This September, Bayley Senior Care proudly celebrates the 25th Anniversary of the Village Cottages—a neighborhood built on faith, service, and community. For a quarter century, the Village Cottages have offered vibrant living, lasting friendships, and a welcoming place to call home.

The Village streets honor three remarkable women whose faith and leadership shaped the mission of the Sisters of Charity of Cincinnati: Mother Margaret George, Mother Josephine Harvey, and Mother Regina Mattingly. Mother Margaret George, foundress of the Sisters of Charity of Cincinnati, and the Mystic Seven carried forward the charism of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, creating a legacy of compassion and service that continues to inspire Bayley Senior Care.



The Village became a reality through the vision of Sr. Jeanne Roach, President and CEO of Bayley Place. Groundbreaking took place in July 2000, the first resident moved in during 2001, and by 2002 the cottages were 98% occupied. The community continued to grow with the addition of the Wellness Center in 2004 and dedicated team members like Dean Snyder, who continues to enrich residents' lives today.

As we celebrate this milestone, we are also looking ahead. Groundbreaking will take place this August for four new Village Cottages, with four additional cottages planned in the future to meet the growing demand for this exceptional lifestyle.

Magnolia Memory Care

At Bayley Senior Care, we are proud to introduce Magnolia Memory Support Neighborhood, our newest memory care initiative located within the newly renovated Mother Margaret Hall.

The naming of Magnolia carries special significance, connecting our future vision for memory support with the rich history of our organization. The Sisters of Charity of Cincinnati named Mother Margaret Hall in honor of Mother Margaret George, the Community's founder and a visionary leader whose legacy continues to influence Bayley today. As our naming committee explored meaningful names for this new neighborhood, we discovered a remarkable connection to Mother Margaret herself.

Through the years, Mother Margaret George carefully documented many aspects of life, including what was known as the language of flowers. Among her writings, reflections, and collected poems was a description of the Magnolia that deeply resonated with our focus group and perfectly captured the spirit of this new neighborhood:



"Nature's nobility, magnificence or beauty. No other plant rivals it in simplicity."

These words, preserved through Mother Margaret's own journal, became the inspiration for our choice.

The Magnolia symbolizes dignity, grace, strength, and enduring beauty—qualities that reflect both the residents we serve and the care philosophy that guides our memory support program. Just as the Magnolia's roots run deep, we recognize the importance of each resident's life story, experiences, and cherished memories. And like its beautiful blossoms, we believe every day offers opportunities for connection, purpose, and joy.

The naming of Magnolia is more than a tribute to a flower; it is a tribute to Mother Margaret George's legacy, her appreciation for beauty and meaning, and her enduring influence on the Bayley community. It is fitting that this new neighborhood, located in the building that bears her name, carries forward a symbol she herself admired and documented.

Our guiding promise, "Honoring the Past. Enriching the Present.," reflects this connection. We honor the legacy of Mother Margaret George, the histories and stories of our residents, and the memories that shape who they are. At the same time, we are committed to enriching each day through compassionate care, meaningful engagement, and a true sense of belonging.

Magnolia Memory Support Neighborhood represents Bayley's continued commitment to innovative, person-centered care—creating a place where residents are known, valued, and supported with dignity, compassion, and respect.

WALKING FOR A CAUSE

Close to her heart

When Eve Cooper joined Bayley as Marketing Assistant, she looked forward to sharing the stories that make our community special. Today, she's helping write one herself as Bayley's Alzheimer's Walk Captain.

The role is deeply personal. Eve grew up surrounded by older adults living with dementia. Her mother is a nurse, her father serves as the social worker in Bayley's Memory Support neighborhood, and Eve herself previously worked in Bayley's kitchen, where she formed meaningful relationships with residents.

"To be able to lead an initiative that supports families, raises awareness about Alzheimer's disease, and helps fund research and services is truly a dream come true," Eve said.



With a committee of dedicated associates, Eve has organized fundraising events including bake sales, sweet treats, and the popular "Forget-Me-Not Trees," where \$1 donations honor or remember loved ones affected by dementia. The team has also partnered with the Cincinnati Alzheimer's Association to offer free educational programs on brain health, dementia, and available resources.

Bayley hopes to grow its Walk to End Alzheimer's team and encourages residents, families, associates, and friends to participate. The Alzheimer's Walk takes place Saturday, October 3, at Sawyer Point Park, with a community walk on Bayley's campus planned for Friday, October 2.

Beauty, compassion and giving

For more than 30 years, Mary Ann Morbitzer welcomed residents to Bayley’s Beauty Shop with a warm smile, a listening ear, and the special touch that made every appointment feel like visiting a friend. Three years ago, she retired at the remarkable age of 81, leaving behind a legacy that extends far beyond hairstyling.

Before joining Bayley, Mary Ann spent 20 years styling hair in nursing homes, where she became acquainted with the Sisters at St. Lawrence and St. William’s and worked with the Council on Aging. Those experiences strengthened her commitment to serving older adults with kindness, dignity, and respect.

A childhood member of St. Dominic Parish, Mary Ann is also a proud graduate of Seton High School, where one of her classmates was Sister Judith Metz a Sister of Charity. Her daughter, Tina, is also a Seton graduate and volunteered at Bayley. Mary Ann found more than a career at Bayley—she found a community whose mission reflected her own values. Over the years, she developed a special bond with the Sisters of Charity and witnessed firsthand the compassion shown by employees and volunteers every day. Knowing the quality of

care and compassion residents received, she encouraged her mother to make Bayley her home. Her mother lived at Bayley for four years, confirming what Mary Ann had always believed—that Bayley was a place where residents were treated with genuine love, respect, and dignity.

Mary Ann’s love for Bayley inspired her daughter, Tina, to honor her parents in a meaningful way. Four years ago, Tina made a gift to the Mother Margaret George Society in recognition of her mother, Mary Ann, and her late father, John Morbitzer. Their generosity was recognized with a commemorative brass plaque on Bayley’s Donor Wall.

Reflecting on this tribute, Mary Ann decided she also wanted to honor the people who shaped her life. After her biological father was killed during World War II, her stepfather, Francis “Frank” Noll, married her mother, Mary Noll, and lovingly raised Mary Ann from the age of five. Frank also lovingly raised Mary Ann’s older brother and younger sister, caring for three war orphans all under the age of six with unwavering love and devotion. In gratitude for the sacrifices and unconditional love her parents provided, Mary Ann added Frank and Mary Noll to the Mother Margaret George Society. Their names will be permanently recognized on a brass plaque on Bayley’s Donor Wall this September.

Mary Ann’s story is one of faith, family, service, and generosity. Through her years of caring for residents, her family’s commitment to Bayley’s mission, and her desire to honor those who shaped her life, her legacy will continue to inspire generations to come.
