Medical Emergency

In the case of a medical emergency, many things could be or will be happening at the same time. In most cases, the Security Team will be the first to respond to the situation. It will be determined by the responding personnel what initial action will be taken.



First 10 Seconds

- **Assess the situation and identify the nature of the emergency.**
- **Activate the Medical Team by instructing a security team member or usher to tell the production team to put the red line on the screen.**
- **This may sound like to many steps, but the first one to the patient needs to make some quick decisions so the proper steps are taken.**

When to Call 911

• Ask Yourself the Following Questions:

- Is the condition life-threatening?
- Could the condition worsen and become life-threatening on the way to the hospital?
- Could moving cause further injury?
- Does the person need the skills/equipment of paramedics or emergency medical technicians?
- Could distance, traffic, or weather conditions cause a delay in getting to the hospital?

- If the answer to any of these questions is yes or you're not sure, call 911 for an ambulance. Even if you think you can get to the hospital faster by driving, 911 can bring many of the lifesaving skills and medications right to you and start care sooner. Emergency crews are trained to begin medical treatment on the way to the hospital, and they can also alert the Emergency Department in advance to the patient's condition.

Calling 911

One person, with an understanding of the situation, should be the one to call 911, but this will not always be the case.

When You Call 911 Remember to:

- Speak calmly and clearly.**
- Give name, address, exact location of victim, and nature of problem.**
- Don't hang up until the dispatcher indicates you can.**
- The 911 dispatcher can offer some basic care for you to perform while waiting for the ambulance to arrive.**

For many situations, 911 will not need to be called.

**BUT– if for any reason you are unsure
if you should call 911,**

CALL 911

****Remember—The patient can refuse the care of EMS when they arrive,
but the patient cannot prohibit you from calling 911****

Tell the Story

- Yes, you are at Church of the Harvest, but where??
- Communicate specifics to the 911 operator.
 - Example: The patient is located in the lobby of the main east entrance to the building.
 - The patient is a male, 6' tall, 200lbs, and approximately 55 years old.
 - He is conscious and complaining of left chest pain, left arm pain, he is sweating , and nauseated.



Security Team

As the Medical Team is dealing with the patient, and 911 has been called, you will need to direct one or two people to go outside to the anticipated entrance to the church parking lot where the fire truck and ambulance will enter, and direct them to the patient.

Medical Team

- Stay with the injured person until emergency assistance arrives
- Keep talking to the injured person.
- Ask them their name
- Ask them questions about their current condition. Where is the pain? Are they on medication? Is this something new for them? Etc.
- Convey this info to the EMT's when they arrive
- Maintain an airway
- Conduct CPR if necessary



First Aid Kits



- There are 2 First Aid kits in the church. One is in the closet by the kid's check-in station in the south foyer. It is in a big red/orange bag.
- The other kit is in the room with our radios on top of the radio/lanyard cabinet. It is in a black backpack. The pockets on the bags are labeled with the contents of the pocket.

