OPENING AND CLOSING CEREMONIES

Opening Ceremony

The Opening Ceremony will mark the beginning of the 2025 Canada Games.

Athletes, coaches, support staff, and viewers from coast-to-coast-to-coast will be taken on a journey Saturday, August 9, 2025, at the Mary Browns Centre in St. John's.

As is customary, the Opening Ceremony will commence with a "Parade of Teams", where Games participants will march into the arena, one provincial or territorial (P/T) team at a time. Each delegation will be led by their chosen flag bearer. In addition to hearing from a number of speakers, the Opening Ceremony will also feature an artistic program that will showcase St. John's culture and history in an entertaining and creative way.

Our country's largest multi-sport event will conclude with the Closing Ceremony at the Mary Browns Centre in St. John's on Sunday, August 24, 2025.

Games participants and spectators alike will be treated to a party-like atmosphere while celebrating the achievements of 2025's athletes!

Along with another "Parade of Teams" and a set of speakers, the Closing Ceremony will feature the extinguishment of the Canada Games Cauldron, bringing an end to the 2025 Canada Games. Representatives of the Quebec 2027 Canada Winter Games will also be on hand to accept the traditional handover of the Official Canada Games Flag.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION

Volunteer Uniform

All volunteers are provided with a 2025 Canada Games uniform from FWD Clothing, Official Outfitting Partner of the Canada Games, to easily identify an individual as a part of the volunteer team.

Uniform includes:

- Lightweight Water Resistant Jacket
- * Two Short Sleeved Shirts
- * Hat

Accessories Include:

- Bilingual/Medical Volunteers Neck Gaiter
- Photographers/Social Squad/Mascot Handler(s) Bibs







Volunteers are required to arrive for their shift in uniform, clean and presentable, and clothed properly for the indoor or outdoor conditions.

Volunteers are asked to wear self-provided bottoms. Bottoms should be a solid color and professional looking.

Wear comfortable closed-toed footwear that will allow you to perform your tasks safely.

Remember:

- Uniforms cannot be worn outside of your scheduled volunteer shifts during Games-time
- Keep your uniform clean and presentable at all times
- Your uniform pieces should be the outermost layer
- Write your name on each of your uniform pieces
- Do not alter or modify your uniform





Volunteer Code of Conduct

Volunteers will be the face of the 2025 Canada Games, individuals who are friendly, outgoing, knowledgeable, easily approachable, and service-oriented. As integral members of the 2025 Games team, volunteers are expected to conduct themselves in a professional manner, abide by the Volunteer Code of Conduct and uphold the core values of the Host Society.

What volunteers will be able to expect from the 2025 Canada Games Host Society:

- to have a safe, supportive, and healthy environment
- to be treated respectfully, fairly, and equitably as part of the team
- to have access to information about the Canada Games, its history, policies, and purpose
- to receive reasonable accommodation for any special needs they may have
- Personal information will be kept confidential

What the Host Society will expect from volunteers:

- to approach their volunteer role with enthusiasm, honesty and an open mind
- to treat others with respect, courtesy, fairness and sensitivity

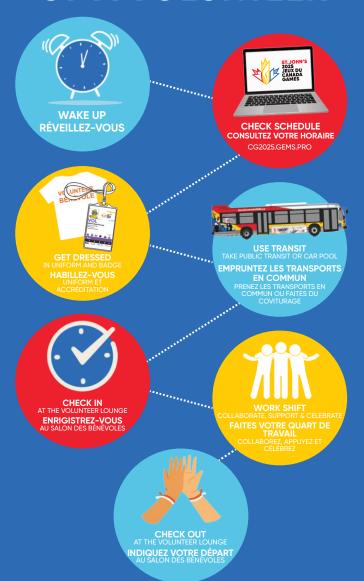


- to exercise sound judgment in decision-making and maintain confidentiality
- to represent the Games in a professional manner at all times
- to refrain from speaking publicly on behalf of the **Host Society**
- to not express any negative comments or perspectives about the Games while on duty, in uniform, or while volunteering
- Ensure safety while carrying out their assigned duties
- Not be under the influence during their shift





A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A VOLUNTEER



Daily Volunteer Checklist

Preparing to be a Volunteer:

- Make sure you have your full uniform, accreditation badge, and any specialized items you need to perform your volunteer duties.
- Confirm on https://cg2025.gems.pro/ the time, date, and location of your scheduled shift.
- Check transportation to and from your venue.
- Check weather conditions and ensure you are dressed appropriately.
- Ensure your phone is charged.

