

### **Immersion Overview**

More than just a camp replacement, this immersive program offers a transformative experience for 50 to 210 students, combining expedition-style adventures with deeper engagement on First Nations homelands in striking locations like the Hawkesbury, Cape York, and the Red Centre. Each journey is thoughtfully designed to foster cultural learning, meaningful connections, and personal growth, giving students the chance to explore both the land and themselves while contributing through service.

### **How it works**

#### **Small Groups**

Students are divided into small groups to allow for more personal interaction, better safety, and deeper engagement with the facilitators, Traditional Owners (TOs), and peers. Small groups also allow for tailored learning and foster stronger bonds among participants.



#### **Rotate through Different Activities**

Each group rotates through a variety of hands-on, place-based cultural activities. These could include bushwalks, cultural workshops, environmental service projects, and storytelling sessions to ensure that every student experiences learning opportunities and contributes to community-led initiatives.



### **Hot Showers and Flushing Toilets**

Despite being in remote or rugged settings, the camps are equipped with essential amenities to ensure comfort and hygiene. This helps students feel safe and supported, making it easier to focus on the immersive experience without being overwhelmed by basic living challenges.



### Traditional Owners Sharing Stories Around the Fire at Night

Traditional Owners gather with students around the fire to share cultural knowledge, history, and personal stories. These intimate storytelling sessions are a cornerstone of the experience, creating powerful moments of learning and reflection on Country.



### Case Study: Kambala School

### All-Grade Cape York First Nations Immersion Program



Kambala has been collaborating with Red Earth since 2019 to facilitate a whole grade program for our Year 9 students. We chose a cultural immersion to Cape York homelands as part of our programs. Ensuring connections to knowledge and culture direct from Traditional Owners on Country was an important aspect of this learning. It also enables us to extend our learning to curriculum links for science, geography and history. Students were able to reflect on the concepts of land ownership, gender roles, education systems, land conservation, intergenerational trauma, and preservation of culture and language.



Working with Red Earth provides our students with a program in a remote setting to **Homelands that aren't accessible outside this setting.** They have **experienced leaders** who know the remote area and know the community members, which allows the school to send teachers and students with peace of mind. Our students come away from the experience with an open mind and knowledge beyond the classroom walls that is **authentic and meaningful and lifelong.**

### **Curriculum Links**

- First Nations history and culture: including traditional cultural ceremonies on private, permit protected remote Homelands and sacred site visits.
- Science and Geography: UNSECO World Heritage area visits to the Great Barrier Reef and Wet Tropics, including engaging with First Nations guides and marine biologists.
- Mistory: Australian History, including Captain Cook and the First Fleet, as well as early colonial and settler history and stores of missions and the Stolen Generation

### Day Four: Desert Knowledge at Karrake

Join hands-on workshops in dot painting, bush medicine, tool-making, and bird and plant knowledge, deepening your connection to Anangu ways of life.

### Day Two: Hands in the Earth - Kurku & Sandy Bore

Receive a Traditional Owner welcome with a smoking ceremony, carve clapsticks, create desert jewellery, then head to Sandy Bore to explore bush foods, language, and local culture.

Arrive at Yulara and meet your Red Earth Leaders before heading to camp near Uluru. Settle into Country, take in a stunning desert sunset, and reflect around the fire with your group.

Greet your last desert morning with sunrise over Country, take time for group reflection, and begin your journey home carrying new wisdom and deep connection.

### Day 1 - Fly to Yulara & explore Uluru

- Take a flight to Yulara
- Meet your Red Earth Leaders and help set up camp
- Enjoy a spectacular sunset and get your first glimpses of Uluru
- Enjoy dinner and reflections around the fire with the group

### Day 2 - Kurku & Sandy Bore(Homeland Visit)

- Travel to Kurku Homeland by 4WD bus
- Meet the Traditional Owners and receive a smoking ceremony on arrival
- Learn about the significance of artefacts and make your own clap sticks
- Enjoy a jewellery workshop where you can create your own pieces
- Travel 5 minutes up the road to Sandy Bore
- Learn about traditional foods and cook your own damper over the campfire
- Dig for witchetty grubs and taste these desert delicacies!
- Experience a language lesson and learn Pitjantjatjara and Luritja words and phrases
- Travel back to Kings Creek station where we set up camp for the next three days.
- Enjoy dinner and reflections around the fire with the group

