Whatever You Say Colossians 4:2-18

Introduction:

- Your words reveal what you really **believe** about Jesus
- Luke 6: "Out of the abundance of the **heart**, the mouth speaks"

Paul's Challenge:

Use our words to point people to Jesus and give glory to God

Four Principles for Christ-Submitted Words:

1. Pray with your words - they connect you to God (4:2-4)

- Start with **prayer**, not communication techniques
- "Devote" = same word for disciples' **persistent** prayer before Pentecost
- Challenge: Pick three people who don't know Jesus and pray for them daily

2. Engage with your words - they build bridges to outsiders (4:5-6)

- Words should build **bridges** not walls
- Grace = undeserved **favor** and kindness
- Salt = preserves, purifies, and enhances **flavor**
- Proverbs 25:11: "A word spoken at the <u>right</u> time"

Key Life Intersections:

- Intersection of Change: Moving, new job, marriage, baby, graduation
- Intersection of Crisis: Death, illness, job loss, divorce, mental health

3. Encourage with your words - they strengthen others (4:7-9)

- Paul's purpose: "Encourage your hearts"
- Encouragement literally means "to put courage into"

Four Practical Strategies:

- 1. See and Say What Others Miss: Point out character qualities
- 2. Affirm Their Value in God's Kingdom: Remind them of their identity
- 3. Speak to Their Future, Not Just Their Past: Cast vision
- 4. Be **Specific** Rather Than Generic: Mention specific contributions

4. Honor with your words - they deepen your relationships (4:10-18)

- Paul mentions **ten** people by name
- Personal recognition: "Mark, cousin of **Barnabas**," "Luke the beloved **Physician**"
- People feel **seen** by him

Honor People:

- 1. Specifically
- 2. Personally

3. Intentionally

Four Areas to Evaluate:

- Are your words connecting you to <u>others?</u>
 Are your words building <u>bridges</u> to outsiders?
 Are your words <u>honoring</u> others?
 Are your words <u>strengthening</u> your relationships?
