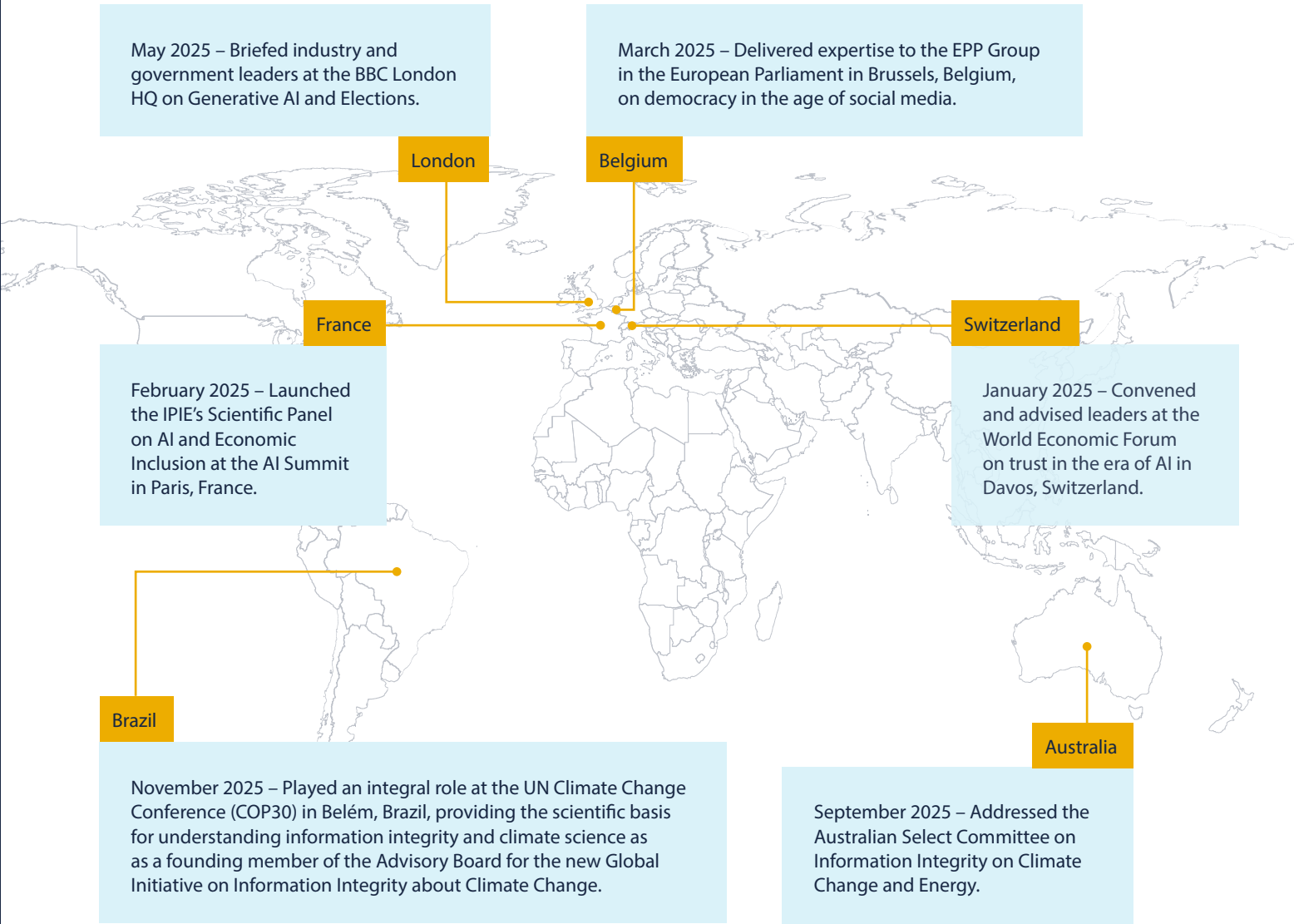

About the IPIE’s Global Standards for AI Auditing Panel

AI systems are increasingly shaping everyday life across sectors, yet those developing and deploying them are often unclear on how to govern AI responsibly. There are currently no global standards for auditing them, despite growing calls from both governments and industry to establish them. The IPIE’s Scientific Panel on Global Standards for AI Audits brought together international experts from across the social, computer, and engineering sciences, as well as the humanities, to define what rigorous and comprehensive AI audits should look like. Chaired by Professor Wendy Chun, the Panel worked to identify the criteria, methodologies, and processes that should form the basis of global standards, with the aim of ensuring AI systems are assessed fairly and in the public interest.