#### Day 3 - Watarrka National Park (Kings Canyon) to Yulara

- Travel by Coach to Kings Creek Canyon
- Enjoy the spectacular 'Rim Walk' at Watarrka National Park
- Visit Kathleen Springs Walk on the way back to camp
- Travel back to camp and enjoy some time in the pool to cool down after a long day walking
- Dinner and reflections with the group

### Example Itinerary for one of the subgroups for a 6 day itinerary

### Day 4 - Karrake Culture & Kathleen Springs

- Mead to Karrake Culture centre, just a short walk from Camp.
- Groups will learn about Aboriginal bush medicine use, plant and bird knowledge, Aboriginal dot painting, weapon making (including spears and boomerangs), Bush tucker gathered seasonally and organic seeds.
- Mead back to Camp for lunch
- Groups will have time to continue working on their clapsticks or jewellery from previous sessions.
- In the afternoon the group will travel to Kathleen Springs for a beautiful sunset walk.
- Dinner and reflections with the group

### Day 5 - Sandy Bore (Homeland Visit)

- Travel from Kings Creek Station to Sandy Bore by 4WD bus
- Spend a morning on country exploring the Homeland, following a path to a beautiful lookout.
- Learn about traditional foods and cook your own damper over the campfire
- Dig for witchetty grubs and taste these desert delicacies!
- Experience a language lesson and learn Pitjantjatjara and Luritja words and phrases
- Cook kangaroo tails and damper in the traditional way over the fire
- Travel back to Kings Creek station and enjoy dinner and reflections with the group.
- Evening activity Traditional owners from Sandy Bore & Kurku will join the groups for a yarn around the fireside

#### Day 6 - Farewells and Home

- Make the most of your final morning with a sunrise over the stunning Country
- Final debriefs and reflections
- Travel by coach from Kings Creek station to Yulara
- Fly home in the afternoon

### Central Australia Curriculum Link Overview

First Nations culture and history is alive and pulsing in the Red Centre. Red Earth has partnerships with a dozen First Nations homelands in the Arrernte, Pitjantjatjara, and Luritja nations, each with their own rich cultural traditions, languages, and art forms. The richness of the natural environment together with direct First Nations experience makes for ideal tie-ins to curriculum priorities across many year levels.

#### **Geography and Environmental Studies**

- Explore the unique desert environment of Central Australia, studying its landforms, climate, and biodiversity
- Learn about sustainability and environmental conservation efforts in arid regions
- Investigate the impact of human activities, including tourism and resource extraction, on the local ecosystem

#### **Indigenous Histories and Cultures**

- Delve into the rich cultural heritage of the Indigenous peoples of Central Australia, including their traditional knowledge, languages, and art forms
- Examine the historical and ongoing significance of sacred sites like Uluru and Kata Tjuta to Indigenous communities
- Foster respect, understanding, and reconciliation through engagement with Indigenous perspectives and experiences

### Example Itinerary for one of the subgroups for a 6 day itinerary

### Day One: The Journey Begins

- Begin your adventure with an early morning flight to Cairns, enjoying a breathtaking sunrise from above.
- Meet your Red Earth Leaders at the airport before embarking on a scenic bus journey over the ranges to our base camp —soak in the changing landscapes along the way.
- Receive a heartfelt Welcome to Country from Traditional Owners, marking the start of your adventure and immersion into Cape York and Far North Queensland
- Set up camp on Country and settle into the beauty of the land
- The grade will be split into their groups and into different areas at base camp.
- Meet the Traditional Owners of the land and Cultural Educators, that have travelled down from Cape York and who will be staying with you for the duration of your experience.
- Nightly reflections on camp and dinner in your groups.