Volunteer Check-In/Out Point

The volunteer check in/out point will be located in the Volunteer Lounge of each venue.

All volunteers must check in prior to their shift and check out once the shift has been completed.

Volunteers must wear their uniform and have their accreditation badge visible when entering the venue.

If volunteers have borrowed items or have any equipment, they must return it to their appropriate supervisor at the end of their shift.



The Volunteer Services volunteers oversee the check-in/out point and ensure the current daily volunteer schedules are available. The schedule will have an accurate representation of how many volunteers are at the venue at any given time.

Volunteer - After Your Shift is Done

- Check out with your supervisor when your replacement arrives
- Ensure you have your uniform and belongings before you leave
- Check out at the Volunteer Lounge
- Oetermine how to return home safely
- If you remain in your volunteer uniform, you are representing the 2025 Canada Games - be mindful of your actions, including social media posts

What to do When you Can't Make a Shift

If you can no longer make an accepted volunteer shift or require a scheduled shift change prior to Games time (August 7, 2025, or earlier), please contact the Volunteer Centre.

Once the Games begin (August 8 - 25, 2025), for any scheduled shift changes you must give sufficient notice no later than **four hours** prior to your scheduled shift.





Contact the Venue Operation Centre's phone line to notify your supervisor and/or contact the Volunteer Centre.

Ensure you identify your full name, volunteer role, five digit GEMS.pro ID number, venue, and scheduled shift.

Service Excellence

A friendly smile, a warm greeting and sincere eye contact, all make our client groups such as athletes, coaches, and spectators feel welcome and know they are going to be well looked after during their time at the Games.

DO

- Treat others with respect, courtesy, fairness, and sensitivity
- Exercise sound judgment in decision-making and maintain confidentiality
- Represent the Games in a professional manner at all times
- Refrain from speaking publicly on behalf of the **Host Society**
- Ensure safety while carrying out your assigned duties

DO NOT

- Do not accept gifts or gratuities
- Do not consume alcohol or use illegal drugs
- Do not fight or treat others in a violent or abusive manner
- Do not take photographs or approach athletes, spectators or VIPs for photographs
- Do not smoke or vape in public view (only in designated areas) during your designated breaks
- Do not use obscenities, offensive language or tell inappropriate jokes



Accessible Customer Service

- Do not make assumptions about someone's capabilities; every person's disability is different and many are invisible, ask questions if you are not sure what someone needs. Remember that they know best.
- Focus on removing the barrier, not identifying the disability. Do not ask "What is your disability?" Rather, ask "Can I help?" They may not need any help at all.
- Describe and address people with disabilities appropriately. Use respectful language that emphasizes the person rather than the disability.
- Face the person you are speaking with (not the person accompanying them).
- ♦ Do not feed, pet, or speak to service animals.

Language Matters

When you talk about a person with a disability, ensure you describe the person, not the disability, and refer to a person's disability only when it is relevant.



Here are some general guidelines on how to phrase things appropriately:

Don't Say	Do Say
disabled or handicapped	a person with a disability
a blind athlete	an athlete who is blind
confined to a wheelchair	a person who uses a wheelchair
someone is autistic	they have autism
normal	neurotypical
a wheelchair washroom	accessible washroom
They have something wrong with them	They are neurodiverse
handicapped parking	accessible parking

Tips for interacting with:

- Vision Loss, Blind or Partially Sighted: Speak directly to the person, offer clear directions, and avoid touching their assistive devices or service animals without permission.
- Hearing Loss, Deaf, Deafened or Hard of Hearing:
 Get their attention before speaking, maintain visibility
 for lip-reading, and minimize background noise.



