






### Public Understanding of Law Survey (PULS)

- Surveys legal need & legal capability
- Face-to-face probability sample of 6,008
   Victorians. Provides representative insights
- Unique dataset bottom-up, real-world, lived experience of what different people experience, do and achieve
- 3 volumes of headline reporting & briefing and other papers, more coming








### Public Understanding of Law Survey (PULS)

### PULS captured respondents' housing status Variable for analysis:


- 1. Own home outright (i.e. own without mortgage)
- 2. Mortgage or loan (i.e. owned with a mortgage or loan arrangements)
- 3. Public renter (i.e. rent from public housing or other community or social housing)
- 4. Private renter (i.e. rent from private landlord)
- 5. Living rent free (i.e. living with owners/renters and other precarious forms of residency)

## Prevalence of justiciable problems and housing-related problems









### Legal need met or not by housing status






### **Takeaways**

- Legal need varies by housing status
- While renters have the highest rates of housing-related problems, they don't just have housing problems, they also experience higher rates of many other types of problems, and have higher legal problem prevalence overall
- The type of housing problems renters most frequently experience concern repairs, maintenance or security of their rented housing
- Public Renters stand out as the housing status with the highest prevalence of justiciable problems overall, and of housing problems, and while they had the highest rate of advice from legal services, they also had the highest level of unmet legal need
- Private Renters fare a bit better than Public Renters, although they used legal services at the lowest rate, and after Public Renters, had the next highest rate of unmet legal need.




#### Looking at PULS findings for single parents:

- Justiciable problem prevalence varies by family status: single parents experience higher legal prevalence (49% cf. 42% overall)
- Single parents experienced higher rates of the following broad problem types
  - Family
  - Government payment
  - Debt & money
  - Housing







- Single parents more frequently did nothing in response to justiciable problems (7.1% of problems cf. 4% overall)
- Single parents had higher rates of unmet legal need (70%) compared to other types of families (38-49%) and PULS respondents overall (49%).