#### Day Two: Atherton Tablelands Cultural Journey

- Transfer to the Atherton Tablelands for a warm Mbabaram welcome and a guided cultural bushwalk.
- Learn about the uses of native plants for food, medicine, and bushcraft, and the impacts of mining and colonisation on the community.
- Mear how cultural knowledge is being revived through intergenerational efforts and research.
- View photos, tools, and artefacts, and enjoy a demonstration of didgeridoo crafting and playing techniques.
- Participate in an Aboriginal dot art workshop, learning the meaning of symbols and painting your own artwork to take home.
- Visit the Cathedral Fig Tree in Danbulla National Park and receive a welcome from Bundaburra-Yidinji guides.
- Learn about clan boundaries, cultural customs, and the tree's role in community and ecological history.
- Visit Davies Creek Falls for an afternoon swim before heading to another site for an overnight with camp cooking and dinner with Cultural Educators from Cape York who will be staying with the group.
- Spend the evening under the stars, around the campfire and the night under canvas.

### Cape York Itinerary 6 days



### Day Four: Cultural Workshop with First Nations Educators

- Spend the whole day connecting and learing from Cultural educator at camp.
- Learning traditional skills and crafts passed down for thousands of year such as, paiting, weaving, artefact making.
- Walk of country learning the tradiotnal knowledge of the local fauna and hearing stories.
- After spending the day with the cultural educators prepare, cook, and enjoy a bush dinner together prepared in a traditional way.
- Enjoy an evening by the fire, under the star hearing stories from the cultural educators.

#### Day Three: Great Barrier Reef Snorkelling

- After an early breakfast we will transfer the short distance to the Marina
- Spend a full day on the Great Barrier Reef, exploring two outer reef sites.
- Learn from marine biologists and Indigenous cultural guides, gaining insight into reef ecosystems and Aboriginal sea Country.
- Enjoy a buffet lunch and guided snorkelling sessions before returning to base camp late in the afternoon after a huge day out on the ocean.

#### Day Five: Community Projects & Conservation

- Join in a full day of community service, including mangrove rehabilitation, marshland research, ranger shadowing, and conservation projects, in collaboration with the Cape York Partnership.
- We will transfer out to the different sites and take part in hands-on meaningful projects that will leave a lasting impact on the community and the environment.
- Return to camp in the early afternoon for an all- grade water experience on the Lake and group challenge.
- All grade dinner and final reflections and presentations.

#### Day Six: Farewell

Operate for flights home from Cairns, filled with memories, knowledge, and new connections made.



### Cape York Curriculum Link Overview

Cape York is a place where ancient culture meets living tradition. In partnership with homelands of the Guugu Yimidhirr and Kuku Yalanji peoples, Red Earth offers students the chance to engage with First Nations communities who maintain deep and ongoing connections to Country. From rainforest to reef, stories are woven into every part of the landscape, shared through language, art, ceremony, and daily life. These authentic experiences provide powerful links to learning, enriching students' understanding of history, culture, and the environment across a range of subject areas.



### Day 2- Bush Medicine and Bush Tucker Hike

- Travel to a nearby site for a guided hike learning about the geography of the area, traditional bush medicine and bush tucker
- After lunch, it's fishing time! Try to catch your dinner
- Free time to cool off and swim in the Hawkesbury River
- Enjoy the colours of the evening sunset over the valley
- Join in on a yarning circle by the fire and hear stories from our Indigenous hosts

#### Day 3 - Clap-stick Making and Painting Workshops

- Spend the morning learning the ancient craft of clap-stick making, and learn about their cultural significance for the area
- Learn traditional painting methods and put them into practice on your very own canvas to take home with you
- Prepare for the Departing Ceremony with a special task given to us by our Indigenous facilitators
- Free time to enjoy the Hawkesbury River
- Enjoy dinner with Dreamtime and contemporary stories by the fire

#### Day 4 - Final Day

- Wake up early and walk to the top of the land to see the colours of the sunrise
- Draw a close on your time at Deerubbin with a sacred Departing Ceremony, one you have been preparing for since the beginning of the journey
- Accompany our Indigenous hosts to a sacred site unknown to most for a final intimate story about the area
- Final goodbye to community members and your Red Earth leader before your return journey to your initial pick up spot

### Case Study: Seymour College

### **All-Grade First Nations Immersion Program**

Seymour College has partnered closely with Red Earth. All students and staff developed a deeper and more nuanced appreciation for First Nations culture after time spent on Country with Traditional Owners. Every student made new connections with other students and strengthened existing ones. Every student was awed and thrilled by the wild, vivid landscape and captivating wildlife they encountered on their immersion. All our students rose to their own personal challenges with a willingness to learn and help others.



