 - o The 19 acres with the mall and the adjoining 7.5 acres:
 - I was informed by the property owners attorneys that they are hopeful to be going under contract with a buyer in November with a closing date of January.
 - The 22 acres submitted for housing:
 - The same buyer/developer has interest in this property as well for some type of housing. It is dependent on the buyer being able to purchase the 19 acres with the mall.

 now with the state for approval hopefully. I will update when more information

 - Removal of the Shared Road markings on Prospect St.

- Stantec is currently developing design alternatives and preliminary plans. We
 have received the preliminary draft of the Initial Proposal and Final Design
 Report last month for our review. They are targeted to provide the final version
 in the coming weeks.

The Niagara Hand Pumper that originally serving Champlain in the 1870's is scheduled to arrive on Thursday, October 16th. Just a reminder October is Fire Prevention Month. There is nothing to report for Rouses Point Fire Department. There will be information on the website regarding the Burn Ban due to the drought. The Village of Rouses Point Board Meetings will be Monday, October 20th and Monday, November 3rd at 7:00 pm at Halstead Hall. The Village of Rouses Point will have the fall clean up days starting October 20th through October 24th all items are to be curb side by October 20th as the Village Staff will be traveling on each street only once during the week. The residents should have plastic bags. No pickup of paint cans, tires, stumps, waste oil, stones cement and wood. Reminder, Friday, October 31st is Halloween and there will be many vehicles parked and moving on the streets and children/adults will be out and about so proceed carefully when driving about. WHEREAS, Sewer District No. 7 is a duly created special improvement District created under Article 12-A of the Town Law, which has located therein infrastructure for the purpose of providing wastewater collection to the District and its inhabitants; and,

WHEREAS, the Village currently has sufficient capacity to treat wastewater at the anticipated discharge by the District for the term of this Intermunicipal Sewer Agreement (IMA); and,

WHEREAS, the District desires to connect to and discharge wastewater into the Village sewer service facility upon the terms set forth herein the agreement for a thirty-five (35) year period commencing on October 15, 2025 unless earlier terminated pursuant to the provisions hereof or as otherwise provided by law or regulation; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the foregoing, the term of this Agreement shall not expire and this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and the parties hereto covenant and agree that no material amendments may be made to this Agreement for the duration of the NYS – EFC financing in connection with the Project; and now

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board of the Town of Champlain does hereby approve entering into this IMA between the Village of Rouses Point N.Y. a New York municipal corporation with offices at 139 Lake St. Rouses Point, NY and the Town of Champlain, as governing board of the Town of Champlain Sewer District No. 7, a New York municipal corporation with offices at 10729 Route 9 Champlain, NY,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a roll call vote is carried to approve said resolution.

WHEREAS, the Town and Village will supply water as per the Intermunicipal Agreement (IMA) between the Town and Village of Champlain and the Champlain Fire District at \$0.00 per K-Gal (no-charge) to the Champlain Fire District upon the terms set forth therein the agreement for a thirty-five (35) year period commencing on November 10, 2025 unless earlier terminated pursuant to the provisions thereof or as otherwise provided by law or regulation; and

WHEREAS, it is further recorded that the Town will charge the Champlain Fire District the standard service fee for water users as per annual budget appropriations; and now

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board of the Town of Champlain does hereby approve entering into this IMA between the Village of Champlain, the Champlain Fire District, and the Town of Champlain, as governing board of Water District No. 6, a New York Municipal Corporation with offices at 10729 Route 9 Champlain, NY,

RESOLUTION # 46 of 2025

TO APPROVE LOCAL LAW # 5 of 2025 TO OVERRIDE THE TAX LEVY LIMIT ESTABLISHED IN GENERAL MUNICIPLE LAW § 3-c.

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this local law to override the limit on the amount of real property taxes that may be levied by the Town of Champlain pursuant to General Municipal Law 3-c, and to all the Town of Champlain to adopt a budget for the fiscal year of 2026 that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the "tax levy limit" as defined by General municipal Law 3-c; and,

WHEREAS, this Local Law is adopted pursuant to subdivision 5 of General Municipal Law 3-c, which expressly authorizes the Town Board to override the tax cap by the adoption of a local law approved by vote of sixty percent of the Town Board; and,

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Champlain, County of Clinton is hereby authorized to adopt a budget for the fiscal year 2026 that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the amount otherwise proscribed in General Municipal Law; 3-c; and,

WHEREAS, if any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this Local Law or the application thereof to any person, firm or corporation, or circumstance, shall be adjusted by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgement shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of the Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, firm or corporation or circumstance, directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered; and,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of the Town of Champlain authorizes the tax cap override for 2026 under Local Law No. 5 of 2025; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a roll call vote is carried to approve said resolution and a copy of this Resolution is to be given to the Secretary of the Board.
