

Eye Corps, Inc. Operating Report

December 31, 2025



We are delighted to report that Eye Corps continues to expand and bring sight to the blind in sub-Saharan Africa. Eye Corps has realized a significant milestone in the number of surgeries performed over this time last year having doubled our annual goal of 1,000 cataract surgeries in 2025. This is testament to the steady growth of our team and their tireless commitment to curing blindness for Tanzanian communities in need.

*For the period of January through December we are happy to report **2,104** successful cataract surgeries performed for Tanzanians, by Tanzanians.*

Highlights & Outreach Camps:

Eye Corps' outreach activity in Q425 remained focused on the expansion of locally led campaigns with our in-country Eye Corps trained teams at the helm. We saw five locally led programs in the last quarter of year, consistent with the trend that has been established throughout 2025. Over the course of the year, Eye Corps proudly sponsored 15 local outreaches across our five regions, bringing basic eye care and vision screening to nearly 7,000 Tanzanians in rural communities. Of that population, 1,300+ sight saving surgeries were performed.

Taken as a whole, Eye Corps exceeded its annual target of 1,000 cataract surgeries, completing a total of 2,379 surgeries in Tanzania. In addition, more than 21,000 patients received basic eye care and vision screenings in 2025.



While Eye Corps' focus always begins with humanitarian care delivered to communities greatest in need, we maintain an intentional focus on sustainability. As routinely reported, all US led outreaches prioritize teaching and hands on training for residents and local participants at each program. This year is different in that it marks the first year that Eye Corps sponsored, locally led outreaches have now expanded to incorporate this same approach. Of the 14 locally led outreaches in 2025, 12 of them were teaching outreaches, incorporating mentorship, resident and community health care provider training in some capacity.

Also, in Q4 to further bolster our commitment to ophthalmic training, Eye Corps Tanzania reached an important milestone with the opening of the Eye Corps Training Center in Moshi, Kilimanjaro. The Center was developed in response to long-observed learning gaps and limited training infrastructure among our in-country partners, including ongoing faculty shortages at the university level that have reduced hands-on skills lab training opportunities for residents. The Training Center now provides a dedicated space for supplemental clinical and classroom-based learning for the regional ophthalmology community.



Building on this momentum, Eye Corps will host its first live lecture series in Q126 for the Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Center (KCMC) residency program, further supporting our commitment to resident education and surgical readiness. This work reflects our continued focus on strengthening local training capacity and building sustainable eye care systems.



Outreach activity for the coming year will find us returning to Same, Kilimanjaro in January where we will be fortunate enough to partner with the Eye Corps team at Mawenzi Regional Referral Hospital under the leadership of Dr. Peter Mlundwa in tandem with our partners at Same District Hospital. Our goal is to visit 7 villages during the screening week followed by the surgical training week where we hope to meet 150 sight saving surgeries while providing hands on training opportunities for the team. We will look forward to reporting on our successes in Q226.

Eye Corps Expanding and in Partnership with other NGOs



2025 was a strong year for collaboration in Tanzania. Eye Corps enjoyed its introduction to, and success with, the HCP Cure Blindness Reach program which commenced in Q225. Through this program, HCP funding enabled Eye Corps to increase surgical volumes in the areas of greatest need along Tanzania's southern corridor. To date, HCP and Eye Corps have jointly supported 5,295 patients screened and 1,034 sight saving surgeries completed. We look forward to continuing the partnership into the first quarter of 2026 with the goal of extending outreach support to our newest sites in Mwanza and Mtwara regions.

Throughout 2025 Eye Corps focused on onboarding both sites, equipping clinics while strengthening surgical training for both ophthalmologists to ensure readiness for expanded outreach activity.

Additionally, Eye Corps formalized a new partnership with Vision Care Foundation in Tanzania, signing a Memorandum of Understanding in Q4. This partnership will support expansion of our shared work in the Dodoma and Arusha regions of Tanzania, increasing our collective reach and impact.



Eye Corps Continued Professional Development & Education

Eye Corps remains focused on providing educational resources to complement local residency programs and in country continued medical education by providing opportunities for additional quality training and skill transfer.

Our program has been thoughtfully designed around the following three main pillars of learning, which are applicable in both postgraduate and continuing education environments.

- Continued Education: Our partnership with the Muhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences (MUHAS) Eye Department continues to flourish, with our reach in continuing education expanding following the opening of the Eye Corps Training Center in Moshi, Kilimanjaro in Q425. In support of this important growth, Eye Corps has officially secured accreditation in Tanzania as a Continuing Professional Development (CPD) provider. With this accreditation, all Eye Corps-sponsored training curricula will now be formally recognized for CPD credit, allowing participating clinicians to earn required professional credits while strengthening their clinical and surgical skills. This designation further reinforces Eye Corps' role as a trusted partner in advancing high-quality, sustainable ophthalmic training in Tanzania.

We continue to garner interest from the global ophthalmic teaching community including from Tufts University Medical School and medical institutions abroad in India and the U.K. to expand the program throughout the year and we look forward to the opportunity to invite them to participate in this new and exciting initiative.

- Wet Lab Development and Training: Use of the surgical training lab which resides at MUHAS continues to be a valuable resource for the resident program. We remain focused on efforts to develop a Wet Lab curriculum which will integrate intensive lab training into the overall training program with the intent of substantially improving the surgical training that the residents receive.
 - The lab has attracted significant interest from other ophthalmic residency programs in Tanzania, mobilizing Eye Corps to actively strengthen these relationships with the goal of expanding the program.
- Outreach Surgical & Teaching Camps: Eye Corps continues to work with the MUHAS residents to build upon their knowledge as well as their surgical skills. The residents will continue to volunteer at Eye Corps' sites and outreaches into 2026.

- Charity Vision

MUHAS is Eye Corps flagship Tanzanian partner in education having established our long standing Memorandum of Understanding in 2022. We continue to work closely with the Eye Department, bolstering their curriculum with lecture series and routine visiting professorships while working together to maintain the much valued skills lab onsite.

- Muhimbili Hospital

The hospital is home to many of our Muhimbili University residents in training. The hospital plays an essential role in the training process for each student.

- Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Center (KCMC)

KCMC represents a partnership in education for Eye Corps. As the primary referral hospital for our nurses and technicians in training, we value our collaborative efforts to improve upon the shared training curriculum.

- Kilimanjaro Centre for Community Ophthalmology (KCCO)

KCCO is an essential partnership to have when collaborating across NGO's to develop outreach strategies and skill development.

- St. Benedicts Ndanda Referral Hospital

Eye Corps welcomes this collaboration which facilitates quality surgery for those in need at a discounted rate in exchange for a working relationship with their eye department. Eye Corps has lent valuable equipment and will be partnering with the Director of Health Services to expand their outreach capability.

- Vision Care Foundation (VCF)

As an established NGO in Tanzania committed to improved vision and eye health for all, Eye Corps is honored to have formalized this natural partnership in 2025 with hopes of expanding our collective reach to more communities in need.

- Vision Health International (VHI)

VHI is a fellow US based NGO providing eye care in underserved communities around the world. We were fortunate to be connected with them as we were developing our newest Eye Corps site in the Arusha region under the leadership of Dr. Frank Sandi. VHI's relationship with a small village in the neighboring district of Ndoombo has been instrumental in establishing the surgery referral model being implemented for Dr Sandi's clinic. We look forward to building our partnership with them while providing eye care to all of those in need.