The support provided by Red Earth in the lead up was outstanding: extensive and constant. Practically speaking, the logistics, communications, risk management and transportation provided by Red Earth were critically important and made our three immersions run remarkably smoothly.

Taking a whole cohort away has long-term beneficial effects on the culture, coherence and dynamics of that year group, giving the students a clear, collective narrative which strengthens their own understanding of their school journey. **Our students thrived in the outdoors, learnt much from Traditional Owners, looked after one another and leant into this immersion.** This is a trip students cannot take with their families and we are so pleased that we can, with Red Earth, make this possible for our students.

### **Curriculum Links**

- First Nations history and culture: including traditional cultural ceremonies on private, permit protected remote Homelands and sacred site visits.
- Science and Geography: Visiting UNESCO World Heritage Listed Kakadu National Park and engaging with Traditional Owners on their relationship with varying ecosytems, including learning about the unique wildlife in the Top End Region.
- History: Australian history including Darwin Park, Darwin's involvement in WWII, and the Royal Flying Doctor Service

- We stay in fenced-off areas on campsites away from the centres of towns
- There will be at least one Red Earth team member for every 15 students
- Immersion Leaders are professionally trained and certified in remote area firstaid, 4WD off-road driving, and hold water rescue certification for swimming activities
- A remote first-aid kit, satellite device, emergency location beacon, and 4WD vehicle accompany the group
- Our partner Traditional Owners and Elders will be guiding all cultural activities and community projects with their wealth of local knowledge
- A safety briefing is held each morning to remind students of the potential dangers involved in the day's activities and locations
- All safety equipment will be provided for use on cultural activities
- All communities have medical centres nearby with healthcare professionals on call 24/7 in case of emergencies
- For life-threatening emergencies, operations are passed on to emergency services and the Royal Flying Doctors Service which operates in the area



- Can we make suggestions to amend the itineraries or introduce new elements to the program? Yes, of course. We want you to shape the itineraries to get the desired educational outcomes for your students. We view ourselves as trusted advisors and facilitators here to help you achieve a tailored program for your school.
- How do Elders and Traditional Owners feel about people coming onto their land? Will we be intruding? We are an organisation driven by our First Nations partners in the Homelands of remote Australia. Our mission is to give First Nations people the help they need if they wish to welcome and open the hearts of young Australians to their country, culture, and way of life. We only make our resources available if we're asked to help. Traditional Owners are the ones that decide if and when people should come onto their land, not us.
- What amenities are available and what are we sleeping in? Tents and swags will be provided for all staff. Tents will be available for students to change in case of wet weather. All students will have swags. The whole group will enjoy flushing toilets and hot showers everywhere we stay.
- What food will be available? While there will be opportunities for the group to forage bush foods, there will be fresh food deliveries throughout the immersion with a focus on big healthy meals. We cater for every kind of dietary requirement and expect students and staff to participate in the preparation of food.
- What is the pre-departure program like? Red Earth takes its responsibility to ensure that each person attending an immersion gives, grows and leads very seriously. We design a pre-departure program tailored for your specific region and itinerary and will meet with the group twice in the lead-up to departure to ensure everyone is prepared for the journey ahead.
- **Will we be safe?** We take safety very seriously, and it informs every aspect of an immersion. You can read more about our approach to safety on our website at https://www.redearth.edu.au/safety/
- © Could there be variations to our itinerary? Changes to your proposed itinerary and activities are likely and part of travelling to remote First Nations communities. The availability of our partner Homelands may change for practical or cultural reasons, but conversations and personal connection with Traditional Owners and their families are at the heart of all Red Earth immersions. Our strong network of partner Homelands means we can guarantee an authentic experience with deep connections regardless of where your group travels.



