indication that your information was subject to actual or attempted misuse as a result of this incident.

What We Are Doing. We take this incident and the security of personal information in our care seriously. As part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy of information in our care, we are implementing additional technical security measures and are reviewing and enhancing existing policies and procedures.

As an added precaution, First Harvest is offering you complimentary access to <<b2b_text_3 (twelve (12) / twenty-four (24))>> months of credit monitoring through Experian, specializing in fraud assistance and remediation services, as well as guidance on how to better protect your information, should you feel it appropriate to do so. Details of this offer and instructions on how to enroll in the services may be found in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Protect Personal Information*. Please note that, due to privacy restrictions, we are unable to automatically enroll you in the offered credit monitoring services, and you will need to complete the activation process yourself using the enrollment instructions included in this letter.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors over the next twelve to twenty-four months. Additional information may be found in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Protect Personal Information*.

Enroll in Monitoring Services

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.
