

CORE COURSES (14 required)

BIBLICAL THEOLOGY:

- **Introduction to Biblical Interpretation** A systematic study of the doctrine of Scripture and introduction to foundational principles of exegesis and interpretation.
- **Introduction to the Old Testament** An introduction to the structure, literature, authorship, and historical context of the Old Testament in light of Scripture's overarching narrative.
- **Introduction to the New Testament** An introduction to the structure, literature, authorship, and history of the New Testament in light of Scripture's overarching narrative.

SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY:

- **Doctrine of Salvation** A systematic study of the doctrine of salvation by grace alone through faith alone in Christ, exploring the human condition and God's redemptive plan through Jesus.
- **Doctrine of the Church** A systematic study of the doctrine of the nature, purpose, structure, and mission of the Church.
- **Doctrine of God and Trinity** An introduction to evangelical theological method and a systematic study of the doctrine of God and Trinity.
- **Doctrine of Christ and Humanity** A systematic study of the person and work of Christ and the nature and purpose of humanity.
- **Biblical Worship** A systematic study of worship that traces God's design for worship in both the Old and New Covenants.
- **Doctrine of the Holy Spirit** A systematic study of the person and work of the Holy Spirit in creation, redemption, and the life of the believer.
- **Doctrine of Last Things** A systematic study of last things which addresses the return of Christ, final judgment, and eternal destiny.

PRACTICAL THEOLOGY:

- **Expository Preaching** An introduction to preparing and delivering text-driven, expository sermons rooted in Scripture.
- **Missiology & Evangelism** A study of the biblical foundation and practical application of the Great Commission in personal and church life, which includes a ministry practicum.
- **Basics of Christian Discipleship** A study of spiritual growth and the intentional formation of disciples through biblical principles and personal practice.
- Introduction to Christian Apologetics A survey of logical, historical, and scientific arguments for the Christian faith, with training in defending the existence of God, the truth of Scripture, and the resurrection of Christ.

ELECTIVES (2 Required)

Bible Institute electives cover a range of biblical, theological, and ministry topics, including region-specific courses and studies of other faiths. With approval from the Provost, students may request elective credit for outside courses or propose a directed study related to their ministry. Council Chairmen coordinate with the Institute to select two electives from the approved catalog.