### Group Size

50-220 students

#### **School Staff**

For every 15 students, 1 school staff may travel free of charge. Additional staff may be added at the student price. Any flight prices quoted will include additional costs for traveling teachers.

#### Insurance

Staff and students may be covered by your school's insurance policy, and we encourage you to seek out the policy details to inform families before the Parent Information Night.. As this is a domestic program, Australian residents will be covered by Medicare. Red Earth does not provide insurance for participants or school staff.

#### **Medical Forms**

All participants/parents/guardians of participants must complete an online medical form. The login details for your secure online portal will be provided by your Red Earth Relationship Manager after the initial deposits have been paid.

#### Participant Health

Schools and/or students and/or guardians may be required to declare that participants are in sufficiently good health at the time of travel.

#### Flights Policy

At the time of the proposal, the client will be provided with the ground price (the immersion excluding flights).

The school has the option to book their own group flights and would be responsible for being at the destination airport at the time indicated on their itinerary in the Proposal.

Red Earth has pre-existing supplier arrangements and years of experience booking group flights to make the process smooth if you prefer this option.

An indication of flight prices can be provided which is only reflective of our experience with group bookings and historic airline pricing

If you choose Red Earth to book flights, upon receipt of the 1st deposit Red Earth will provide you with a quote for flights. Upon confirmation of the quote, Red Earth will secure flight bookings. Flight market prices vary from week to week and Red Earth have no control of locking in a quote with an airline until the week that a deposit is received from the client.


#### **Payment Conditions and Schedule**

Participants will pay the cost of the immersion to their school, which will then pay Red Earth directly. The standard payment schedule below is applicable unless a different schedule has been agreed to by Red Earth prior to the Information Night:

#### Region: Central Australia

Initial Deposit - 25% of the total fee to secure your group booking within 21 days of accepting this proposal Second payment - 25% per paying participant 16 weeks after the deposit due date

Final Balance - Balance of the Immersion price (50 % of ground costs plus airfares if applicable) 12 weeks before immersion commencement.



#### Inclusions

Red Earth organises everything from start to finish. The immersion fee includes:

- If you choose Red Earth to book flights: Upon receipt of the 1st deposit, Red Earth will provide you with a quote for flights and any applicable accommodation if you choose a Red Eye flight. Upon confirmation of the quote, Red Earth will secure flight bookings for return airfares from a major city to the nearest medium-sized airport. Flight market prices vary from week to week, and Red Earth has no control of locking in a quote with an airline until the week that a deposit is received from the client.
- For every 15 students, 1 school staff member may travel free of charge (ground costs only)
- One Red Earth staff member for every 15 students to look after the campsite, liaise with the community, uphold safety standards and help lead cultural activities
- @ Use of private, exclusive lands and use of campgrounds
- All cultural activities led by Traditional Owners, including the equipment needed for the activities
- All tourism activities
- All ground transport with experienced drivers for the duration of the immersion
- Camping and cooking equipment
- Individual swags
- Tents for teachers and for getting changed
- Three nutritious meals a day plus snacks
- An information session for the student cohort
- An information evening for students and parents
- Pre-departure sessions facilitated by Red Earth, including all material and documentation for travelling students and staff

#### Red Earth Cancellation Policy Region: Central Australia

For individual students or groups who choose to cancel for any reason, the following Red Earth cancellation policy applies. This includes (but is not limited to) a group or student not attending due to injury or illness, and a COVID-19 diagnosis.

- Cancelling between due dates for the Deposit and Second Payment will result in the forfeiture of the deposit amount.
- © Cancelling between due dates for the Second Payment and Balance will result in the forfeiture of the deposit plus 50% of the second payment.
- Cancelling between the due date for the Balance and the Date of Departure will result in the forfeiture of the deposit, the second payment and 50% of the final balance.
- © Cancelling on or after the Date of Departure, or failing to join the group without notice, will result in the forfeiture of 100% of the fee paid.

Please note changes such as student substitutions, adding new students etc. can not be made later than 4 weeks prior to departure. Until initial deposit payment is received, costs are subject to change at the discretion of Red Earth.