Bag Contents

- 2- Transcend 15g Glucose
- 2- Chest Seal Vented

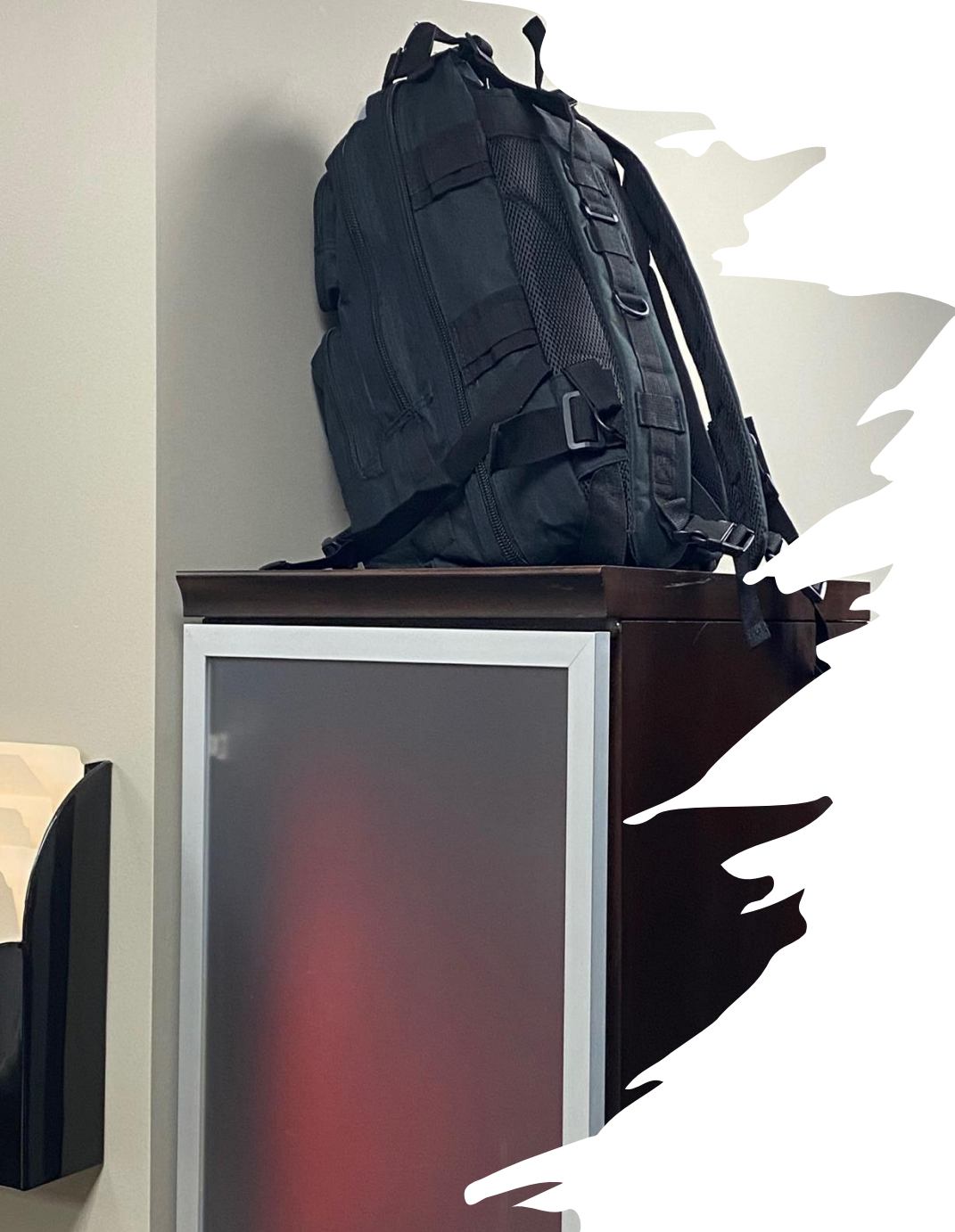

Stewards in Action

Maintain Church Security

- If you are on duty, maintain your previously assigned position. Everyone does not need to converge on the medical emergency. Stay vigilant.
- If you have not been on duty that day, please be available to assist. You will generally see the situation before the rest of the congregation knows that anything is happening.
- A person from the “on duty team” will likely stay with the medical emergency. If you are not on duty, please step up to fill the hole in security.

After Incident Report

After the incident, the primary person that has responded to the event will need to write up a short report that describes what took place.

Example: Date, time, what happened, where it occurred, name of person that needed assistance, the outcome of the situation/resolution.



On 1/1/23, We responded to a medical event in section 3 of the sanctuary during 9am service, approximately 9:30am. Jane Doe had collapsed into her husband in her seat and was having a seizure. Jon Doe had started to carry/walk her out of the sanctuary to the car when we were alerted to the event. We assisted them to their car and they left the church property. Jon Doe said that this has occurred before and he knew what to do. 911 was not called.