KEY FINDINGS

The report identified five core requirements for any credible AI audit: common standards and procedures, auditor independence, access to evidence, transparent reporting, and assessment of global impacts. It further proposed a seven-feature framework covering audit scope, auditor role, stakeholder engagement, context-appropriate criteria, evidence requirements, methodology, and post-audit activities. The report called on policymakers to adopt this framework to build an audit ecosystem that is genuinely global, independent, and centered on human rights.

Trust Under Threat: Safeguarding Epistemic Security

The information environment is under great pressure, as are the individuals studying it. The IPIE’s third annual Expert Survey captured the views of 438 researchers from 76 countries on the health of the global information environment. For the third year in a row, experts grew more pessimistic about the future, underlining mounting concern about information integrity, polarization, and structural weaknesses in the systems that shape public debate.

KEY FINDINGS

- Pessimism is rising. In 2025, 72% of respondents expected the information environment to worsen. That is a nine-point increase from 2024 and an 18-point increase since the first survey in 2023.
- Concerns about platforms have grown. 75% of experts now see the lack of platform accountability as a major threat.
- Experts say social media has worsened problems like polarization while also supporting political participation.
- Search engines are seen as having a positive effect on the information environment overall, more so than recommender systems, social media, and AI.
- The dominance of large private media companies is considered the main barrier to diverse voices being represented.

About the IPIE’s Science and Methodology Committee

The Science and Methodology Committee is the IPIE’s core scientific authority, responsible for evaluating the state of the global information environment and assessing threats to information integrity such as algorithmic bias and manipulation. It produces reports on the latest science, commissions original research, and charters domain-specific Scientific Panels. The Committee also engages governments, technology companies, and civil society in consensus-building, and communicates its findings broadly to policymakers, the media, and the public.



ASSESSING THE GLOBAL FOOTPRINT OF GENERATIVE AI

In 2025, the Science and Methodology Committee published a technical paper, *The Role of Generative AI Use in 2024 Elections Worldwide*. This paper offered the first global, data-driven assessment of GenAI’s role across all 50 countries that held competitive national elections in 2024, capturing incidents including the use of synthetic media to mislead voters and AI-driven voter targeting.

MEDIA COVERAGE

This scientific assessment sparked significant international media coverage and was covered in major outlets



In the unusually concentrated wave of elections that took place in 2024, A.I. was used in more than 80 percent, according to the International Panel on the Information Environment, an independent organization of scientists based in Switzerland.

KEY FINDINGS

The report revealed that GenAI incidents occurred in 80% of 2024 national elections, with 90% involving generated content such as images, videos, audio, or social media posts. Almost half of the incidents have no known source (46%); a quarter was produced by political candidates and parties (25%), and a fifth was produced by foreign actors (20%). Nearly 70% of these incidents were described as having a harmful role in electoral processes.

This evidence base fills critical gaps in understanding how synthetic content interacts with political communication and underscores the urgency of policy responses to protect electoral integrity and public trust.

“Generative AI presents unique challenges to democratic systems around the world, often amplifying existing problems and making it harder for voters to distinguish accurate information. In 2024, the potential benefits of these technologies were largely eclipsed by their harmful misuse. It’s more important than ever to understand these risks and to support efforts that promote responsible use of AI in democratic contexts.”

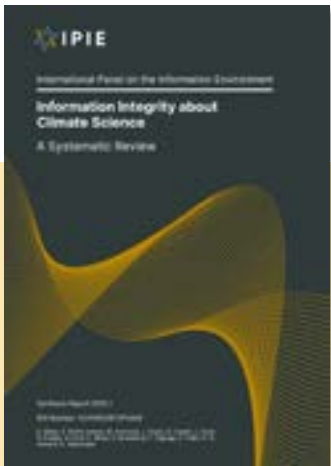

About the Information Integrity & Climate Science Panel

Despite the severity of the threat posed by climate change, public understanding of it is being undermined by coordinated information operations spread through social media. These attacks erode trust in both scientific institutions and the political bodies needed to act on climate evidence. The IPIE’s Scientific Panel on Information Integrity about Climate Science addressed this by reviewing the latest research on how media and communication shape public understanding of climate change. It then translated these findings into practical recommendations for policymakers, technology platforms, and other stakeholders to better protect climate science and support informed public debate.