- **Physical Disabilities:** Always ask before offering assistance, and avoid touching mobility devices without permission.
- Speech or Language Disabilities: Be patient, allow them to express themselves, and ask for clarification if needed.
- Learning Disabilities: Communicate clearly, give extra time to respond, and be patient if they need further explanation.
- Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities: Use simple, clear language, confirm understanding, and offer support with patience.
- Mental Health Disabilities: Treat with respect, show patience, and provide reassurance.





Accreditation Program, presented by Tim Hortons

The purpose of accreditation is to identify people and their roles at the Canada Games and provide them with the appropriate access privileges to carry out their roles. This is to protect athletes, coaches, managers, technical support, mission staff, volunteers, guests, technical officials, media, and staff by strictly controlling access.

All volunteers are provided with an accreditation badge that is required to access venues. The accreditation badge grants access for your assigned role(s) at your venue(s) for specific zones.

DO

- Wear your accreditation badge at all times while on shift
- Wear your accreditation badge forward facing and visible at all access control points and venues
- Use your accreditation badge to access venues only during your scheduled shifts
- Use your accreditation badge to access MetroBus Transportation for free. Visit https://metrobus.com/ home/ to view bus routes





DO NOT

- Sive your accreditation badge to anyone else
- Alter your accreditation badge
- Forget your badge
- Attempt to access privileges, venues, and/or zones that are not displayed on your accreditation badge

Why Should I Make An Active Offer?

- To provide service to individuals in their preferred language
- I cannot assume I know someone's. language preferences
- To maintain a standard of service excellence
- I represent the 2025 Canada Games that proudly supports Canada's Official Languages

In Action:

- Provide a short greeting in both official languages. For example: Hello! Bonjour! Welcome! Bienvenue!
- 2. Pause to allow a response
- 3. Continue to provide the services in that person's preferred language



If you are unilingual, ask a bilingual volunteer on shift to assist. Bilingual volunteers will wear a neck gaiter and/or bilingual lanyard accessory featuring the francophone flag of Newfoundland and Labrador to be easily identifiable.

Volunteer Lounges

The Volunteer Services function provides care and comfort for the volunteers during their shifts at Games time. In order to provide volunteers with a space to relax and refuel, each venue is equipped with a Volunteer Lounge that provides refreshments. To support a sustainable Games, volunteers are encouraged to bring their own refillable water bottle

Volunteer Lounges do not provide a safe, secure, locked area for personal possessions. Volunteers should refrain from bringing valuables with them to the venue.

Breaks and Food Services

Volunteer shifts typically range from four to six hours in length, but are dependent on the operational needs of the venue. Breaks are appropriately timed with the competition schedule and venue operation needs. Breaks do not include travel time and this must be factored into break scheduling.

When temperatures are particularly hot, volunteers who perform roles outdoors should be given more frequent breaks in order to cool down appropriately. This will be at the discretion of the supervisor on shift. Timing of any additional breaks will be scheduled appropriately with the venue operation needs.

POLICIES AND GENERAL INFORMATION

Transportation Planner

Volunteers are responsible for their own transportation to and from their volunteer shifts throughout the Games. Due to some parking restrictions and limitations at venues, please use the Metrobus Transit or carpool when possible. Metrobus Transit is free to all volunteers when in uniform and wearing accreditation.

You may be traveling early in the morning or late at night. Stay safe by walking in well-lit areas, coordinating transportation with another volunteer, and informing someone when you are leaving and what time you should arrive.

Clean as you go Policy

This policy applies to all volunteers. The Clean As You Go policy is designed to maintain and ensure the cleanliness and hygiene of a workplace are at the highest standard.

