**Topic**: Maturity in Christ

Suggestions for moving forward with your sermon on "Maturity in Christ" based on Colossians 3:1-20:

- 4. Address the importance of gratitude and worship in our journey towards maturity (Colossians 3:15-17). Encourage your listeners to cultivate a heart of thankfulness and to let the word of Christ dwell richly in them.

Additional Scripture passages to support your sermon:

- Ephesians 4:22-24: Expound on the idea of putting off the old self and putting on the new self, emphasizing the process of renewal in Christ.
- Galatians 5:22-23: Discuss the fruit of the Spirit as evidence of Christian maturity and growth.
- Philippians 3:12-14: Encourage perseverance and pressing forward towards the goal of knowing Christ more deeply.
