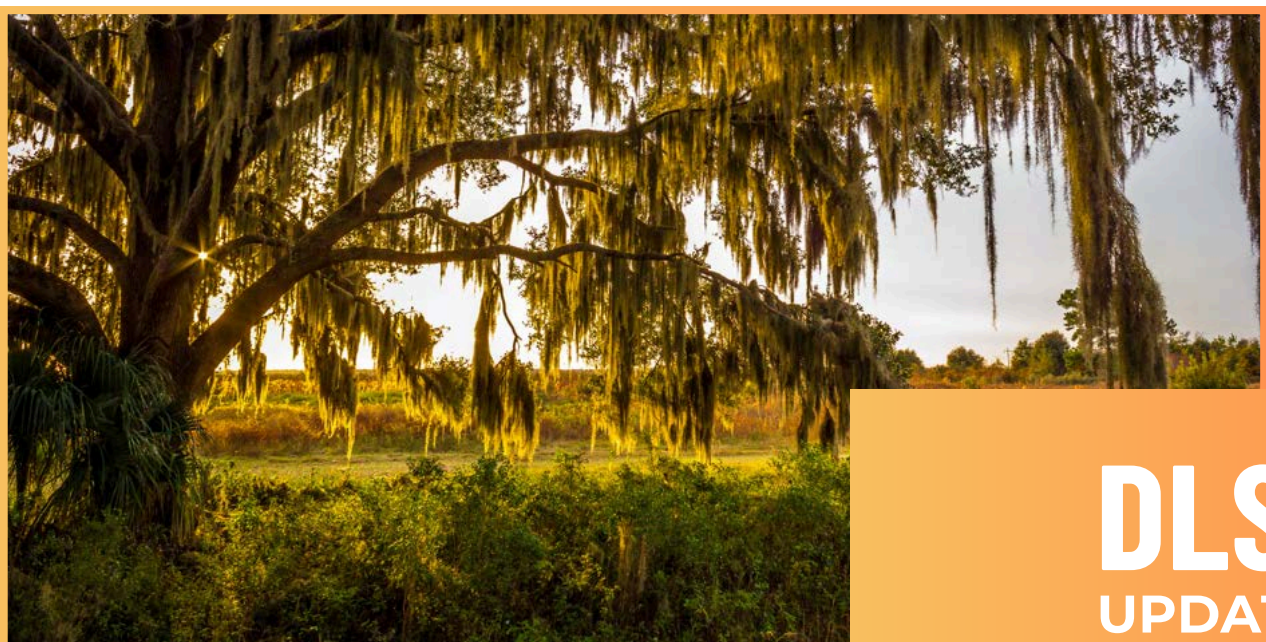

FL-IDN UPCOMING WEBINAR: GENAI IN INSTRUCTIONAL DESIGN: SURVEY FINDINGS ON ID USE, CHALLENGES, AND NEEDS

This month, FL-IDN will host the webinar, “[GenAI in Instructional Design: Survey Findings on ID Use, Challenges, and Needs](#).” This presentation shares the results of a survey exploring how instructional designers (IDs) in higher education use generative AI (GenAI) in their practice. IDs use GenAI in online and blended course development (e.g., to develop materials) and also guide faculty on GenAI use for teaching. IDs identified several challenges with GenAI, including credibility, ethical, and academic integrity concerns. They reported struggling to keep up with rapidly evolving GenAI technologies and the need for various types of support to successfully implement GenAI at their institutions. Ariel Gunn (Johns Hopkins University), Swapna Kumar (UF), Margeaux Johnson (UF), and Albert Ritzhaupt (UF) will discuss the implications for their research for IDs and GenAI integration into teaching and learning processes at institutions of higher education.

■ FL-IDN UPCOMING WEBINAR: SIMULATION-BASED LEARNING IN ONLINE SCIENCE COURSES

Next month, FL-IDN will host the webinar, “[Simulation-Based Learning in Online Science Courses](#).” Students enrolled in fully online courses have limited access to experiential learning opportunities, which are essential for enhancing engagement, developing practical skills, and reinforcing instructional materials. Therefore, there is a need for equitable, experience-based learning activities that allow fully online students to engage with instructional materials and apply their knowledge dynamically.

To address this issue and provide learners with a holistic learning experience, our team developed a prototype laboratory simulation for a fully online Drug Analysis and Chemistry course using Articulate Storyline 360. In this interactive, gamified online learning activity, students explore a lab and complete tasks while applying theoretical and foundational knowledge they learned in the course.

Our guest speakers, Anamary Tarifa and Michael Trainor (FIU), have a goal to reach instructional designers and faculty, sharing innovative solutions to current real-world challenges.

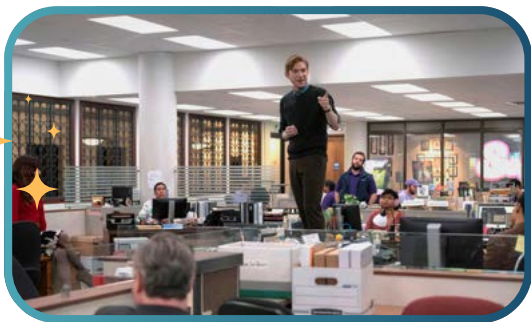

YOU GOTTA GO: BLOWING ROCKS PRESERVE