This includes:

- Obstructions in walkways (remove garbage bags, cardboard boxes, other debris, etc.)
- Keep all areas clean and tidy



- Pick up and dispose of any garbage or recycling you find ensuring it is in the correct bin
- Ensure waste bins are emptied regularly
- Take lost and found items to Information Kiosks.
- Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds

Conflict Resolution Policy

The Host Society is dedicated to maintaining a safe, respectful, and healthy work environment. Reporting and resolving conflicts is essential to this commitment. If you have a concern, please follow the process outlined below.

- Volunteers should first attempt to reach a resolution satisfactory to all parties at the original level of involvement. If this fails, volunteers should speak with a supervisor about the situation. The supervisor will determine the appropriate person to escalate the concern to, which could be the Venue Lead or Functional Area Lead
- If the Venue Lead or Functional Area Lead is unable to resolve the conflict to your satisfaction, document your concerns in writing and submit them to the Manager, Volunteer Services & Accreditation, Lori Letto, at <u>lletto@2025canadagames.ca</u>, or volunteer@2025canadagames.ca



If the complaint does not proceed through or is not resolved by the Manager, Volunteer Services & Accreditation, the complaint may be escalated to the Host Society's Independent Third Party (ITP),

Staying Safe and Healthy

Staying Safe

Safety First

The safety, health, and well-being of everyone connected to the Games is our top priority. Safety requirements exist for everyone's protection and should be followed at all times. If you should see a problem in your work area, report it immediately to your supervisor.

Report all Incidents

Report all incidents, issues, concerns, and near-misses to your supervisor as soon as you become aware of them. This includes physical safety concerns as well as harmful behaviour and communications.

If you can resolve the issue safely on your own (for example, moving a box from an emergency exit), please do so.

If the incident or issue is serious and requires urgent attention, contact your supervisor immediately. Record all details on an incident report and submit it to your supervisor. Incident reports can be found in the Venue Operation Centre.

Hazards

Venue teams make every effort to ensure venues are safe for everyone, however occasional hazards may occur. These hazards are reviewed in venue orientation.



Refuse Unsafe Work

You have the right to refuse to perform a task if you believe there is a risk of harm or potential for an accident. If you have health or safety concerns, contact your supervisor immediately.

Staying Healthy

Do not come to your shift if you are sick or feeling unwell. Contact your supervisor as soon as possible to advise that you are unable to come to your shift and to confirm next steps.

Hydration

Use a reusable water bottle and utilize the Games' water refill stations to fill it.

Food

Snacks will be available at every venue. For those working shifts six hours or longer, meals will be provided.

Working Outdoors and Wet Weather

The volunteer uniform includes a water-resistant jacket and hat. Be sure to wear these and sunscreen on exposed skin as needed.

Scents

Avoid wearing scented products such as perfume, cologne, lotions, etc.





Notify your supervisor of any accessibility or health concerns, including life-endangering allergies, and medication needs. Notify your supervisor when you need a break.

Wayfinding

Ensure you are aware of washroom locations and how to access them.

Move and Stretch

If in the same position for an extended time or if repeating the same type of movement over and over, be sure to move around and stretch.



Reminder

We value your contributions, and everyone contributes in their own way to the best of their ability. Be careful not to overexert yourself or do something for which you are not trained. Listen to your body and be mindful of your limits.

Your supervisor is here to help you. Let them know if you are experiencing any challenges in your tasks, need help, or have questions, concerns, or doubts.

Sustainability

Committed to Hosting Sustainably Responsible Games

The Sustainability Committee, coined as the Green Team, presented by MMSB, will be present at all venues providing on-the-ground services. The Green Team will collect waste and recyclables while ensuring measures are in place to reduce and track the overall Games footprint.

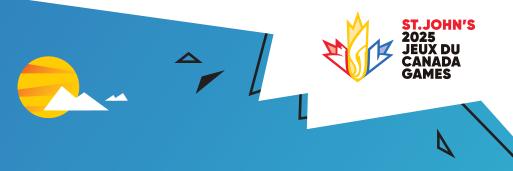
- A sustainability kiosk will be located in the lobby of the Bruneau Centre. Visit to learn about the Games' environmental efforts and receive the sustainability pin.
- Water refill stations will be available at all competition venues for athletes, volunteers, and spectators.