PUBLISHING A LANDMARK REVIEW

The Panel published Information Integrity about Climate Science: A Systematic Review in February 2025. This landmark report synthesized hundreds of studies to chart how information integrity threats, ranging from organized denial networks to misleading narratives about renewable solutions, continue to undermine trust and delay policy progress.

INFORMING THE GLOBAL AGENDA AT COP30

At COP30 in Belém, information integrity rose to the top of the climate policy conversation. The Panel’s evidence and recommendations shaped high-level discussions, underscoring that public trust in science is foundational to implementing effective climate action. The IPIE became a founding member of the Global Initiative for Information Integrity on Climate Change and was co-author of the landmark international declaration, now endorsed by 26 countries and the EU, affirming shared commitments to protecting information integrity about climate science.

KEY FINDINGS

Powerful actors, including corporations, governments, and political parties, intentionally spread inaccurate or misleading narratives about anthropogenic climate change. These narratives circulate across digital, broadcast, and interpersonal communication channels. The result is a decline in public trust, diminished policy coordination, and a feedback loop between scientific denialism and political inaction.

MEDIA COVERAGE

Within just one month of publication, the report generated substantial global attention, featuring in 115 media articles and reaching an estimated audience of 219 million people.



“It is a major problem,” said Dr Klaus Jensen, of the University of Copenhagen, who co-led the IPIE review. “If we don’t have the right information available, how are we going to vote for the right causes and politicians, and how are politicians going to translate the clear evidence into the necessary action? Unfortunately, I think the [bad actors] are still very, very active, and probably have the upper hand now.”

“What emerges is a picture of strategic disruption—carefully designed to appear moderate, reasonable, and data-driven, while quietly obstructing action,” IPIE says in its summary for policymakers. Delay tactics can be considered the “new denial” the report notes. It might manifest as inaccurate claims about renewable energy’s impact on the environment or falsely blaming power outages on renewables.

About the IPIE’s Scientific Panel on AI and Peacebuilding

AI is increasingly being applied to peacebuilding and conflict resolution, from analyzing conflict dynamics and predicting risks to supporting mediation and post-conflict reconciliation. But the same tools can also be used for violence and repression, raising real concerns about transparency, accountability and human rights. The Scientific Panel on AI and Peacebuilding is conducting rigorous, evidence-based research to properly weigh the opportunities against the risks.



ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND PEACEBUILDING

The Panel’s first report highlights the most promising uses of AI for peacebuilding, based on the largest systematic review spanning peacebuilding, humanitarian response, AI ethics, and technology governance. Drawing on evidence from over 600 articles, it also sets out key safeguards for responsible use.

KEY FINDINGS

AI is already shaping conflict situations worldwide, both for good and for harm.

The Panel identified four promising peacebuilding uses of AI, including early warning and forecasting, inclusive digital dialogue, humanitarian crisis mapping, and reducing online polarization.

The same tools carry risks: AI can also be used for repression, surveillance, and eroding information integrity.

Responsible governance is essential to make the benefits outweigh the risks. Recommended actions include:

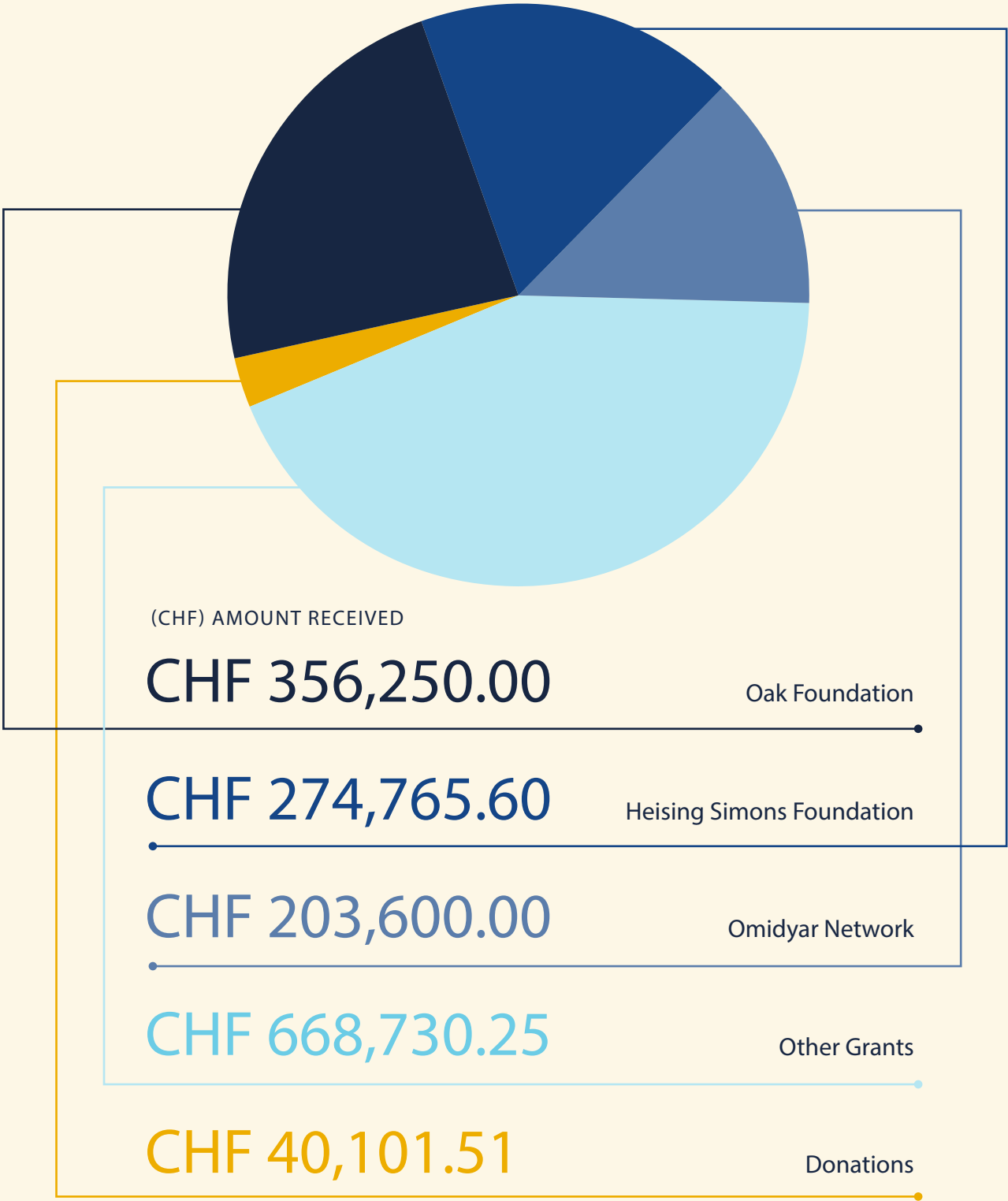
- Putting human rights and “do no harm” first in AI design and use
- Funding open, evidence-based research, including failures, not just successes
- Supporting smaller AI models built for local languages and contexts
- Ensuring transparency and accountability for tools that can be used for both good and harm
- Building stronger partnerships across peacebuilding, development and technology sectors

“Even if human rights guide the design of AI, human intervention must play a central role in safeguarding its potential for good. This echoes the importance of locally generated data to ensure AI supports context-specific peace efforts. Local knowledge and methods in addressing data poverty and enabling data sovereignty in the Global South is essential to have grounded, inclusive, and locally informed approaches to AI in peacebuilding.”

Child Protection and Social Media

The next scientific report from our Scientific Panel on Child Protection and Social Media will examine how platform design and monetization mechanisms contribute to online child sexual exploitation and abuse. The Panel will also engage policymakers and key stakeholders at various global summits, including the Second Global Ministerial Conference on Ending Violence Against Children in the Philippines in November 2026.



Climate Science and Information Integrity

Our new Scientific Panel on Information Integrity and the Climate Transition will synthesize global research on how information environments shape public understanding of climate policy, examine the financial structures sustaining climate information integrity threats, and provide evidence-based recommendations for policymakers, regulators, and technology platforms.



Indexing the Information Environment

Our Indexing the Information Environment Panel will publish the foundational work for a first-of-its-kind index focused on political information environments. The conceptual framework for a new index will lay out the theoretical groundwork, followed by a data and gap analysis mapping what is needed to move from concept to implementation.



2026 Expert Survey

The IPIE's fourth annual Expert Survey will return in 2026, tracking how researchers around the world assess the health of the global information environment. It will build on the trends identified in the 2025 survey, offering funders, policymakers, and other stakeholders an updated benchmark.
