Main idea: To inspire and encourage others to recognize and appreciate the goodness of God in their lives

Topic: Goodness of God

Suggestions for moving forward with your sermon on the goodness of God:

1. Expand on the concept of God's goodness: You can explore different aspects of God's goodness, such as His faithfulness, love, mercy, and provision. Use additional Scripture passages to support each aspect. For example:
 - Psalm 34:8: "Taste and see that the Lord is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in him."