- Volunteer accreditation badges can be used as a bus pass for free rides on the Metrobus during Games time.
- Walking and biking paths near competition venues have been identified in the interactive map on the 2025 Canada Games App.
- Volunteers are asked to act as both environmental stewards and custodians of the Games by:
 - Reducing personal single-use plastic items
 - Supporting and encouraging proper waste disposal
 - Considering the environmental impact of their commutes at Games time

OPTIONAL REVIEW: SUPERVISOR TOOLKIT

What to Expect - A Day in the Life of a Venue Supervisor

Prior to your shift

- Be on time for your shift. Shifts can start early, try to * plan transportation ahead of time.
- Gather information regarding daily updates, run sheets, and list of crew on shift to prepare.
- Have a back up plan for late arrivals and/or absent team members.
- Prepare to assign your team specific duties and delegate into positions before you brief and deploy your crew.

During your shift

- Collect your radio and other equipment necessary for your crew where required.
- Inspect your area to ensure the tidiness and readiness for opening, shift change, or closing.
- Meet your crew prior to deployment. Inform the Check-In point so they relay your location to your crew upon arrival.
- Deploy crew to positions and ensure each volunteer is clear on what tasks they will perform at each post.



- Have a break and rotation plan in place for your crew during their shift.
- Be prepared to make decisions quickly when things don't go as planned.

Ending your shift

- Connect with your crew and ensure they visit the Volunteer Lounge Check-Out Point when they finish their shift.
- If the shift is changing, hand off duties to the next supervisor and provide a summary of the day's activities and any important information for the next shift.
- If it is the end of the day, attend venue team debriefing, return equipment and complete a daily report.
- Ensure you visit the Volunteer Lounge Check-Out Point.
- Check your next shifts and if there are any updates to the schedule.

Scheduling Breaks

Supervisors are responsible for assigning breaks to crew members and acting as a floater to replace their crew's duties if short on volunteers.

Schedule breaks during times where it does not interfere with the venue's operations.

Tips for Effective Communication and Conflict Resolution

Active Listening

- Face the speaker & maintain eye contact.
- ♦ Observe non-verbal cues.
- Avoid interrupting.
- Listen without judging.
- Stay focused.
- Ask questions use open-ended questions to clarify and encourage deeper discussion.
- Paraphrase & summarize reflect back on what you heard to confirm understanding and ensure clarity.

Empathy vs Sympathy

Sympathy is a feeling of sincere concern for someone who is experiencing something difficult or painful. Empathy involves actively sharing in the person's emotional experience.

Establish Rapport

Establishing rapport is done by developing a connection, it can be the smallest thing, or something very personal (e.g. "You're a fan of baseball?" "I'm a fan too.").



The objective of rapport development is to create a "personal connection" where one did not previously exist.

Once rapport is developed and a personal connection is made, it becomes much easier to influence behaviour.

Positive Influences

In attempting to resolve a conflictual situation, the more influence you have over another individual, the more easily you can generate voluntary compliance.

Generating voluntary compliance should always be the goal of any conflict management situation, in which you are attempting to influence another individual to behave in a manner that they currently don't want to, or don't know they should be.

Understanding Personal Space

The area around a person that others are not expected to intrude. Often this space is four feet.

Personal space is relative to cultural differences, habits, environment, age and gender.

A positive behaviour change is the end goal of any conflict management situation.

By actively listening, using empathy, and establishing rapport, you can influence others into a positive behaviour change.





Ensure you put Safety First

What happens if I feel uncomfortable or the situation is escalating beyond my skill level?

Disengage. Notify the Venue Operations Centre and if you feel in danger, call 911, if necessary.

Do I have to enter a situation that I feel is beyond my control or skill level?

Absolutely not. Your safety is always a priority. If you deem the situation to be unsafe and/or you are not comfortable approaching, maintain a safe distance, notify the Venue Operations Centre and call 911 if you feel in danger.
