Going the Extra 700 Miles

How Compassion Bridged the Distance for Two Abandoned Cats

"We have your cat," said the voice on the other end of the line. Was it a catnapper making a ransom demand? No, nothing so sinister, but serious nonetheless. A veterinary

hospital was calling to say that two cats had been abandoned at their office. A microchip check revealed that one of them was a Pet Pride cat. "We'll come get them both. Where are you located?" asked Kari LaBounty, our operations manager. "Tennessee," the caller responded.

Undeterred by geography, Kari contacted Pet Pride board member Polly Sack, who has three decades of experience as an animal transport volunteer. Inside of half an hour, Polly established contact with Rejeena Parker, a rescue volunteer in Tennessee who agreed to pick up the cats at the veterinarian's office, foster them, and arrange their flight to Rochester.

Once a cat is admitted to Pet Pride, we do everything we can to ensure that

they will never be homeless again. Our shelter associates carefully screen and counsel prospective adopters, and our adoptions liaison follows up to find out how the adoptees are adjusting to their new environments and to help troubleshoot any problems. Our adoption contract specifies that, if an adoption doesn't work out for whatever reason, the adopter is to contact Pet Pride immediately and not relinquish the cat to any other shelter, society, or person. If, as in this case, one of our cats is abandoned by their adopter, their microchip can help the cat find their way back to us—even when it's a long way home. Together with Rejeena and her rescue network, we were determined to bring these two cats to Pet Pride.

The degree of organization and coordination required to

plan a long-distance rescue flight would impress even the most exacting logistics professional. Rejeena arranged for each of three private pilots to fly one leg of the long journey, and Pet Pride transport volunteers were put on standby to meet the plane when it landed in Rochester. The weather did not cooperate. The trip was postponed due to flash floods and severe winds, and then postponed again, but the cats were safe with Rejeena.

When the big day finally arrived, the cats were secured in their carriers and loaded aboard the first flight. Their one-day journey took them from Blountville, Tennessee, to Hamilton, Ohio, to Medina, Ohio, to Rochester, New York. After the final flight touched down in Rochester, Pilots N Paws volunteer pilot Nick Bozovich and his wife, Lisa, disembarked from their single-engine Piper Dakota bearing two carriers with passengers Crescent and Billie inside.

"I learned about Pilots N Paws while training for my pilot's license and thought it was a great way to use my new skills for 'real' trips that help animals get to new homes or better shelter or foster accommodations," said Nick. "These animals are coming (continued on page 2)

previously been a Pet Pride cat, had to be spayed and microchipped. After that, it didn't take long for them to charm an adopter with their sweet natures. Then, together, they embarked upon the best journey of all—the one to their new adoptive home.

Crescent and Billie's story illustrates how teamwork, determination, and boundless compassion can give animals not just a second chance but a whole new life. When hearts align and hands join across miles, the sky really is the limit!




A Lifesaving Response for Cats in Crisis ———

Helping Four Neglected Cats Recover and Thrive

What Shirley Garner saw when she arrived at the house shocked her. The person who had called for help said there were five cats, but Shirley could see that only four were

alive. One of the four lay limp on the counter. Shirley's organization, PETS of Wayne County, helps struggling owners keep their companion animals by providing them with pet food, supplies, and information. This desperate situation demanded a different response. The living conditions were unsafe, and Shirley couldn't leave these cats behind. She would take all four home with her and then figure out what to do next. As she put one of the cats into a carrier, he curled into a ball and wouldn't move. Three days passed before he lifted his head, emerged from the carrier, and began to eat.
